CD Alert Success Here, Police Force Swings Into Action

RESCUE SERVICE TRUCK OF MILWAUKEE FIRE DEPT. GIVES DEMONSTRATION

In conjunction with the nationwide Civil Defense practice alert Tuesday and Wednesday, all Kewaskum auxiliary police and firemen swung into action at the sound of the fire siren signal at 10 a. m. Tuesday, when the local test was held. Under the direction of Chief of Police Roland Pledl and CD officials, the volunteer aids, fully equipped, took their stations at various schools, intersections, and municipal, industrial and business places vital to public welfare.

Most important job of the volunteer force would be to direct the traffic flow of evacuees from bombed areas or to direct local residents in case of an actual disaster. The exercise Tuesday was in preparation of such an event, should it occur. Pupils at Holy Trinity school evacuated the buildings for a "simulated bombing" while those in the public schools took refuge for a "simulated tornado." The test, the purpose of which was to train personnel and test emergency operations plans, was termed a complete success here.

On Tuesday in Kewaskum in conjunction with the CD alert, a demonstration by the Milwaukee Fire Department rescue service truck was given at the municipal building. The vehicle, one of several, is designed to be used in cases of emergency and carries all needed disaster equipment. In being shown through the truck the writer was amazed at how completely equipped the truck is for any emergency or disaster. In the afternoon the vehicle was open to inspection on Main st. across from the Bank of Kewaskum.

A steady blast on our fire siren announced the alert and immediately auxiliary police were rushed to their stations in emergency vehicles with sirens screaming. Later the siren sounded in a rising and falling tone as a take-cover signal.

In case of an "H bomb attack" on Milwaukee, Washington county would be called upon to provide shelter for evacuees from that city. CD officials estimate that approximately 82,000 persons would invade this county following a Milwaukee attack. An H bomb attack would have left in its wake 1,282 dead and 943 injured. Casualties would have been from an estimated population of approximately 119,040 at the time of the attack. An additional 5,000 injured persons would have been brought into the county. In a month's time 50 per cent of the injured would die of radiation sickness.

Evacuees would be crowded into improvised camps in areas as follows in Washington county: West Bend City Park—5,000; Barton—700; Big Cedar Lake—4,800; Little Cedar Lake—3,100; Hartford—1,100; Fries Lake—300; Holy Hill area—450; Silver Lake—600; Lizard Mound State Park—980; Kewaskum—300; Jackson—300; Slinger 350. Right-of-Way for Hwy. 45 Construction Project Purchased

BIDS ON BARTON-KEWASKUM PROJECT TO BE LET MAY 20; HOPE TO FINISH WORK THIS SUMMER

Highway Commissioner Al Rettler of Washington county announced that progress on the reconstruction of Hwy. 45 between Barton and Kewaskum was made this week when negotiations for acquiring the right-of-way were completed.

The right-of-way for construction has been acquired by direct purchase or by awards of damages. Letting of contract for construction work on the highway is expected to be completed May 20 at Madison. Actual work on the roadway is expected to begin in 30 days after the contracts are let. Rettler revealed.

It is hoped that the entire project will be completed this summer despite the apparent lateness of the starting date on work on the highway.

Additional construction of Hwy. 45 to the north of Kewaskum to the county line and from there to Eden in Fond du Lac county is also expected to begin this summer.

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Winners in Two-County Medical Society Essay Contest Announced

STUDENTS GET CASH AWARDS AT MEETING MAY 22; 100 ENTRIES

The five students from Washington and Ozaukee county high schools who submitted winning entries in the recent essay contest sponsored by the Washington-Ozaukee County Medical society will receive their cash awards at the May 22 meeting of the society. The session has been scheduled at The Cedars in Cedarburg. More than 100 entries were submitted in the contest.

First place winners were Donna Kay Bienlein and Judith Strauss, both senior students at Port Washington high school. They will receive \$75 checks.

Other winners are Carolyn Casey of Hartford high school who will receive a check for \$25 for third place; Philip Borleske, Cedarburg high school, \$15, for fourth place, and Cathie Bonner, Grafton high school, \$10 for fifth place.

The three top winning essays in the Washington-Ozaukee contest have been submitted to the national contest which offers \$2,675 in cash prizes and is sponsored by the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons' Freedom Programs, Inc. Prize money for the Washington-Ozaukee essay contest was provided by the medical society of the two counties.

Contestants were offered a choice of two topics for their essays, "The Advantages of Private Medical Care" or "The Advantages of the American Free Enterprise

System." Judith Strauss, one of the victors in the Washington-Ozaukee essay contest, stated that, through preparation of the essay, "I certainly learned much and believe because of it have a greater appreciation for the services our private physician offers us. It's an excellent way of informing the public of the valuable points of private practice. If more people were cognizant of the facts of which I am now, I'm sure few would ever consider adopting a program of socialized medicine."

Miss Donna Kay Bienlein, the other first place winner, stated in part: "Good health is a responsibility of the individual and his doctor, and with them it must remain. It cannot be taken over by a large organized group and managed like a school hot lunch program. It has to be based on the individual. For medical care, like religion, is individual and personal; it is not a political machine in practice."





NO-COOKING TRIUMPH

Magic Cream Cheese Pie



If you want a taste-tempting, appetite-filling dessert, try this cream cheese pie made with sweetened condensed milk and strawberries. The filling needs no cooking. As it is delicious in a crumb crust that needs no cooking, it is a real treat to the cook on a hot day.

It takes only a few simple steps to make this luscious filling. Add lemon juice to the 15-ounce can of sweetened condensed milk and watch it thicken as you stir it in. Beat a package of cream cheese until smooth. Add two egg yolks and then the strawberries to the cream cheese. And finally combine the fruit-cheese mixture with the lemon juice-sweetened condensed milk mixture.

Top the pie with a meringue made of the two remaining egg whites and brown. Or, if you want to keep the no-cooking record straight, top it with whipped cream and save the egg whites for tomorrow.

This recipe is just as successful using raspberries as strawberries.

MAGIC BERRY CREAM CHEESE PIE

- | | |
|---|--|
| 1 baked 9-inch pastry shell or graham cracker crust | 2 eggs, separated |
| 1 1/2 cups (15-oz. can) sweetened condensed milk | 1 cup fresh sliced strawberries or raspberries |
| 1/4 cup lemon juice | 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar, if desired |
| 1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese | 4 tablespoons sugar |

Put sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice into mixing bowl; stir until mixture thickens. Beat cream cheese, softened at room temperature, until smooth. Add one egg yolk at a time, beating well after each addition. Add fruit and mix well. Fold the cheese-fruit mixture into sweetened condensed milk mixture. Put into cooled baked pastry shell or crumb crust. For meringue, add cream of tartar to egg whites; beat until almost stiff enough to hold a peak. Add sugar gradually, beating until meringue is stiff and glossy but not dry. Pipe lightly on pie filling. Bake in slow oven (325°F.) until lightly browned, about 15 minutes. Cool.
