## Kewaskum Wins Sub-District Tournament Here, Advances to District Finals at Westfield

### Indians Beat Bells, 58 to 52, for Title

LOMIRA TIPS RANDOM LAKE  
67-45 FOR CONSOLATION  
HONORS IN MEET

The Kewaskum Indians won their own sub-district basketball tournament by beating Campbellsport in the championship finals Friday night, 58-52, advancing them to the district finals at Westfield this week, where they played the opening game Thursday night. Lomira took consolation honors with a 67-45 triumph over Random Lake in the opening game of the evening here Friday.

The Indians faced Oakfield, also of the Valley Tri-County conference, in their first game of the district meet at Westfield. The Oaks won the North Fond du Lac sub-district meet by upsetting Rosendale, league champions, in the finals Friday. Other teams participating at Westfield were Montello and Elroy, which met in the first tilt of the evening Thursday, followed by the Indian-Oaks contest. Winners Thursday night played off for the district championship Friday night. The district champion will advance to the sectional meet at Wisconsin Dells next week. Westfield is located in Marquette county, north of Portage (and south of Plainfield).

Kewaskum and Campbellsport reached the sub-district finals by winning opening round games Tuesday night. The Bells beat Lomira, 50-44, and the Indians laced Random Lake of the Kettle Moraine conference, 71-28.

Playing steady ball, Kewaskum stayed ahead of the Bells all through the championship game Friday. The Indians held a slim 13-11 advantage at the quarter but poured it on in the second period, scoring 18 points to the Bells' 6. This gave them a 31-17 halftime lead. The scoring was quite even in the third stanza with Campbellsport making 14 and the Indians 13. The Bells turned on the steam in the final quarter and began to close the gap but fell short by six points when the game ended, 58-52. The visitors dropped in 21 points to Kewaskum's 14 in the last period.

Dreikosen of the Bells was top scorer with 23 points and next high was Scheid with 7. The big guns for the winners were Jerry Opgenorth with 18 points, "Butch" Rodenkirch with 16 and Mark Rodenkirch with 14. The Indians made good on 14 free throws while the Bells connected on only 6.

After the championship game first place awards were presented to Coach Ernie Mitchell and members of his Kewaskum team and second place award to Coach Hubie Diekvoss and the Campbellsport squad. Large crowds attended the tourney games both nights.

Kewaskum has done well in tournament play in recent years and it was hoped they could continue to advance at Westfield. A few years ago they advanced all

## Boy Runs Into Side Of Auto, Uninjured

THREE OTHER ACCIDENTS  
OCCUR PAST WEEK

James, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Czaja, Kewaskum, escaped injury when he ran into the side of a car driven by Henry Abel, 46, Kewaskum, at about 6:30 p. m. last Friday on Main st. at the intersection with Railroad st. Abel was westbound on Main st. at a slow rate of speed when the Czaja boy darted from the south curb and ran into the left rear fender of the car. The boy fell to the street and then got up and ran to the north curb. He was taken to a physician's office for examination but there were no apparent injuries.

One of four persons riding in a car was injured last Wednesday night when the vehicle went out of control on Hwy. 67 two miles west of Campbellsport and sideswiped a bridge. She is Janet Brath, 17, Alenton, who was treated by a Campbellsport physician for cuts on her face and left leg.

Driver of the car was Robert J. Melzer, 21, R. 3, Kewaskum, who told police that he lost control of the car when he attempted to turn on the radio. The vehicle traveled onto the shoulder for 114 feet before hitting the bridge, located about one foot off the pavement, then continued for 318 feet before stopping in a field. The entire right side and front axle of the car were damaged.

Autos driven by Daniel Coulter, 16, R. 3, Campbellsport, and George Kopp, 21, R. 1, Thiensville, collided at 10:25 p. m. Friday on Hwy. 45 about 50 feet north of the intersection with Hwy. 28. Both vehicles were northbound on Hwy. 45. Kopp stopped his car in traffic to make a left turn when Coulter's machine struck the rear of his vehicle. No one was injured.

## 3 Runaway Boys Confess Attempt To Derail Train

STEEL PLATES PLACED ON  
TRAIN TRACKS NORTH  
OF KEWASKUM

Three Washington county runaway boys were taken before County Judge Milton L. Meister in juvenile court at West Bend last Friday on charges they had attempted to derail the crack Flambeau "400" flyer of the Chicago and North Western railroad on Wednesday. The prank could have resulted in the derailment of the train and a possible serious wreck.

The boys, who ran away from their homes in the Germantown area early last week, had placed steel rail "tie plates," rail joiner plates and railroad spikes along a mile stretch of the tracks at a point three to four miles north of Kewaskum. Since leaving their homes the boys had been sleeping in barns in the Kewaskum area.

Chief of Police Roland Piedl of Kewaskum was alerted after the train struck several of the plates on the rails and he apprehended the three youths on the street in the village. The boys had been spotted along the railroad right-of-way by train crew members.

The train normally passes through the area where the youths placed the obstacles on the rails at speeds ranging between 70 and 80 miles an hour. As the train was ahead of schedule Wednesday evening, the engineer was traveling at a low rate of speed. It was estimated that the train was going about 30 miles per hour when it hit the first in the series of the obstacles. The engineer quickly halted the train. Members of the train crew walked ahead and picked up another 25 or 30 pieces.

The steel plates were bent out of shape but no damage resulted to the rails or train. The train's reduced speed averted a serious derailment or wreck. Railroad detectives were called out to investigate the matter.

In juvenile court Friday morning one of the youths, a 12-year-old, was placed in the custody of the state welfare department and committed to the state school for boys at Waukesha until he is 21 years old or until such time as he shall be discharged previously if his conduct warrants. Sentencing of the other youths, a 12-year-old and 14-year-old, was postponed pending further investigation.

## Mayville Upsets Chevs To End Victory String, Delay Title Clinching

**KEWASKUM NEEDS VICTORY AT BEAVER DAM SUNDAY TO SEW UP TITLE**

For the second time this season Mayville threw a wrench in the gears of Kewaskum's drive for an undisputed title in the Lakes league by upsetting the Chevs here Sunday night, 113-103, in the highest scoring game of the campaign. Kewaskum already had a tie for the second half championship clinched but need one more win to sew up the undisputed crown.

Rest assured they will be primed for this battle as they always are against the Chevs. It should be a terrific game with Kewaskum hoping for their fourth straight division championship and its seventh in nine years.

### Continue Appraisal Of Hwy. 45 Project

Appraisals of land for the Hwy. 45 project between West Bend and Kewaskum and to the county line north of Kewaskum are being continued by members of the county highway commission, two representatives of the state highway commission and a real estate appraiser.

Being individually appraised is each parcel of property and the values will then be compared to determine a fair valuation for the land to be acquired for the new improved roadway.

- Put sweetened condensed milk, lime juice, lime rind, egg yolks and few drops vegetable coloring into mixing bowl; stir until mixture is well blended and thick. Pour into cooled pastry shell. Garnish with whipped cream squeezed through a pastry tube.
