Kewaskum, Other Schools to Join New Athletic Conference

Indians, Others Withdraw from Tri-County Loop

At a meeting held last week the forming of a new athletic conference and the revamping of the Valley Tri-County conference was further developed. Nineteen high schools representing five conferences are involved in the change-over, including Kewaskum.

North Fond du Lac, Campbellsport and Kewaskum, the latter two the largest schools in the present Tri-County conference, withdrew from the circuit last Wednesday night. This leaves the 30-year-old athletic loop with Oakfield, Rosendale, Brandon, Lomira, Hustisford and a new team, Lowell-Reeseville, which has already been accepted as a member.

Coaches and principals of the Tri-County circuit approved the withdrawal of Kewaskum, Campbellsport and North Fondy. All three schools reported steadily increasing enrollment and indicated a preference for playing 11 man rather than eight man football.

From all indications, six teams are committed to the proposed new conference. They are Kewaskum, Campbellsport, North Fondy, Slinger, Germantown and Grafton. Kewaskum would also be the largest school in the new circuit with a total of 286 students and an increased enrollment in the next few years. Horizon of the Little Ten conference sat in on the meeting Thursday but has as yet made no commitment. Others interested are Oostburg and Cedar Grove. The new conference plans to be ready by next fall.

Legion Clubhouse Being Remodeled

After several months of careful planning, the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 384, Kewaskum, has decided to undertake extensive remodeling of their clubhouse on North Fond du Lac ave.

The building structure shall be lowered and the second floor will serve as the deck for a modernly designed clubhouse. After the contracts were let, work got underway immediately last Thursday. The building committee, consisting of Ed Bunkelman, Clayton Stautz, Lee Honeck and Jack Tessar, with Wilmer Prost serving as chairman, had tentatively scheduled Memorial Day as a possible completion day.

The prime objective of the post is to reduce future operating expenses and thereby enable the post to better serve the community, which is a dedicated service of the American Legion, and also to have, along with the recently improved Fond du Lac ave., a newly remodeled clubhouse to conform with state code in eliminating fire and accident hazards.

The structure, purchased by the Legion in 1945 from the H. J. Lay estate, was built in 1903 and has served as a clubhouse for the post very adequately. The members feel that after this project is completed, they will have more facilities available and will better serve in Robert G. Romaine post activities.

Blaze Destroys Farm Residence, Family Homeless

ORCHARD GROVE PARENTS, 12 CHILDREN DRIVEN INTO COLD BY FIRE

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Fellenz, their 12 children and Mrs. Fellenz's mother, Mrs. Mary Schneider, were left homeless Friday when fire destroyed their two story farm home on Hwy. 111 at Orchard Grove, 1½ miles east of St. Michaels, in the town of Farmington.

The fire broke out about 10 a. m. in the kitchen at the north end of the home. Mrs. Schneider, Mr. and Mrs. Fellenz, and five of their 12 children who were home at the time were driven out into the cold. The entire home was gutted by the blaze with an estimated loss of approximately \$18,000.

The flames spread so rapidly that members of the family were unable to enter the kitchen, where the telephone was located, to call firemen. Mr. Fellenz called from the home of a neighbor, Frank Thull.

Fellenz children home at the time were taken in by neighbors to shelter them from the severe cold. The two eldest boys are students at St. Francis seminary in Milwaukee, another child is a student at Kewaskum High school, four attend St. Michael's school, and the other five, including a six weeks old baby, are at home.

It was believed that the fire may have started from wiring in the wall, according to Mr. Fellenz. The flames spread quickly throughout the building.

Firemen from Boltonville, Fredonia, Fillmore and Waubesa converged on the scene but they were unable to save the house. Only a washer and dryer were reported saved, along with a few other items. All of the furniture and clothing was destroyed. Firemen remained at the scene until late afternoon, keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings.

A benefit dance for the family was held at St. Michael's hall Sunday night. Despite sub-zero temperatures, friends and neighbors turned out in large numbers. At least 260 tickets were sold. In addition, large amounts of food and clothing were brought to the dance and cash donations were made by some. On Tuesday night a benefit card party for the family was held at Boltonville.

The Fellenz family moved into the former Maurice Gahlman home two miles north of St. Michaels over the week end. Items of furniture were brought there by well wishers.

