Parishes Honor Father La Buwi at Farewell Reception

MANY IMPROVEMENTS MADE
DURING YEARS AS PASTOR;
PURSE IS PRESENTED

The Rev. F. C. La Buwi, pastor of Holy Trinity parish and St. Bridget's mission church at St. Bridget's for the past 17 years, who has been appointed pastor of St. Mary's church at Racine, was honored by members of both local parishes at a surprise farewell reception in the church hall on Tuesday evening, June 17, from 7 to 9 p. m.

The Rev. John Budde, assistant pastor at St. Agnes church, Milwaukee, will succeed Father La Buwi as pastor of Holy Trinity parish. Both appointments became effective on Friday, June 20, when both pastors took over their new parishes at noon.

About 500 members of Holy Trinity and St. Bridget's parishes turned out to honor Fr. La Buwi at Tuesday's farewell reception, bid him goodbye, wish him the best of success at his new pastorate, and thank him for his kind favors and spiritual guidance during his many years as pastor here.

The congregations presented Fr. La Buwi with a sizable purse. His mother, Mrs. Pauline La Buwi, was presented with an orchid corsage and a portable TV set from the Ladies' Altar societies of the parishes. Cake and coffee were served to all who gathered at the farewell. Poems in tribute to Fr. La Buwi and his mother, written by Mrs. Al Muckerheide, and printed on appropriate cards were included with each gift presented.

While Fr. La Buwi was pastor much building was done and many improvements made at Holy Trinity parish. The major ones included repairing of the church, installing a new roof on the church, repairing the steeple, repairing the window sills and putting on storm windows, a new heating system, basement, kitchen and equipment, hall, lavatories, etc. in the church basement, filling in the playground, purchasing more playground and adding equipment, building a new \$90,000 school, completely remodeling the convent and old school building, building a new steps in front of the church, remodeling and redecorating the church proper, and many other lesser improvements and purchases.

A native of Rubicon, where he received his elementary education, Fr. La Buwi studied for the priesthood at St. Lawrence seminary, Mt. Calvary, and St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee. He was ordained on May 30, 1931 by the late Samuel Cardinal Stritch in St. John's Cathedral, Milwaukee, and read his first mass on May 31 in St. Killian's church, Hartford.

Following his ordination Fr. La Buwi was assistant at St. Frederick's parish, Cudahy, for one year, from June 1931 to June 1932. He was assistant superintendent at St. Aemilian's orphanage, Milwaukee, from 1932 until 1937. Fr. La Buwi was then appointed pastor of St. Mary of the Lake church at Westport where he served from

Work on Hwy. 45 Project South of Kewaskum Begins

CREWS OFF TO FAST START
MONDAY, PAVING TO BE
DONE NEXT SUMMER

Crews and equipment of the contractor, the O'Keefe Construction Co. of De Pere, moved in last week end to begin construction on the Hwy. 45 project between Barton and Kewaskum. The work, which county residents have been looking forward to for a long time, began on Monday and is progressing at a rapid pace.

Later other construction on Hwy. 45 will include the stretch from the north village limits to the Washington-Fond du Lac county line and a Fond du Lac county project will provide for the construction of Hwy. 45 from the county line north to Eden.

Construction on 45 north of Barton got off to a flying start Monday when crews of the O'Keefe Co. began moving tons of earth as much heavy equipment started gouging out a path for the relocated portions of the highway. Other equipment is breaking up the old highway pavement at the south end of the Kewaskum swamp area just north of the Joe Jaeger Excavating Co. property.

The Hwy. 45 project has been allotted 190 days for completion of grading, sub-base and structure work for the total length of 5.289 miles on a bid of \$512,185.50.

When preliminary work is completed, the contract for surfacing of the new roadway will be let this fall. Actual paving of the newly constructed Hwy. 45 will not begin until next summer, according to Jim Mayer, district engineer at the Waukesha office of the state highway commission.

Traffic is now being rerouted over Hwy. 28 and Hwy. 144 between Barton and Kewaskum. Up to Wednesday the roadway was still open up to the Jaeger Construction Co. at the south end of the swamp.

Most of the curves in the highway are being removed and the entire road will be wider, straighter and more level than the present roadway. The amount allotted for construction work on the highway does not include expenditures made for purchasing the right-of-way or for paving the highway.

