The Public Service Commission has notified the Village Board that the automatic wig-wag signals at the Main Street railroad crossing would be lowered approximately 3 feet so as to provide more adequate view of the signals.

The board held a general discussion on the completing of the Assessors Plat Map, the Street Development Plan and the House Numbering Plan.

Upon motion by J. Schwind, seconded by W. Tessar and duly carried, the board adjourned subject to call.

## CYCLIST DENIED DAMAGES BY JURY IN \$24,000 ACTION

A \$24,000 suit for damages filed in behalf of a 13 year old Bark Lake youth whose bicycle was struck by a car on June 25, 1956, was denied by a circuit court jury Tuesday when it was found that the youth was 70 per cent negligent in the accident.

Suit was brought by Leo Miller, father of the boy, Ralph. Testimony revealed that the boy failed to stop for an arterial highway and was struck by a car driven by John Joseph Wuest of Kewaskum. The mishap happened in the town of Richfield.

Wuest, who was driving a truck owned by Leroy Schmidt, was found 30 per cent negligent in the crash in which the youth was injured.

## Jacob Bruessel, Sr., Others Die

Jacob Bruessel, Sr., 89, well known retired farmer, a lifelong resident of the town of Kewaskum, passed away early Wednesday morning, May 28, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, after an illness of about two months.

A son of the late Henry and Mary Bruessel, he was born on Aug. 17, 1868, in the town of Kewaskum, 2 1/2 miles north of the village. In 1905 he moved onto a farm one mile south of Kewaskum where he lived until the past winter when he came to the village to reside with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Stautz.

Mr. Bruessel's marriage to the former Emma Klumb took place on Nov. 30, 1893, the Rev. Greve performing the rite. She predeceased him on Nov. 23, 1939. Four children were born to the couple, one of whom, Jacob A. Bruessel, died on July 13, 1954.

Surviving are two sons and a daughter, Edwin of R. I. Allenton, Elsa (Mrs. Stautz) of Kewaskum and Walter of Campbellsport. He also leaves 14 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren, three daughters-in-law, one son-in-law and a sister, Mrs. William Hess of West Bend.

Mr. Bruessel was a charter member of the Peace E and R church and a school board member of the former Schnurr school district many years.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home after 2 p. m. Friday and at the Peace church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. on Saturday. The Rev. C. F. Hammen officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery.

## Allen Bohn, 8, Hurt When Car Strikes Bicycle

CYCLIST KILLED IN COUNTY, OTHER ACCIDENTS OVER HOLIDAY WEEK END

Allen, 8 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Bohn, Kewaskum, was injured at about 4:30 p. m. last Thursday when his bicycle was struck by a car on Fond du Lac ave. in front of Honeck Chevrolet.

The mishap occurred when the boy drove his bicycle into the path of a car driven by David H. Leonhardt, 28, of Fond du Lac. According to the police report, Bohn pulled out of a driveway leading to the Honeck garage, drove onto the highway and into the path of the northbound Leonhardt vehicle.

The bumper of the auto struck the bicycle, throwing Allen onto the hood of the car and then forward to the pavement. He suffered a fractured left leg, bruises and lacerations to his face and forehead. The boy was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. He will be confined there at least several weeks.

A truck parked at the curb obscured the views of both the driver and Bohn boy. Fortunately Leonhardt was traveling at a slow rate of speed, estimated at 25 miles per hour. He immediately applied his brakes but was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting the boy.

## LAWRENCE COHEN KILLED

Lawrence L. Cohen, 23, Fond du Lac, was killed late Memorial Day afternoon when the motorcycle on which he and his wife Sharon, 20, were riding, careened off a curve on Hwy. 143, about 7 miles southeast of West Bend, and struck a tree, throwing the riders onto a stone fence. Cohen was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Cohen, Fond du Lac. Sam is a salesman for Cahodas-Manis Produce Co. and has been calling on stores in Kewaskum for years. Cohen's wife was critically injured in the crash and was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend.

Two other persons were killed and several critically injured in Washington county in accidents over the holiday week end. The year's death toll in the county now stands at 7.

## CAR AND TRUCK COLLIDE

Three persons were hurt at 5:45 p. m. on Memorial Day when a car driven by Kenneth L. Breuing, Milwaukee, and a truck owned by Harold Vick and operated by William M. Wettstein, R. 1, Eden, collided at County Trunks G and S in the town of Auburn, about 2 miles north of Kewaskum. Fond du Lac county police said that Breuing reported he became confused at an arterial sign, which he thought governed motorists planning a right turn at the intersection, and he did not come to a complete stop. He drove his car into the path of Wettstein's truck after falling to see the vehicle approaching.