100 Blood Donors Sought for Mobile Unit Here Mar. 7

DONORS CANCELLED OUT AT WEST BEND URGED TO REGISTER HERE

A blood donor clinic will be held in Kewaskum on Friday, March 7, and Chairman Henry Rosenheimer and other volunteers were busy this week enlisting donors for the mobile unit.

The blood clinic here will be held between 1 and 6 p. m. in the new Kewaskum High school gymnasium, it was announced this week by Henry Rosenheimer, chairman of the event, and a director of the Community Donor club. Goal for the unit will be 100 pints of blood.

Patients who are residents of the Kewaskum community have used 140 pints of blood from the Community Donor club "bank" since the last mobile unit was held in the village in August of 1957, it was pointed out. All residents of the area are automatically entitled to the service of the blood program.

The Kewaskum Woman's club is assisting with the campaign and the women's group of Peace E and R church will prepare and serve refreshments to the donors.

Donors may make appointments for the mobile unit by phoning Mr. Rosenheimer, Kewaskum 29; Mrs. Roland Pledl, 160-R, the municipal building 94, or any woman's club member. Donors should also state what time would be convenient for them to give blood. To reach the goal of 100 pints, at least 125 to 150 signers will be required.

Repeat donors and as many new ones as possible are being sought.

Donors who were originally scheduled to contribute at the mobile unit in West Bend on Jan. 31, then had to cancel appointments because of colds or other reasons, have been urged to register for the Kewaskum clinic. West Bend area residents may register for the Kewaskum unit by calling Gordon Ohlrogge at FE 4-4448.

DiMaggio to Face Trial on Feb. 24

Salvatore (Sam) DiMaggio, 41, now serving a sentence at Waupun recently imposed in Milwaukee, will be brought to trial in circuit court at West Bend at 10 a. m. Feb. 24 on charges of break-in and attempted burglary at the L. Rosenheimer store in Kewaskum on Feb. 17, 1957.

DiMaggio, Frank Allota, 25, and Nick Tarantino, 27, all of Milwaukee, were picked up in connection with the break-in and were later released on bond pending their hearing.

Tarantino was sentenced to Waupun when he appeared in circuit court at West Bend and pleaded guilty to charges of break-in and attempted burglary at the Rosenheimer store. He is now serving his term. Allota will be tried at a later date after DiMaggio appears in court.

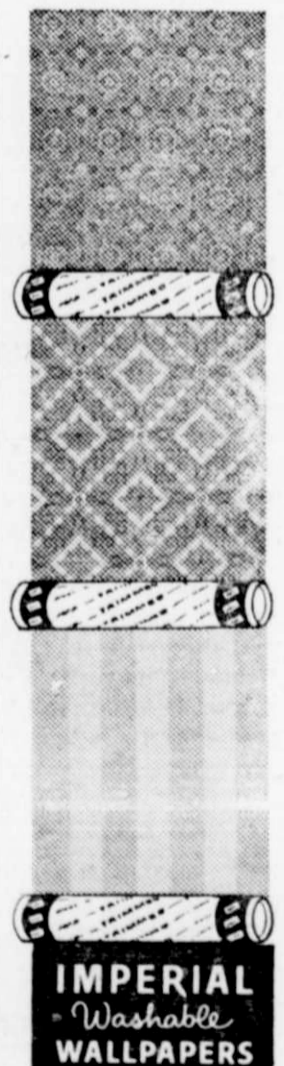

Heart Fund Drive to Reach Peak Sunday in Door-to-Door Collection

Washington county's 1958 Heart fund campaign will reach its peak Sunday, Feb. 23, when volunteers will spread through most of the county in a door-to-door collection of contributions.

The campaign is conducted throughout the county except in the cities of Hartford and West Bend and the village of Barton where the Heart association is part of the Community Chest.

Each of the volunteers will visit several homes, mostly in their immediate neighborhood, wearing a circular identification tag and carrying a supply of contribution envelopes. The householder seals his contribution in the envelope. He need not divulge the amount of his gift.

The mass, house-to-house collection here will be similar to Heart Sunday collections being conducted in 7,500 other communities throughout the United States at approximately the same time, according to Attorney Deane R. Bascom, Heart Fund Sunday chairman.

Heart Fund proceeds are used to support the work against the heart and blood vessel diseases, conducted by the Wisconsin Heart association and the American Heart association with which it is affiliated. A major portion (75 per cent) of the money collected by the association remains in Wisconsin for the support of state research, edu-

cation and community service programs.

