Boat Building Co. Moves to Schaefer Bros. Garage Bldg.

SELL TRAILERS AND OTHER MARINE SUPPLIES, PLAN 24-HOUR AUTO SERVICE

The National Woodworking and Boat Co. recently leased the Schaefer Bros. garage building on Fond du Lac ave., formerly occupied by Vincent Motors, Inc., and moved into the building on Oct. 1.

Ernie Joyce is owner of the company and Bob Edgerton is salesman. The company at present employs four full time employees and plans on hiring more men when they go into production of the Runabout boat in the near future.

Boats being built by the company are 14 foot runabouts, 12 foot skiffs and 12x14 foot flat bottom row boats. These are sold both retail and wholesale. The concern also sells Valspar paint, fiberglass materials, Holeslaw trailers and various other marine supplies. They also repair boats and store motors and boats for the winter.

The gas station will sell Shell products and as of Nov. 1 will have complete automobile service such as wash and grease jobs. At that time the station will have a stock of tires and batteries and will be open for 24 hours. The station will also participate in the Friday night bonus.

This business was first started in Milwaukee. Eight months later it was moved to Dundee where a marine retail store was started. Sometime in early spring the factory end of the business was moved into the Maaske building here in Kewaskum. However, it grew too small for the company's needs and so the present location was leased. Now for the winter the company's whole operation will be here and in the spring the Dundee store will also be opened again.

Begin Pavement Laying on Hwy. 45

The base coat and mat coat paving of new Hwy. 45 from Kewaskum southward was begun by workmen for the Rasmussen Construction Co. last week. The company will pave about a mile of the highway at both ends this fall and complete the project next spring.

Present plans call for paving the highway northward from Barton to Hwy. D at Lighthouse Lanes and southward from Kewaskum to the county trunk highway about a mile south of the village known as the old West Bend road. Paving will consist only of a base coat and mat coat with the final coat to be applied in spring.

The remaining unpaved portion of the highway will be treated with calcium chloride to eliminate dust and will provide a fine roadway for winter travel. By delaying the actual paving until spring the highway will be given a better chance to set before the final coating is applied.

When completed the new highway will provide an excellent roadway for traffic between Kewaskum and Barton. Employees of the Jaeger Construction Co. are busy finishing graveling the remainder of the road.

Joe Eberle Sells Tavern Property To Peace Church

PLAN RAZING BUILDINGS, ERECTING NEW ONES IN EXPANSION PROGRAM

In a business transaction made over the week end with Mr. and Mrs. Joe Eberle, the Peace Evangelical and Reformed congregation purchased the property and tavern and other buildings owned by the Eberles between Main and First streets.

The property, which adjoins the Peace church grounds on the west side, includes the present tavern and residence building, an addition which houses two bowling alleys which have not been in use for many years, and a small barn with built-on garage. The barn, at one time used as a horse barn and later for dog kennels by Eberle, a beagle fancier, is empty at the present time. The buildings cover the block from Main to First st.

Earlier the Peace church purchased a lot from William Techtman and Lester Dreher to the south of the parish grounds and east of the Eberle property which is now in use as a parking lot.

The agreement between the Eberles and parish will not become effective until July 1, 1959, when the present license on the tavern property expires. Peace congregation has no specific plans for their newly purchased property but is looking forward to a building and expansion program which would include tearing down of the present buildings.

The property has been in the Eberle family for many years and the tavern business at present is operated by Mr. and Mrs. Syl. Serwe.

New Hwy. 41 Lane Opened to Traffic

The new southbound lane of the new Hwy. 41 four lane super highway between Allenton and Fond du Lac was officially opened last Friday. Gov. Vernon W. Thomson and other officials from throughout Wisconsin took part in the ribbon cutting ceremonies just south of Fond du Lac to mark the opening of the most recently completed segment of the four lane highway.

Construction is under way on Hwy. 41 between Fond du Lac and Green Bay to develop that portion of the highway into a four lane roadway. Eventually the state plans to continue the improvement northward to the Michigan state line. Washington county highway representatives and county board members were present for the ceremonies.