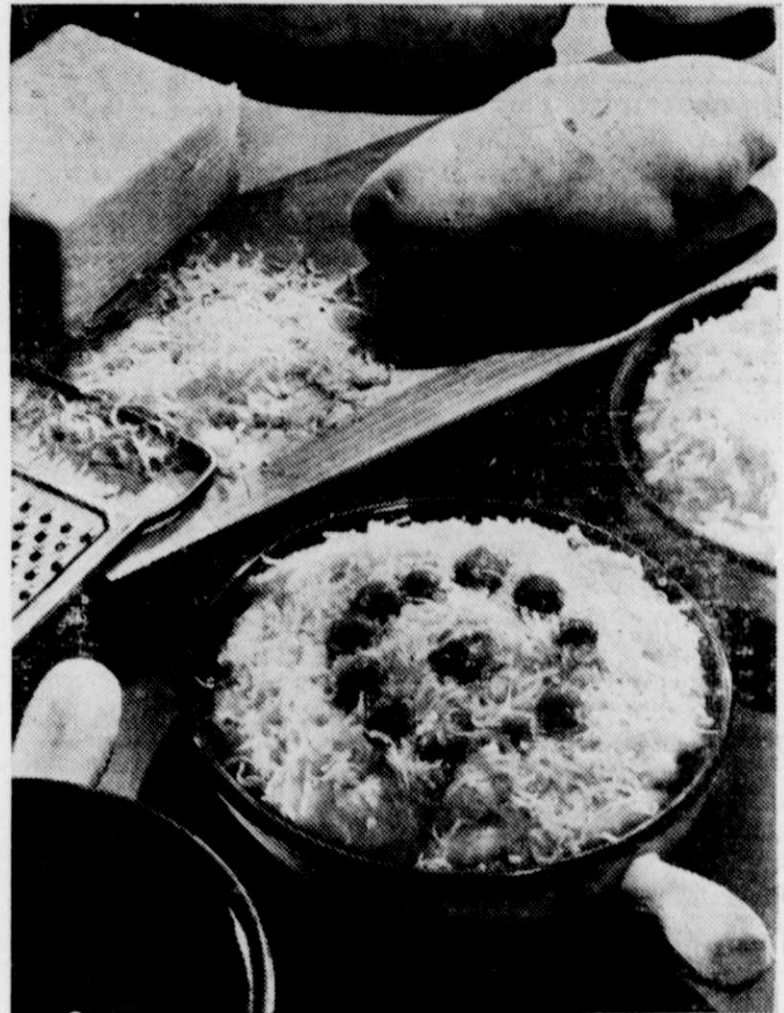

### Cheese & Long Whites Combine In Ideal Patio Dish

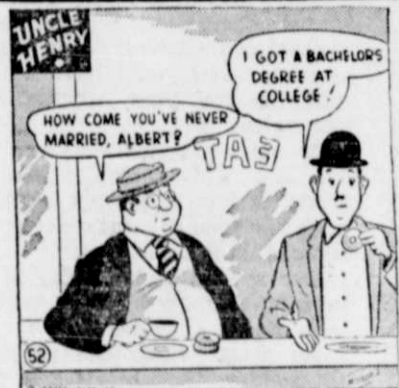

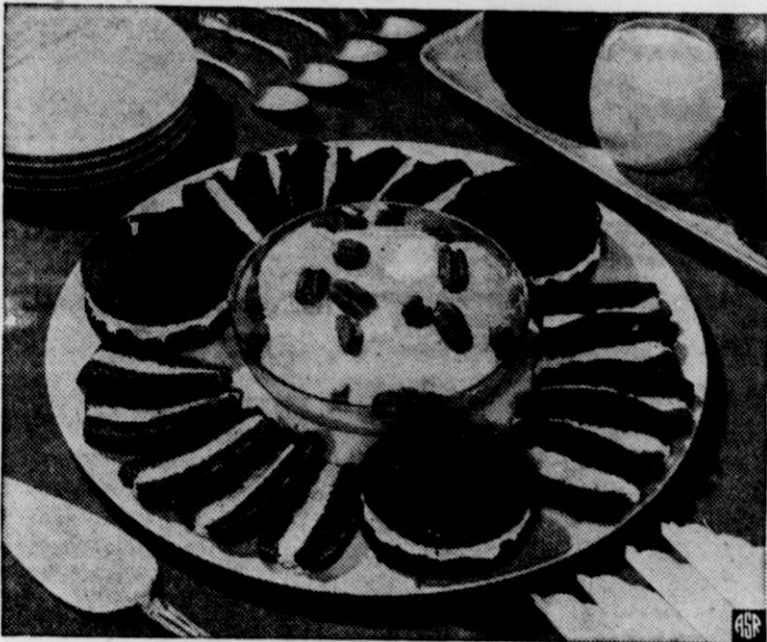

DAISIES WON'T TELL!

A Springtime surprise party and you were asked to bring the cake? Here's one that is easy to carry, cuts to advantage, and looks like a breath of Spring! Its two-toned icing, various shaped pieces, and top surprises will impress.



- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cups Beet Sugar
- 4 egg whites
- 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract

• Cream shortening and Beet Sugar together until fluffy; blend in egg whites one at a time. Stir in sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk; add flavorings.

• Pour into well-greased and floured loaf pan (14x9x2). Bake in 375° F. oven 20 to 25 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Cool on cake rack.

• Make up your favorite Boiled or 7-Minute Icing using 2 egg whites and 1 1/2 cups Beet Sugar. To one-half the icing stir in 8 drops yellow food coloring and 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract. 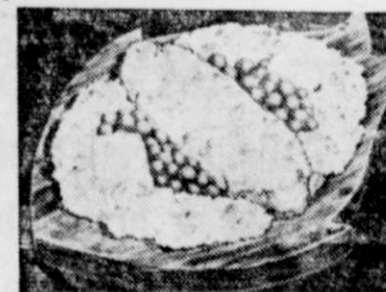
