Hwy. 45 Project Worker Killed When Tractor-Loader Tips, Pins Him; Cyclist Killed in Accident

One Other Cyclist, Riders Wives Also Injured in Mishap

James Van De Hel, 20, of R. 1, West DePere, a construction worker on the Hwy. 45 project between Barton and Kewaskum, was killed instantly in an accident shortly before 2:30 p. m. Monday when a front end tractor-loader he was driving tipped over and pinned him beneath it on the gravel road known as the "old West Bend road" several miles south of Kewaskum.

According to one of the foremen on the project, the young man was driving the heavy vehicle from the south end of the Kewaskum swamp to the north end by way of the gravel road which runs parallel to Hwy. 45. Van De Hel is reported to have turned out for a vehicle approaching from the opposite direction when he apparently got off on the wet, soft shoulder of the road and the vehicle tipped over down a steep embankment. He was pinned beneath the payload machine and his body crushed.

The accident occurred almost directly east of the Joe Jaeger Excavating Co. near the John Bertram and Les Schneider farms. The fatality raised the county highway death toll to 13 for 1958.

The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance, equipment truck and firemen called by the siren, with a local physician, sped to the scene. By the time they arrived another vehicle owned by the O'Keefe Construction Co. of DePere, which has the construction contract on the roadway, had removed the tractor-loader off of Van De Hel, who was pronounced dead by the physician. Later Undersheriff George Brugger and a West Bend ambulance also arrived. Spectators were kept away from the scene of the accident until the body was removed.

The body was brought to the Miller Funeral home in the local ambulance and later transported to DePere. Van De Hel, who just observed his 20th birthday last Saturday, was to be married next month it was stated. He only recently began working for the construction company.

A motorcyclist who was injured Sunday afternoon at about 4:20 p. m. in a mishap on Hwy. 28 about a mile east of St. Michiels died Sunday night at about 7 p. m. at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, where he was taken. He was Robert E. Backhouse, 22, of R. 1, Random Lake.

The accident occurred when motorcycles driven by Backhouse and Richard Berres, 27, R. 1, Adell, were traveling east on Hwy. 28 and approached the intersection of County Trunk Hwy. HH. A car driven by Gladys J. Horne, R. 2, Campbellsport, reportedly was entering the intersection and Berres swung his cycle to the left to avoid the auto.

Harold Krueger Is Seriously Burned

Harold Krueger, 35, who resides on Hwy. V about two miles north of Kewaskum, was seriously burned Saturday afternoon in a flash fire while trying to dispose of a pile of rubbish in his yard.

Krueger suffered second degree burns on his arms, face and neck. The mishap occurred when Krueger poured gasoline on a pile of rubbish when it failed to ignite. Lighting a piece of paper to start the rubbish, Krueger was enveloped in flames when the gasoline fumes ignited.

He was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance and was treated there for his burns. His condition was reported as good earlier this week.

ALLEN HERRIGES, 25, KILLED BY TRAIN

Allen Bernard Herriges, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Al Herriges of Wayne Center, was killed Wednesday evening when his car was struck by a North Western Railway train at the crossing in the village of Campbellsport.

The body is in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, since 2 p. m. Friday. Funeral services will be held at Holy Trinity church at 9:30 a. m. Saturday and burial will be in the parish cemetery.

MRS. MILLER ELECTED RED CROSS CHAPTER SECRETARY

Jos. F. Huber, West Bend, was elected chairman of the West Bend Red Cross chapter for the next year last week at the organizational meeting of the board of directors held in West Bend. Dr. Robert H. Backhouse, traveling behind Berres, also swung his motorcycle, but the vehicle struck the rear of Berres' machine and went out of control into the ditch. Backhouse was thrown from the motorcycle, which rolled over in the ditch. His wife, Donna Backhouse, 19, suffered abrasions to her left ankle. Berres was shaken up in the crash and his wife, Marion, 21, who was riding with him, suffered abrasions on her right arm and ankle.

Miss Horne told officers that she had started to enter the intersection, but backed up when she saw the motorcycles approaching.

It was reported that the cyclists and their wives were returning home from the Kewaskum picnic.

