## Henry Becker, Joseph Schwind New Trustees, Re-Elect Merwin

### TRUSTEE RACE DRAWS LARGE VOTE IN VILLAGE AS 3/6 BALLOTS ARE CAST

Two incumbent village trustees were defeated and a third was re-elected to office in the spring election held Tuesday, Apr. 1. Returned to office was Arvin Merwin while incumbents Carl F. Schaefer and Marvin Schaefer lost out to two newcomers, Henry Becker and Joseph Schwind.

The three victors all were elected by sizable margins. A surprise in the balloting was the large number of votes given Becker, who ran far ahead of the rest of the pack. He polled 241 votes, 66 more than his nearest opponent, Merwin, who was second with 175, while Schwind was close behind in third with 173 votes.

Next in line among the losers, and trailing Schwind by 37 votes, was Carl Schaefer with 136, followed closely by Marie Dei with 135. Marvin Schaefer received 119 votes and the seventh candidate, Luke Mueller, lagged with 61 votes. Trustees elected will serve for two-year terms. The three other trustees holding office will be up for election next year.

Robert G. Kroncke, who was unopposed for the two-year term as justice of the peace, polled the largest number of votes on the village ballot with 254. The new trustees and justice will take office at Monday night's village board meeting.

On the judicial ballot village voters gave William H. Dieterich 176 votes to 147 for Emmert L. Wingert in the race for justice of the supreme court, the state's highest bench. Dieterich, Hartford attorney, accomplished what he had failed to do in two previous attempts when he won the election as supreme court justice. He led incumbent Wingert of Madison all the way. In Washington county Dieterich polled 2,838 votes to his opponent's 2,589. On Wednesday, with 94 per cent of the state's precincts reported, Dieterich held a lead of 15,000.

County Court Judge Milton L. Meister was unopposed for election to the state's newly created 25th judicial circuit court. He polled 5,163 votes out of the 5,873 votes cast in the county and 4,256 votes in Ozaukee county. The 25th judicial circuit includes Washington and Ozaukee counties. Prior to the establishment of the new circuit Washington and Ozaukee counties were included with Dodge county in the 13th judicial circuit. Meister polled 337 votes in the village, the largest total given any candidate.

Interest in the trustee race brought out a relatively heavy vote in the village. With only two village and two judicial offices being voted on, the 57 ballots cast was considered a very good turnout. The weather was warm, sunny and very favorable.

## Firemen Put Out Two Grass Fires

The fire department was called out to fight two threatening grass fires in as many days over the week end. In both blazes much acreage was burned over and the fires could have been serious.

At 11:40 a. m. Saturday the grass fire was on the John Heberer farm in the town of Auburn north of Kewaskum. About 10 acres of grassland burned over and surrounding swamp and wooded areas were threatened by the flames. The flames spread out of control from a rubbish fire Heberer had started aside of the road.

The firemen responded again at about 3:30 p. m. Sunday to a large grass fire at the Harry Johanson poultry farm in the town of Kewaskum, located east of the village. An area of grass estimated at about one mile in length and from one-fourth to one-half mile wide burned over. A large part of the area burned was in the Kettle Moraine state forest, where the flames spread. The fire also spread to a woods, threatening it as well as a large marsh just north of the scene. It was reported that the blaze started from a lighted cigarette butt thrown into the grass near the Johanson home. About a half hour after returning to the fire station seven of the firemen were called by phone and returned to the scene. The fire started burning the second time in a wooded area and had to be extinguished once more.

## Graduation Held Here For 27 More Trained Auxiliary Policemen

### COUNTY WILL NOW HAVE 130 TRAINED POLICE FOR CIVIL DEFENSE

Graduation exercises for trained auxiliary police for Civil Defense were held at the municipal building in Kewaskum on Thursday evening Mar. 27, at 8 o'clock. Brief talks on duties and obligations were given by the following people: Sheriff of Washington County Alvin Schmidt, Police Chief Clem Mueller of Hartford, and county co-ordinator of Civil Defense, Ray Stork of Slingsher.

It was suggested to hold rotating monthly meetings of these groups. Upon completion of the other classes there will be 130 trained auxiliary police for Civil Defense in Washington county.