Al Rettler, county highway commissioner, revealed that purchase of the right-of-way for construction of County Trunk Highway H between Barton and Kewaskum is nearing completion and should be ready for bid letting by July 19. It is expected that construction on the project will begin late this summer or early in fall.

Landmann Receives Degree at Wisconsin

Paul C. Landmann, Kewaskum, was a candidate for the bachelor of science degree at the University of Wisconsin's annual commencement this year, held in the Wisconsin Field House at 9 a. m. Monday (June 16) at the university.

Some 2,500 students were scheduled to file across the commencement platform to receive diplomas. Bachelor degrees were scheduled for about 1,750 students, while some 750 men and women were scheduled for higher degrees. Over 700 of the graduates are war veterans, and over 800 are married. Nearly 74 per cent of them come from Wisconsin homes, while the other 26 per cent come from 42 other states, the District of Columbia, and from 33 foreign lands scattered throughout the world.

The graduation ceremony highlighted a week end of intensive commencement-reunion activity on Wisconsin's campus. A reception by Pres. and Mrs. Fred in honor of the graduates, their parents, and alumni was held Sunday evening, and Sunday afternoon the All-University Honors convocation cited 481 students for their fine academic achievements.

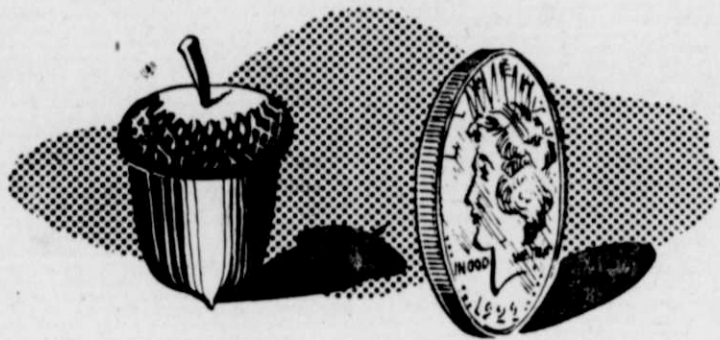

ORDINANCE NO. 58-2
AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING
AN OFFICIAL MAP

Under Section 62.23 (6) of
the Wisconsin Statutes

(1) Purpose. In order to conserve and promote the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare, there is hereby adopted and established the OFFICIAL MAP of the Village of Kewaskum, which consists of two sheets: Sheet 1 of 2 (Street Development Plan), for the area within the village limits; and Sheet 2 of 2 (Street Extension Plan), for the area outside the village limits over which the village has extra-territorial jurisdiction, in accordance with Section 62.23 (6) of the Wisconsin Statutes. It is the further purpose of the OFFICIAL MAP to show the width and location of the streets, highways and parkways in order to promote the efficient and economical development of the Village of Kewaskum.

(2) Certificate to be Filed with the Register of Deeds by Village Clerk. Immediately upon adoption of this ordinance, the Village Clerk shall file with the Register of Deeds of Washington County and the Register of Deeds of Fond du Lac County, a certificate showing that the Village of Kewaskum has established the OFFICIAL MAP as described in (1) above, and shall do likewise as to any change or additions.

(3) Authority of the Village Plan Commission. The Village Plan Commission, when passing upon a land subdivision plat referred to it by the Village Board, shall not recommend such plat for approval

unless it conforms with the OFFICIAL MAP.

(4) Building Permits, Plot Plan. For the purpose of preserving the integrity of the OFFICIAL MAP, no permit shall hereafter be issued for any building in the bed of any street, highway or parkway shown or laid out in such map except as provided in paragraphs (d) and (g), subsection (6) of Section 62.23 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The proper official authorized by the Village Board to issue building permits shall require each applicant to submit a plot plan, certified by a qualified surveyor, for approval. Such plot plan shall show accurately the location of any proposed building with reference to any street as shown on the OFFICIAL MAP.

