## Death of Theodore R. Schmidt, Insurance Executive, Business And Civic Leader, on Monday

### Former Village President; Held Many Offices

Theodore R. Schmidt, 62, better known as "Ted" to his numerous friends and acquaintances, a prominent and widely known Kewaskum insurance officer and business and civic leader, died at his home on Monday morning, Jan. 19.

Vice-president and general manager of the Kewaskum Mutual Insurance company, he was in the insurance business in Kewaskum for 37 years and was a lifelong resident of the village. Ted held many insurance, civic, public and club offices and was a member of a number of organizations, and participated in sports activities proving his qualities of leadership, capability and high esteem in which he was held. Ted was well liked and will be greatly missed.

Mr. Schmidt was a graduate of Marquette university, Milwaukee, secretary of the Mutual Insurance Managers' association, past secretary and president of the Wisconsin Mutual Insurance Alliance, past president of the Kewaskum Kiwanis club, past lieutenant governor of the Kiwanis for the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District, Division 6, past president of the village of Kewaskum, past commander of Robert G. Romaine post 384 of the American Legion, member of the Knights of Columbus, West Bend Council 1964, member of the Holy Name society, past secretary and president of the Wisconsin Federation of Mutual Insurance Companies, past president of the West Bend Country Club, and manager of Qualified Risk Mutuals.

He was born in Kewaskum on Nov. 16, 1896, a son of the late Joseph and Catherine Schmidt. His marriage to Miss Marie Kress took place in St. Killian's church at Hartford.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Marjorie (Mrs. M. Bruce Koth) of Kewaskum and Rita (Mrs. Robert Ferris) of Cincinnati, Ohio; a son, Robert W., of Kewaskum; a sister, Miss Edna C. Schmidt of Kewaskum, and four grandchildren. A daughter, Harriet, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, Jan. 21, in Holy Trinity church, the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. Prior to the services the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home after 3 p. m. Tuesday.

## Worst Snowstorm In Years Here; Schools Closed

The worst snowstorm in several years hit this area and Wisconsin on Tuesday night and all day Wednesday when from 7 to 10 inches of snow fell and high winds piled up huge drifts. The storm ended Wednesday night and was followed by more sub-zero weather Thursday morning as residents began digging themselves out.

Many rural roads were drifted shut and impassable until opened by snowplow crews early Thursday. Main highways were kept open but deep snow made driving hazardous and many motorists became stalled. Some night shift workers were unable to reach their homes Wednesday night because of snow-blocked roads and other motorists had to stay over, being unable to reach their destinations.

Here in Kewaskum night shift workers at Regal Ware, Inc. were given an opportunity to take off of work at 8 p. m. to leave for home before the roads became impassable. The Kewaskum Community High school and public schools were closed Thursday. Holy Trinity school held classes but there was much absenteeism.

During the height of the storm Wednesday afternoon when village streets were not yet cleared, the hard-packed snow piles up causing many cars to become stuck in snowbanks. It was difficult for drivers to find a place to park their cars. Drivers attempting to keep their autos off the streets at night to make room for the snowplow crews couldn't get into their driveways or public parking lots.

Most meetings, sports events and other activities scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday were postponed.

The early morning North Western Railway mail train was delayed for hours and did not arrive in Kewaskum until after the noon hour. Rural carriers did not cover their routes until in the afternoon.