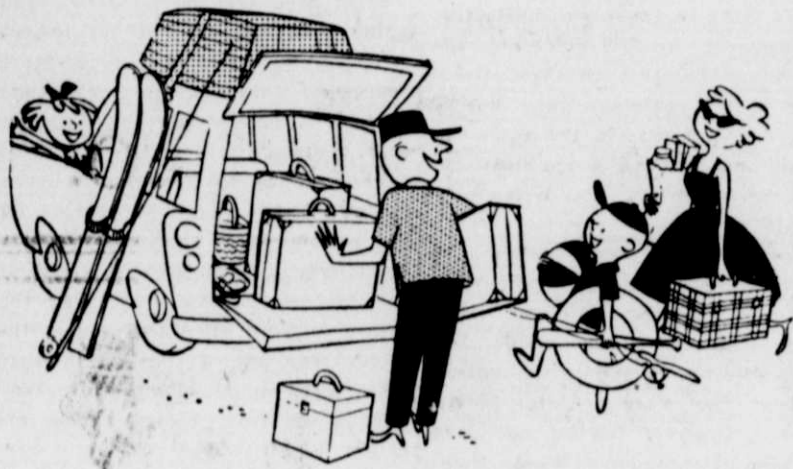

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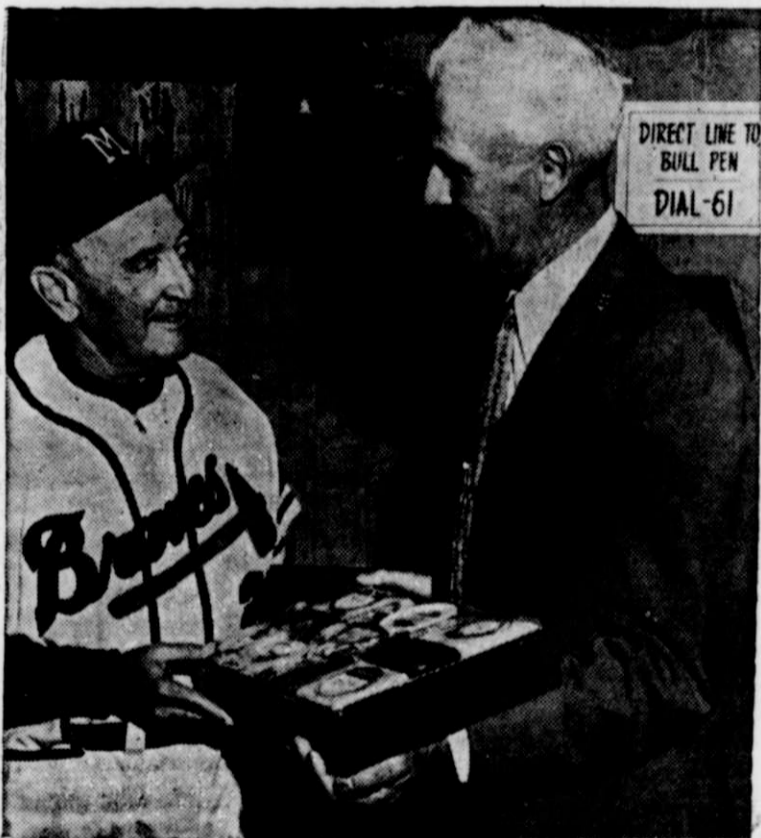