(5) Village Board May Change. The Village Board, whenever and as often as it may deem it for the public interest, may change or add to the OFFICIAL MAP of the Village in conformity with the provisions contained in paragraph (b), subsection (6) of Section 62.23 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(6) Violations and Penalties. Any person, firm or corporation who violates, disobeys, neglects, omits or refuses to comply with, or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall forfeit not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 and the cost of prosecution and in default of payment of such forfeiture and costs shall be imprisoned in the County Jail of Washington County, Wisconsin, until the payment of such forfeiture and costs of prosecution, but not more than 30 days for each violation, and every day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

(7) Effective Date. This ordinance shall be in full force and effective from and after its passage, approval and publication by posting in at least three (3) public places in the Village of Kewaskum, and proof thereof is filed and recorded according to law.

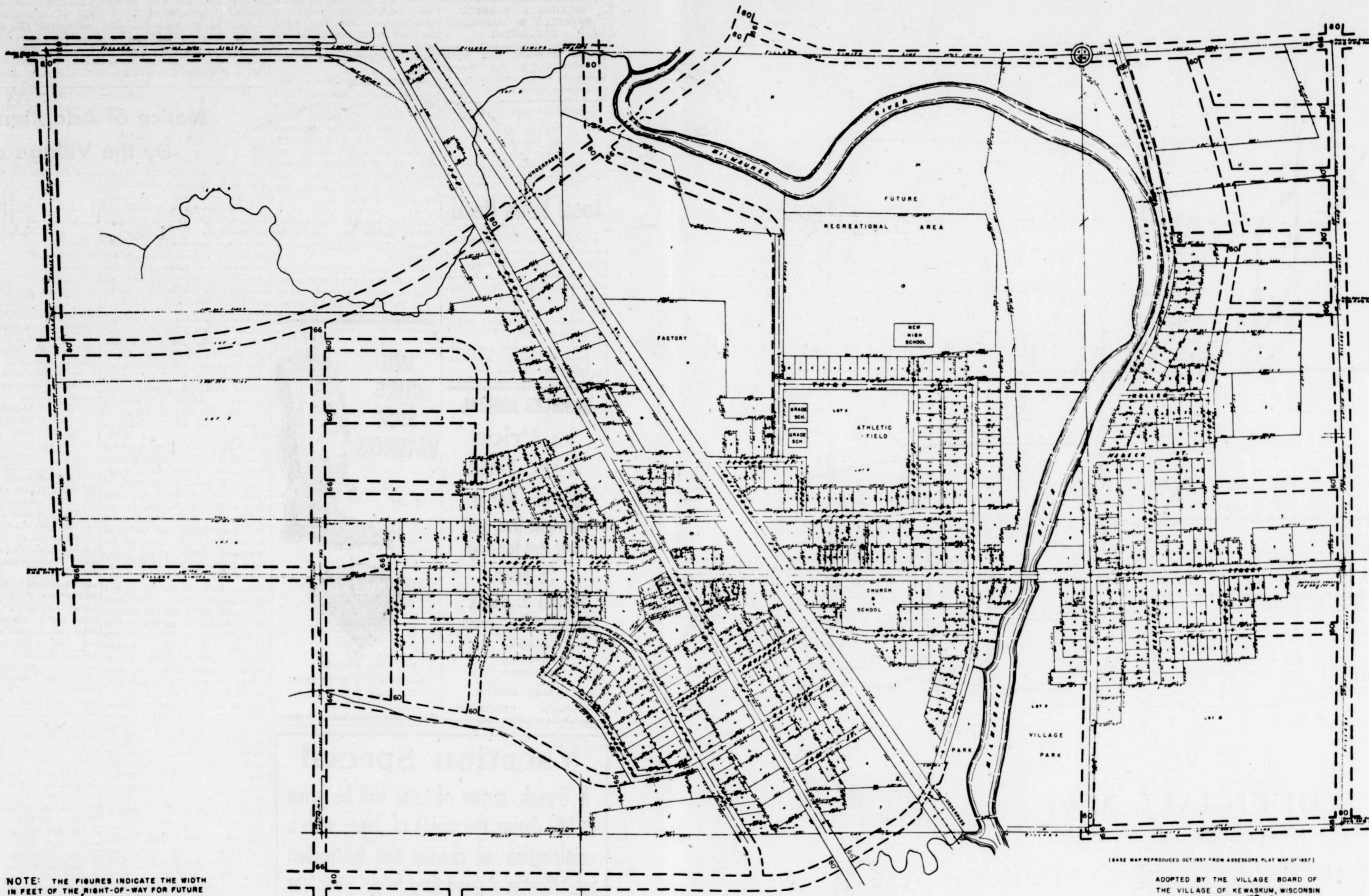

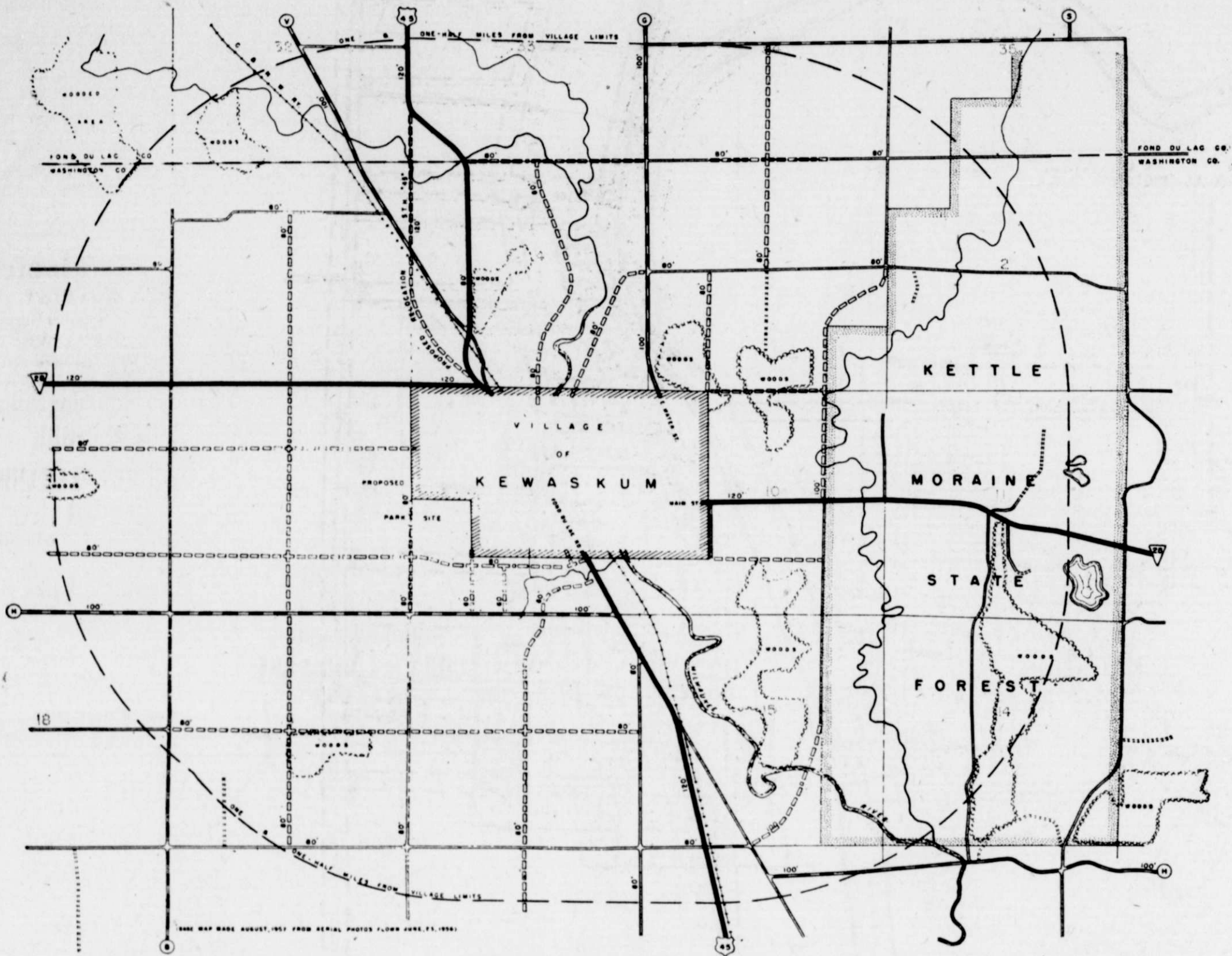