A total of almost 27 million Heart Fund dollars has been channeled into research in the nine years since the American Heart association has been organized as the only voluntary public health agency devoted exclusively to the cardiovascular diseases.

Juneau at 1:30 p. m. Thursday in the Evangelical and Reformed church. Burial took place in the Peace E and R church cemetery, Kewaskum.

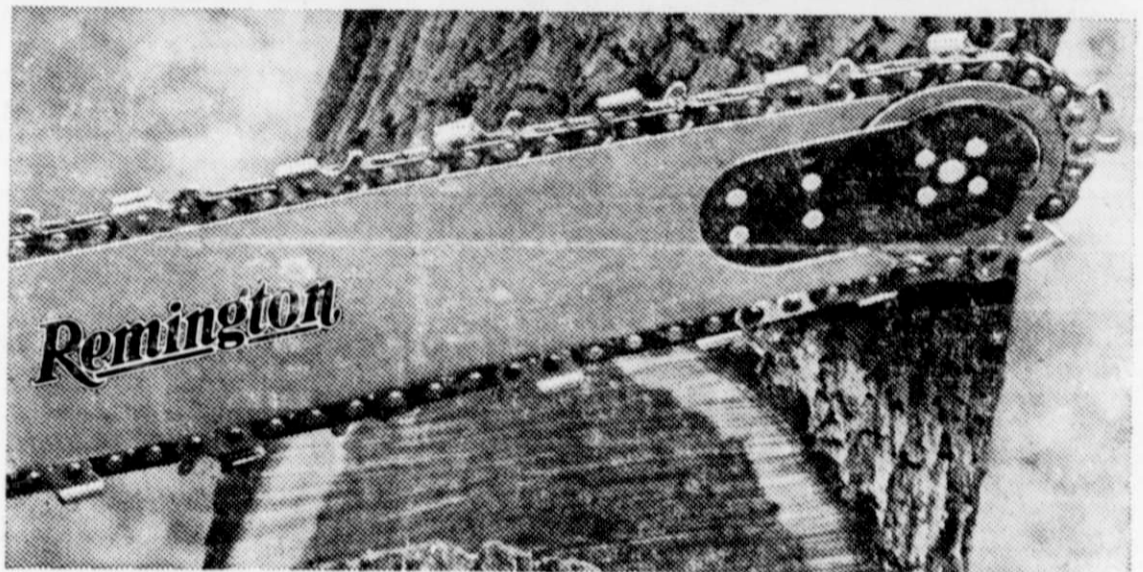

Around the Town

The news that Kewaskum High school will join a new athletic conference is a move which we have favored and been pulling for for a long time, and so have numerous others.

We never did believe that Kewaskum belonged in the Fox Valley Tri-County conference. For one thing the distance is quite far to schools like Brandon, Rosendale and Hustisford. Secondly, Kewaskum and Campbellsport are larger towns and have much bigger enrollments than the other schools, thereby having no opportunity to gain reputation or prestige in the loop. Kewaskum is the largest in the conference with 286 students and the enrollment here will increase in the next few years. Campbellsport is next with an enrollment of 251. These two schools have twice the enrollment of some of the others like Lomira with 148, Brandon with 128, Oakfield with 124 and Hustisford with 110. Thirdly, Kewaskum, Campbellsport and North Fondy usually dominate the first three places in conference standings, whether it be football, basketball or baseball, although the other teams usually have offered plenty of competition. Fourth, there never seemed to be any real competitive interest against teams like Brandon, Rosendale, Hustisford, Random Lake (in football only) and possibly Oakfield. Lastly, Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Fondy were the only three playing 11-man football and that is the game these schools and their fans want. Lomira, Brandon, Hustisford, Oakfield and Random Lake played 8-man football only and Rosendale didn't compete in the game at all. This made for unbalanced and uninteresting schedule.

With the three rivals, the Indians, Bells and Orlofes, forming the nucleus, the new conference will provide stronger and better balanced opposition, complete 11-man football schedules, new and larger gyms, more rivalry, less travel (at least for Kewaskum), increased interest and attendance and more publicity.