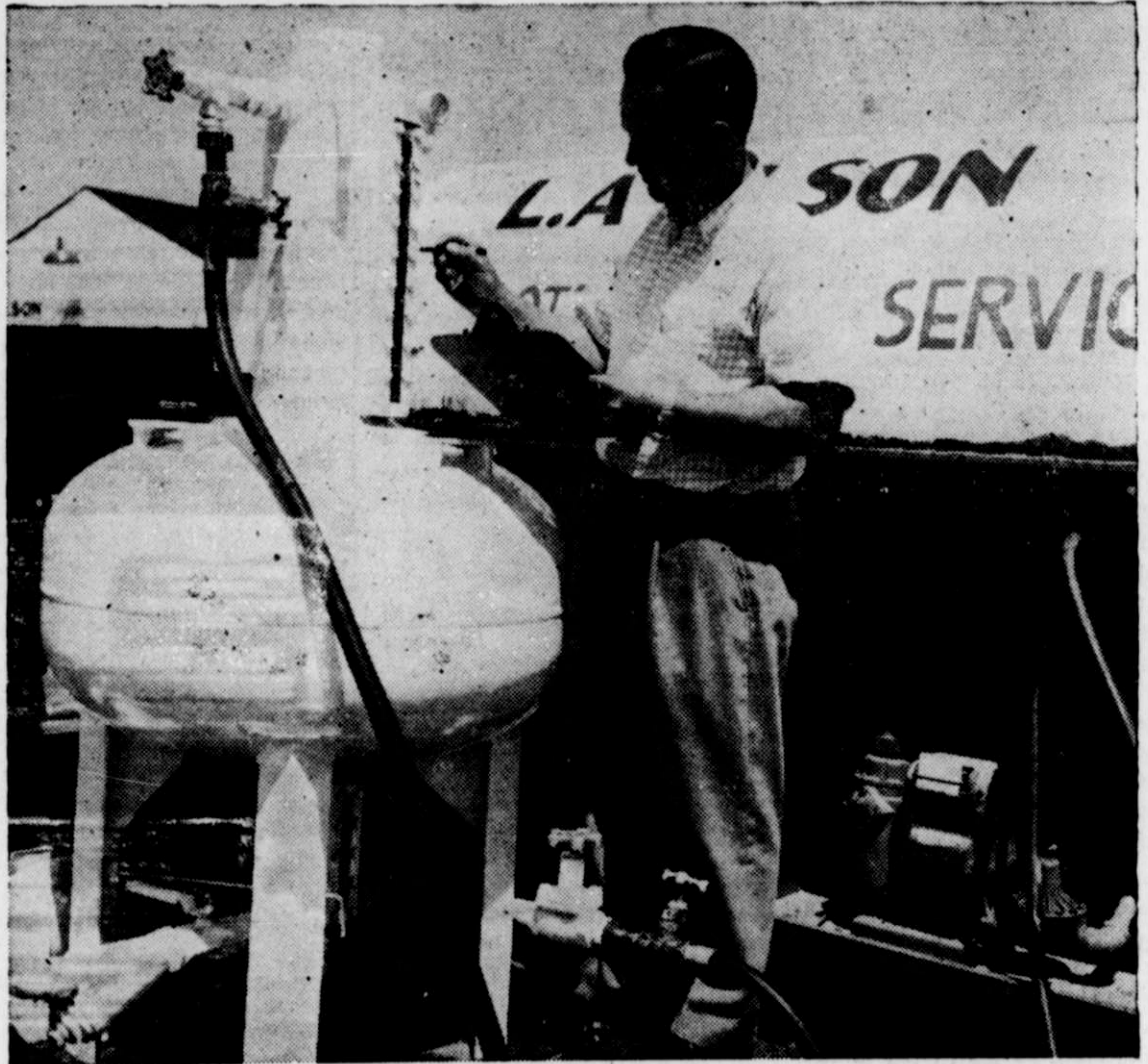

Roman Foerster Herd Finishes Testing Year

The Roman Foerster herd located west of Kewaskum recently finished its testing year.

The herd averaged 22 cows during the course of the year and 11,870 lbs. of milk with 444 lbs. of butter-fat. This is truly a fine record.

Imagine having cows in your herd that made over 15,000 lbs. of milk and well over 500 lbs. of butterfat. Foerster's herd has done that and if you were to analyze why he gets that kind of production you would have to give the credit for the most part to his testing program.

Roman Foerster is one of many who has done a tremendous job of improving his herd and will give most of the credit to the fact that he has known what each cow produces in his herd and what he can get and expect from any cow in terms of offspring. Roman believes in this old philosophy: "Testing the herd, cull the poor ones, and feed the good ones." If one can add to that kind of philosophy a great many herds in Washington county will be well on the way to improving the general dairy picture throughout the county.

Here is a herd that has not added cows to the herd to bolster the farm income but he has increased the efficiency of his farming operation by improving the general production of the entire herd.

Scale Model of Watershed on Display at Washington County Fair



How to make running water walk is demonstrated by this model of a miniature watershed which will be on display at the Washington county fair in Slinger July 24-26. Provided by the Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Co. of Milwaukee, the model represents in scale a small watershed about two square miles in area. It illustrates what can be done in the way of soil and water conservation under the U. S. department of agriculture's "Small

Watershed" program for upstream water conservation and flood prevention.

Here a USDA soil conservation service technician points out key aspects of the model to a farm boy and a banker, typical of the people who work together in this program.

Other phases of the program include contour farming, terracing and strip cropping, wooded areas,

grassed waterways, farm ponds and headwater flood prevention practices. Such soil and water conservation practices will stop erosion which has been stealing Wisconsin topsoil at the rate of one inch every 14 years, has made nearly 2 million acres of our land unfit for farming and has brought another 12 million acres (more than half of our land in farms) near the danger point.