### OVERHEATED MOTOR CAUSES FIRE CALL

The fire department was called out at about 10:15 p. m. last Friday to the farm home owned by Wm. F. Schaefer in the town of Kewaskum, southeast of the village. 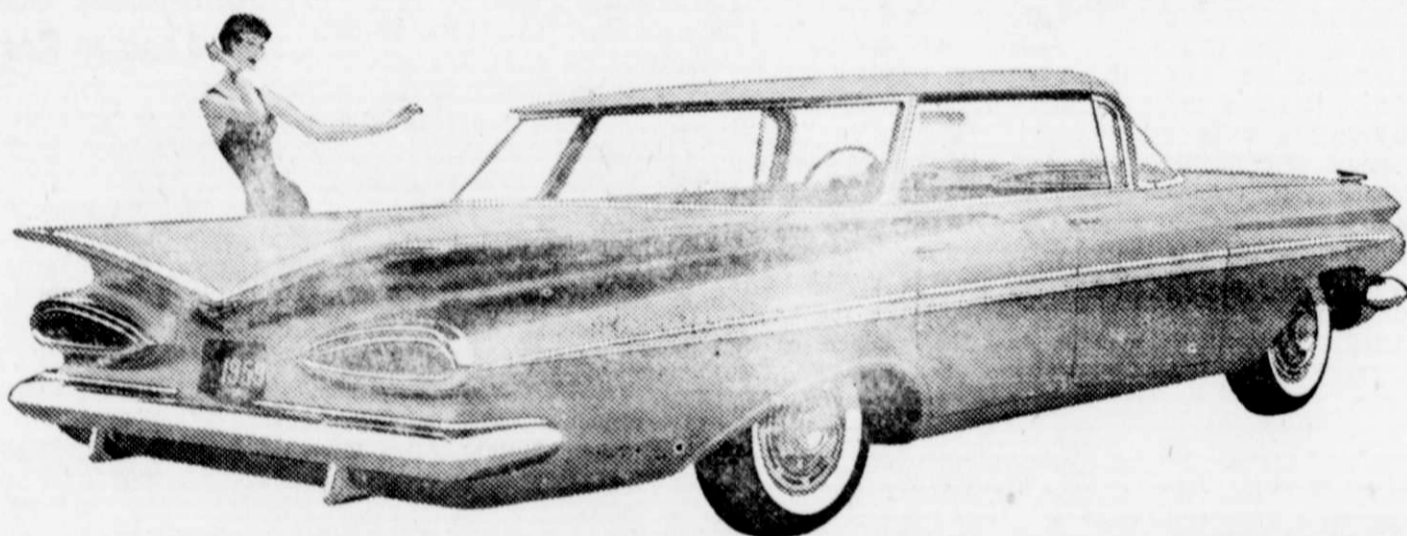

## 25 Years Ago

Word comes to this office that the state regional planning commission upon suggestion of federal officials, is working on a survey which might lead to the purchase of 32,000 acres in the Kettle Moraine district in Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties by the federal government for the use of a public park.

The Wisconsin Industrial Commission recently ruled that P. J. 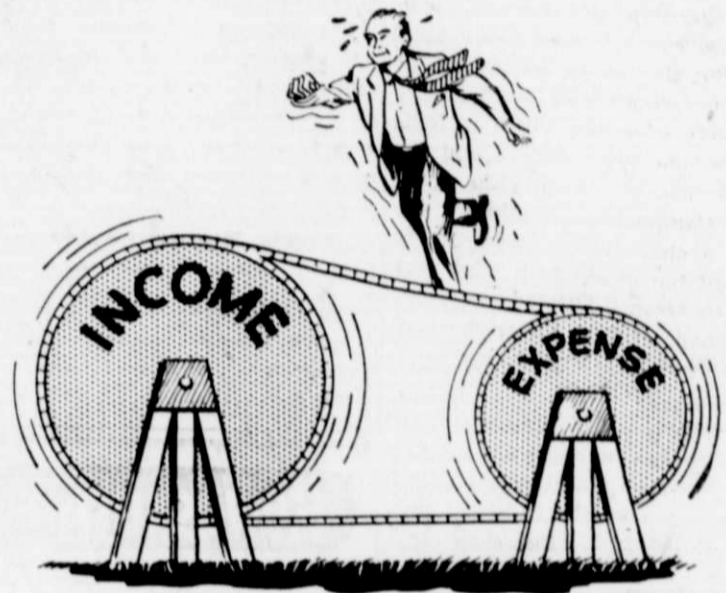
