Successful Deer Hunters Listed

Wisconsin is having a most successful deer season with the bag of venison far exceeding that of last year. A total of 74,000 deer had already been killed last Sunday with a full week of the season left in the north. This extra week of deer hunting north of Hwy. 8 is hoped by game managers to do the job for which it was intended, to hold the deer herd at a point where it can continue to thrive. Reports also indicate an exceptionally heavy bear kill in northern Wisconsin.

Most of the hunters from Kewaskum and area were successful in bagging a deer of some kind, either around home or in the north. Only a part of these reported their luck to this office as follows:

The first deer reported killed in the county was by Leslie "Windy" Weiss of R. 1, Kewaskum, who got a 12 point buck in the Boltonville swamp at about 7:45 a. m. on opening day. The animal weighed 200 pounds dressed out.

The first village hunter to report killing a deer was young Harvey Ramthun Jr., who shot a fine buck shortly after the season opened in the Dundee area. He hunted with Jimmy Fickler.

Reuben Martin and Harold Schmidt hunted around Scandinavia, Wis. on the opening day and Reuben shot an 8 point buck. They returned home the same afternoon.

Dick Thiemer was one of a party of neighbors who hunted in this area opening day and Dick bagged his deer in the morning.

Elroy Pesch and son Harold "Chesty" of the town of Auburn were the first hunters to report bagging two deer early on opening day. They shot the animals practically right in their own backyard on their farm shortly after the season opened.

Three high school boys, Kon Sadownikow, Ray Wiedmeyer and "Buz" Nischke hunted over the opening week end in the Berlin area and all three returned with a deer. Nischke shot a 4 point buck Saturday, Wiedmeyer bagged a 4 pointer Saturday and Sadownikow killed a spiked buck Sunday.

Marvin and Mike Schmidt of here, Peter Strupp and friend of St. Lawrence, Bob Schmidt of Milwaukee and Richard Backhaus of Random Lake hunted around Tomahawk in Lincoln county where they joined a group from Tomahawk. Altogether the group bagged 4 deer and 3 bear. One buck was a 6 pointer and weighed 150 pounds. One bear weighed 200 pounds and the other two were cubs.

Roger Groeschel of here was in a party of five who hunted in Jackson county and shot three deer, Groeschel getting one of them.

Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Firks, Byron Dei and Bob Flynn spent the first week end in the north and returned with camp meat only.

Jake Blumer and two sons, in company with a fellow employee of one son, hunted at Montello over the opening week end and shot a deer on the party permit.

Hunting in the Laona area Jake Bruessel of Kewaskum shot a 10 point buck and also a spike buck on his party permit.

KIWANIS CLUB HONORS LOCAL CONSERVATION FARMERS



Conservation farming is the coming thing. The Kiwanis club of the village of Kewaskum really believes this. They believe it to the extent that they honored and recognized two farmers at their Monday night meeting Nov. 17.

Edmund Thull and Louis Oppenorth, both of R. 2, Kewaskum, were recognized for their outstanding work in soil conservation. They were given a plaque by the Kiwanis Club at their regular weekly meeting. Why were these two people recognized for their extensive conservation work? The overall picture shows that the population of this country is increasing at the rate of over two and one-half mil-

lion a year. We are losing a million acres of cultivatable land through organized air ports and highways each year. Many more million acres are being harmed through soil erosion and soil depletion. Presently, we have 3.1 acres of cropland per person. By the year 2,000 we expect to have 1.6 acres per person.

This tells us that conservation is necessary to maintain soil fertility in this county.

Louis Oppenorth was the first farmer in Washington county to have a basic conservation plan on his farm. He started out with 111 acres of contour strips, over a mile of terraces, 1,800 feet of grass waterways, over 40 acres of pasture renovation.

There were those who laughed at Louis as he started his conservation program, yet today the influence of his forward look has made itself felt on many neighboring farms.

Edmund Thull became a soil conservation cooperator a year ago. Today he has 70 acres of contour strips, has a managed woodlot, has done pasture renovation and has ¼ mile of grass waterways.

Edmund has served on the soil conservation advisory committee of Washington county and has been very influential in getting relatives and neighbors to accept and apply the conservation practices. His farm has been used as a class room for many groups in Washington county.

Conservation will improve and continue through the leadership of men like Oppenorth and Thull. It will also continue through the recognition of organizations such as the Kewaskum Kiwanis club as they recognize people who are doing some of this outstanding conservation work.

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

FACE SLINGER IN OPENING GAME AT HOME THIS SATURDAY NIGHT

Kewaskum's Land o' Lakes league defending champions got off on the right foot by easily trouncing Cedarburg there Sunday night in the opening game of the season, 102-78.

Led by big Don Meisenheimer, who had one of the best nights of his career with 38 points to run away with scoring honors, the Chevrolets led all the way with Cedarburg never threatening. Two new players on the team, brothers Ken and Bob Felix of St. Killian, did a very creditable job and scored 12 and 10 points respectively. Other top point makers were Augie Bilgo and Frank Krueger with 11 apiece, George Hanrahan with 10 and Bob Stenman with 8. Center J. Adams was top scorer for the losers with 21 points, followed by R. Andrews and P. Biederman with 12 each.