Edwin Morgenroth, son of Dr. and Mrs. E. L. Morgenroth of this village, who is located at Los Angeles, Calif., wrote a very interesting letter to his parents, telling about the recent earthquake at Long Beach, Calif. He writes, in part: "I am in Long Beach, the center of the earthquake area, helping friends. The major shock is over but the earth is trembling and shaking. Martial law has been declared. I am sitting on the lawn writing on a picture that fell from the wall. Buildings are in a total collapse. We ran to the yard when the earth began shaking. Ambulances and fire engines were shrieking down the streets. We don't know how many lives were lost. Relief centers are feeding the homeless and treating the injured. The city looks like it had been bombarded in a war. The American Legion, marines, sailors and national guard are preventing looting, keeping people in the middle of the street and clearing away debris. Every school in the city has collapsed and water is polluted. Oil fields are burning. Cars were flattened completely. There is great fear of a tidal wave. Everyone is stunted and don't know what to do."

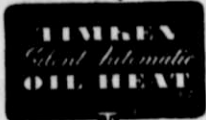

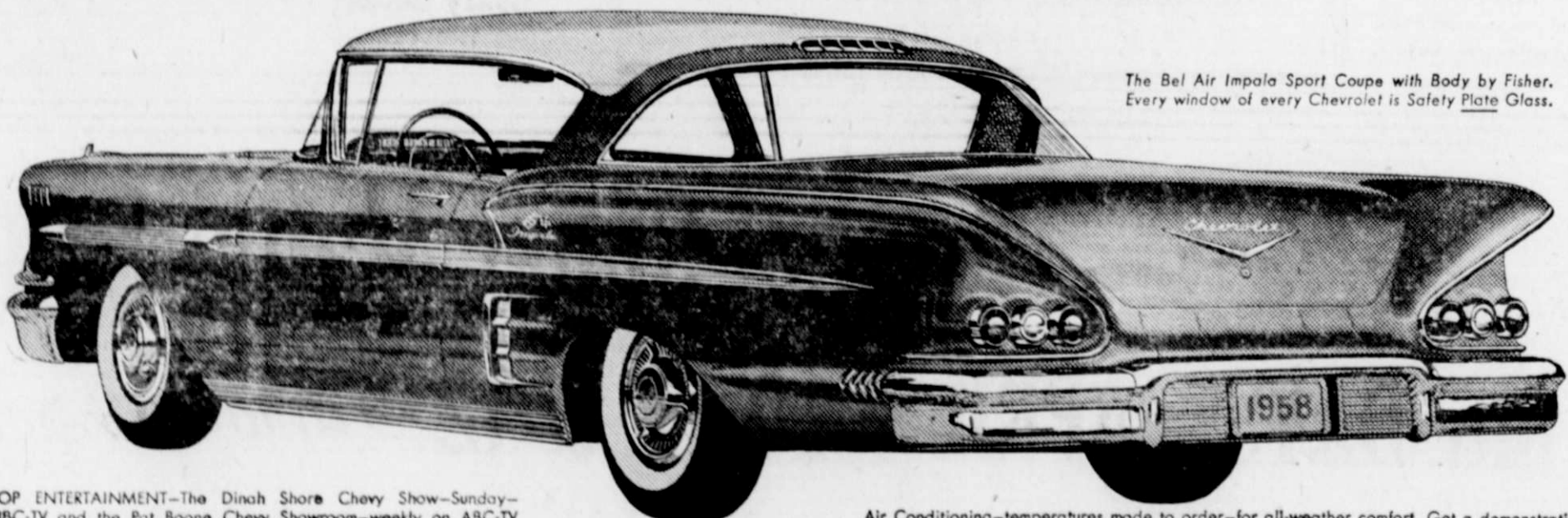

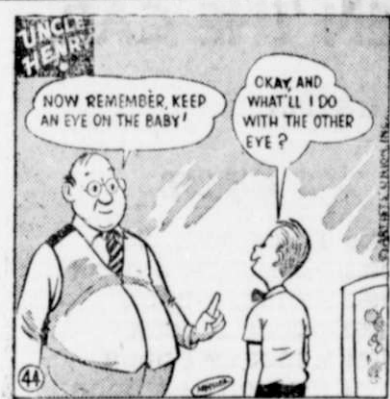
### FAMILY GET-TOGETHER TO BE SPONSORED BY COUNTY FARM BUREAU

As a result of winning the county speaking contest, Barbara will represent Washington county in the state speaking contest and wins an all expense paid trip to State 4-H Club Week at Madison in June, where the state speaking contest will be held.

Blue award winners in the senior division were Mardell Engeleiter, Kohlsville Pioneers 4-H club; Elaine Booker, Oak Grove club; Phyllis Freund, Welcome 4-H club, and Luella Cypher of the Good Luck 4-H club. Honorable mention in the senior division went to Norrita Oelhafen of the Badger Boosters; Marjorie Beck, B-Mer-E, and Judy Schroeder of the Triple "A" 4-H club.
