CHIEF SCHAEFER TO CAPTAIN FIREMEN AGAINST KIWANIS IN PRELIMINARY GAME

Crews Laying Out Kewaskum-Barton Hwy. 45 Roadway

Survey crews of Wisconsin have been engaged during the past week in staking out the right-of-way for the relocation and reconstruction of Hwy. 45 between Kewaskum and Barton.

Al Rettler, Washington county highway commissioner, said plans for the highway project call for complete reconstruction of the roadway, relocation in certain areas and construction of "more graceful" curves to eliminate present hazards. Work on the highway is expected to get under way this spring.

Land owners will be contacted by state representatives shortly to purchase necessary land for the right-of-way for the new highway.

Work on reconstruction of Hwy. 45 from Barton north to Kewaskum has been contemplated for some time. During recent years many residents of the county have urged that the roadway be improved as a safety factor. The present highway is rough, narrow and has sharp, dangerous curves.

County Chairmen For Heart Fund Drive Appointed

DR. EDWARDS CHAIRMAN FOR VILLAGE AND TOWN OF KEWASKUM

All of Washington county except West Bend, Barton and Hartford, where the Heart association is part of the Community Chest, has joined with Wisconsin and the rest of the nation to open the 1958 Heart Fund campaign, according to Attorney Deane R. Bascom, who will head the drive in the county.

The drive is conducted each year during February, and will be climaxed this year on "Heart Sunday," Feb. 23. Local chairmen have been appointed throughout the county to head the drives in their areas. These chairmen and their areas are as follows:

Elmer Plaum—Town of Farmington; Dr. R. G. Edwards—Village and town of Kewaskum; Dr. James E. Albrecht—Village and town of Jackson; Mrs. LeRoy Walterlin—Village of Germantown; Erwin J. Franzel—Village of Slinger, town of Polk; Florent Isselmann—Town of Trenton, village of Newburg.

Chairmen for the towns of Addison, Germantown and Richfield have not been named as yet, but Attorney Bascom indicates that as in the past years, a fund appeal would be made in these towns.

"The death toll caused by diseases of the heart and blood vessels is claiming more than 825,000 persons in the United States each year," Attorney Bascom said. "This means that these diseases claimed more victims each year than all other causes of death combined."

Attorney Bascom commented that the Wisconsin Heart association has a statewide goal of \$605,000 for the 1958 drive. That is the amount the association has budgeted to carry out its research, community service and educational programs for the coming fiscal year. Considering there are nearly 250,000 people in Wisconsin with heart disease, this is a very modest budget, he said.

Contributions to the Heart association may be made to any of the local chairmen or to the office of Attorney Deane R. Bascom in West Bend.

Indians Beaten By Oaks, Bells, Drop to 5th Place

The Kewaskum Indians had a disastrous week so far as remaining in contention in the Tri-County title race is concerned, being nosed out at Oakfield Friday, 42-41, and losing again at Campbellsport Tuesday, 57-43. The two reverses dropped the team from a tie for second place with the Bells in the standings to 5th place and ousted them out of the championship running.

The Indians had a golden opportunity to overtake the leaders when Campbellsport was defeated Friday by Lomira and Rosendale was upset by North Fondy Tuesday but they failed to come through. The boys have been giant killers, knocking off the Bells in a previous game here and also upsetting first place Rosendale but they fell apart and lost to the weaker teams. It seems the team just can't win away from home, having lost all their road contests

except the one against last place Hustisford. Two free throws by Jerry Schaefer with only about 20 seconds left in the game gave Oakfield a surprise 42-41 victory over the Indians, who had led most of the 4th period. Schaefer took scoring honors with 16 points. Jerry Ogenorth was tops for Kewaskum with 13.

The Oaks led by a 14-6 count at the end of the first quarter and were also out in front at halftime, 23-19. In the third stanza, Coach Ernie Mitchell's boys picked up 12 points while holding the Oaks to 4, and went ahead 31-27. The Indians again lost their advantage in a torrid final period. The Oaks had one more field goal than the Indians but the latter led by one in the free throw department.

Kewaskum was dumped into the second division with the 57-43 loss at Campbellsport Tuesday. The margin came as a surprise considering the Indians defeated the Bells in an earlier game. However, one of the regulars, "Butch" Rodenkirch, was not in the lineup and

this hurt their chances. The Bells came from behind to make up a 7-point deficit in the first period. Kewaskum led 16-9 at the quarter but had a poor second period, scoring only 4 points while the Bells dropped in 14 to take a 23-20 lead at the intermission. The Bells outscored the local quint, 17-16, in the third stanza and 17-7 in a bad final quarter to win by 14 points.

Ogenorth again was the top scorer with 18 points for the losers, followed by Nigh with 13. The Bells' main scorers were Joe Dreikosen with 16 points, Ron Vander Grinten with 14, Gene Pieper with 11 and Dave Scheid with 10. The Bells sank 13 free throws while the Indians hit on only 5.

On Friday night the Indians entertain tall end Hustisford and next Tuesday they will play host to Slinger in a non-conference game.