Three other schools which will join the new conference include Slinger, Germantown and Grafton. Three additional schools are still considering entrance into the loop, namely Horicon, Oostburg and Cedar Grove. Slinger and Germantown are both in Washington county like Kewaskum and hot rivalries should develop. Slinger has fine athletic teams and a new gym. Germantown is a new high school in its first year of operation. It may be weak for a year or two but the school is in a growing community and enrollment will increase by leaps and bounds. Grafton is almost a suburb of Milwaukee. The city has a tremendous building program in progress and the population is growing fast. Horicon is a member of the Little Ten conference but is the smallest school in the loop and has been taking its bumps from the larger members of the conference. Horicon would be a very welcome addition to this new league and probably its townspeople would appreciate a change to a loop where their team could be a topnotcher. Oostburg and Cedar Grove have good schools and their athletic teams are consistently the class of the Kettle Moraine conference. Oostburg, especially, has the reputation of being one of the best small town schools in the state basketball-wise. Kewaskum will also be the largest school in the new conference unless Horicon decides to come in.

So success to the new, as yet unnamed conference. May it grow into a great one.

We weren't going to mention anything about the weather this week but what else was there to talk about these frigid, sub-zero days? We thought it was cold last week when the thermometer dipped to 10 below several mornings. But it was even colder from Saturday through Tuesday when temperatures dropped to 12 to 15 below. Some thermometer's registered 20 degrees below. Wisconsin was the coldest spot in the nation Sunday and Monday. In Douglas county it was 40 below in this, the longest cold wave since 1936. Tuesday was the 11th day of sub-zero weather in 12 days, only Friday being warmer. In 1936 there was a streak of 13 consecutive below zero days. It's hard to believe but Spring is on its way.

Urge Purchase of Civil Defense Identification Bracelets Available Here

A notation was published in last week's newspaper that identification bracelets are now available for all those interested in obtaining them. Civil Defense is urging everyone to purchase this bracelet, and especially for your children. Order blanks are available at both the public and parochial schools.

They can also be ordered at the municipal building in Kewaskum or by contacting Marvin Martin.

These bracelets are made of high-grade stainless steel—fitted to the wrist—and may be ordered in varying sizes, according to the size of the person's wrist. They are made so that the name and address may be indented on one side while on the other—if the person is a Protestant or Lutheran—the Pledge of Allegiance will be stamped from very fine engravings. If the person is a Catholic, the St. Christopher medal is stamped on the reverse side. The plate shows the name and address of the child, name of the parent, city and state, and also leaves room for the date of birth and religion of the person wearing the bracelet.

At the present time these bracelets can be purchased for a nominal charge of 75c each, including postage to you. The bracelet will be indented and assembled as to proper size and sent to you by first class mail.

Medical Society Endorses TB Skin Testing Program

TUBERCULIN TESTS COVER WASHINGTON-OZAUKEE COUNTY AREA

At its January, 1958, monthly meeting, the Washington-Ozaukee County Medical society endorsed an extensive program of tuberculin skin testing for the two counties. The counties have noted an increase in numbers of active tuberculosis cases. The medical society resolved unanimously to endorse and actively participate in a program of tuberculin skin testing of all school pupils through high school and also preferably known adult contacts of active cases and other adults who are interested in this program.

Dr. William Nielsen has been placed in charge of the program in the West Bend area. Dr. C. P. Kauth is arranging the program in the Port Washington area, and Dr. James Algiers is setting up details for testing in Hartford.

The testing is expected to get underway the first part of March in West Bend and shortly thereafter in the other communities. It is hoped that through this program the distribution of tuberculosis in the counties can be determined and especially that new cases of tuberculosis can be found through positive reactors.

Argentina Teen-agers Like Jazz, Exchange Student Tells Club

GEORGE SALGUERO SPEAKS TO WOMAN'S CLUB MEMBERS ON LIFE IN HIS COUNTRY

At their meeting Saturday afternoon Kewaskum Woman's club members learned from foreign exchange student George Salguero that the teen-agers in his native Argentina differ none from American teen-agers in that they like to dance rock'n'roll, are Elvis Presley fans and they like jazz, especially when it is played by Louie "Satchmo" Armstrong. But the notable difference, he said, is that American teen-agers enjoy more freedom and are allowed to spend more time away from home.

George, who is spending the school year attending the West Bend High school as a senior, said in his country school attendance is for half-days but that 12 subjects are required during a year. Grade school is attended for 7 years followed by 6 years of high school. Schools are not co-educational. Few women attend the government-supported universities which require no tuition. Upon his return to his home in Cordova, he plans to attend a university to study engineering.

Argentina has no baseball, no football. He saw his first baseball game—with the Braves of course—after coming to West Bend. He likes the game and added he has already become a Braves fan.
