## Two More Areas Attached to Kewaskum High School District

### Town Farmington And Town Barton Territory Added

ORDER EFFECTIVE ON JULY 1; TOWN SCOTT TERRITORY MAY BE ADDED SOON

On Wednesday, April 16, the joint school committee of Washington and Fond du Lac counties passed a resolution and adopted an order effective July 1, 1958, that attached to the Kewaskum Community High School District the remainder of the territory of the town of Farmington, that is not now in the district, and all of Sections 25 and 26, and a portion of Section 27 in the town of Barton.

This action followed the public hearing held on the proposal March 13, 1958, at the Kewaskum High school, and affects the attachment of the territory as proposed at that hearing.

The vote of the twelve member joint committee was eight in favor of the order, two against, one abstaining, and one absent.

In announcing the issuance of the order, the joint committee chairman, Deane R. Bascom, said that the attachment would not effect the high school attendance of any students in the area who are now attending high school. All of them will be permitted under state law to finish their high school education at the school at which they are now enrolled. He also pointed out that this attachment was made for high school purposes only and would have no effect on the elementary districts operating in the area.

The joint committee expressed through its chairman the belief that this attachment might well be the last one made to the Kewaskum district of territory in Washington county, and that probably the natural and proper boundaries of the district in this county had been reached. However, it is contemplated that certain territory in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county, may be added in the near future.

A copy of the order as adopted is on file in the county clerk's office in Washington and Fond du Lac counties, in the office of the town clerk of the town of Farmington and Barton, and in the office of the county superintendent of schools of both Washington and Fond du Lac counties.

## Cancer Campaign In County Begins Monday, Apr. 28

LEHMAN ROSENHEIMER, AL SEEFELDT CHAIRMEN FOR VILLAGE AND TOWNSHIP

The 1958 cancer campaign for Washington county is being conducted from April 28 through May 12, inclusive, according to Tom Kenny, West Bend, cancer campaign chairman for Washington county. Letters from local village and town chairmen will be received by county residents on April 28.

Kenny said the campaign will be conducted entirely on a voluntary basis again this year since this type of drive always has proved successful in the past. The goal for Washington county this year is about 10% higher than the 1957 quota, but the chairman said he is confident that the people of Washington county will respond generously to the appeal. He asked that contributions be returned early in order that the campaign can be completed in a short time.

The number of deaths caused by cancer is increasing each year in Washington county. Surveys indicate that 1 out of every 4 people will be a victim of cancer. That means that almost 10,000 residents of Washington county will develop cancer during their lives. The disease strikes irrespective of sex, race, creed or geographical location.

If cancer had been conquered only a dozen years ago nearly 2,500,000, including more than 35,000 children, would not have died of cancer. During 1958 about 225,000 more Americans will die of this dreaded disease. Of those who will die 20,000 will be ages 15 to 44 and one-half will be under 65. Last year more school children died of cancer than from any other disease.

Each letter will have included with it a leaflet entitled "Guard Those You Love" and Kenny urged that each member of the family read it and particularly note the seven danger signals of cancer, for most cancer can be cured if discovered early enough.

"Washington county has never failed to answer the cancer appeal wholeheartedly, generously and promptly, and we are sure that this year will be no exception. Resident of this county have always given more than was asked to fight against cancer through research and education. If everyone will give just a little more this year than last, we will be assured of reaching our quota," he said.
