Burglars Break Into Heinemann Dairy Plant, Escape With Safe

Get Only \$33 in Night-Time Theft Early Sunday

ABANDONED SAFE FOUND IN WOODS NEAR ST. MICHAELS BY MUSHROOM PICKER

Burglars broke into the William H. Heinemann Creameries, Inc. plant in Kewaskum early Sunday morning or possibly late Saturday night and made their get-away with the company safe without being detected.

An early morning mushroom hunt by a St. Michaels man Sunday led to the discovery of the burglary. George Kreil was searching for mushrooms in a wooded area west of St. Michaels shortly before 7 a. m. Sunday when he came upon a safe with books and papers littered around it. Investigation revealed that the safe belonged to the Heinemann plant.

The safe contained only \$33.37 in petty cash, according to Charles Ceiger, plant manager at the Heinemann dairy. The burglars entered the plant by breaking a window in a stock unloading door on the east side of the building adjoining the railroad tracks.

After gaining entrance, the burglars broke open an office door and removed the safe, weighing about 200 pounds. They lowered the safe from the second story balcony in the building and removed it from the premises.

In order to remove the contents, the burglars removed the floor of the safe at the scene where it was found in the woods by Kreil.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum and sheriff's officers on Monday took into custody and questioned several suspects in connection with the theft. Three men arrested on charges of suspicion of burglary in connection with the theft of butter, cheese and gasoline from the Orchard Grove cheese factory late in April were also questioned regarding the local burglary.

John Clark, 23, R. 3, West Bend, and Arthur Norton, 21, R. 2, West Bend, were bound over to county court when they appeared before Justice of the Peace Herbert Matenaer. George Cooley of Shell Lake was also arrested in connection with the Orchard Grove break-in and returned to West Bend. Bond for Clark and Norton was set at \$2,500 and they are being held in the county jail upon failure to provide bond.

A fourth man, Clyde Cooley, 32, of the Wallace lake area, was arrested on charges of receiving stolen property and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or serve 90 days in jail. He was confined to the county jail upon failure to pay the fine.

The Heinemann burglary marked the second time that a major break-in was attempted in this village in recent years. Early last year burglars broke into the L. Rosenheimer store. They were scared off by police before they secured any loot. One of the men

27 KHS Students Take Merit Scholarship Test

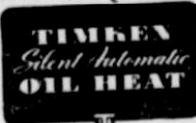
Merit scholarships are provided by some 80 corporations, foundations, professional societies and individuals, as well as by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself, which conducts the competition.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test is a three hour measure of educational growth and aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.

A group of 10,000 students—composed of the highest scorers in each state—will advance to the semi-finals when the results are reported to all participating schools next fall. Semi-finalists

Those who repeat their high performance on the second examination will become finalists in the program and will indicate their choice of college and course of study. Memorial Poppy Sale Here This Week End

Memorial poppies worn here on Poppy Day, May 23, and May 24 were received by Robert G. Romaine unit of the American Legion Auxiliary from the veterans hospital at Wood hospital where they were made by disabled veterans. The little red flowers were made ready for distribution by volunteer workers of the Auxiliary.

"The memorial poppy is a crepe paper replica of the wild European poppy which bloomed in profusion on the world war battlefields and cemeteries in France and Belgium," Mrs. Clayton Stautz, Auxiliary president, explained. The World War I poem, "In Flanders Fields," told the world about these poppies, and soon after that war the poppy became the memorial flower for the war dead throughout the English speaking world.

"Making the flowers provides interesting and beneficial employment for thousands of veterans in hospitals and convalescent workrooms throughout the country," continued Mrs. Stautz. "The Auxiliary provides the materials and pays them for the poppies they make. The work is considered valuable as occupational therapy and also gives the long-time patients the encouraging experience of earning money again.

"Disabled veterans of three wars, the two world wars and the Korean conflict, made poppies for the Auxiliary this year."

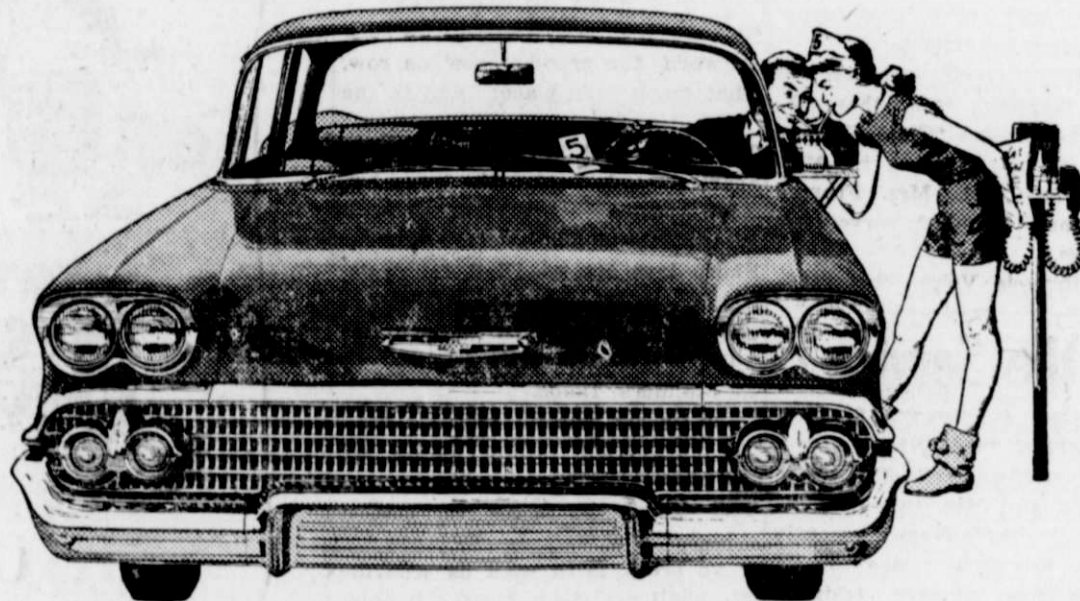

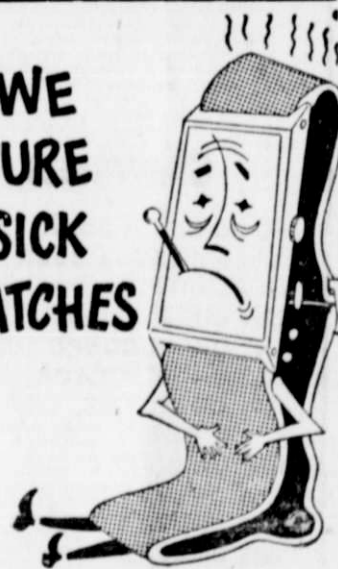

Wisconsin pays for damage done by hunters on leased public hunting grounds but in spite of the increased acreage the Conservation Department paid the smallest total of damage claims last year since 1945. Last year's damage payments totalled \$446.
