Over \$700 Prizes, Alice in Dairyland, Governor Features

Plan now to attend Kewaskum Dairy Day to be held in the spacious high school gymnasium, agriculture room and shop and cafeteria on Saturday, Mar. 21. It will be one of the biggest events ever held here with celebrities and prominent speakers participating. The entire day's activities are all FREE so how can you afford to miss it?

Highlights of the day will feature newly elected Gov. Gaylord Nelson, who will speak; a personal appearance by Wisconsin's Alice in Dairyland, Miss Barbara Haslow, who will be making her first appearance in this area, and will crown the dairy queen; over \$700.00 in free door prizes to be given away, a home talent show, 25 attractive booths and displays by local merchants, who will also give away free gifts; a free noon dairy lunch of vegetarian beans, spaghetti, cheese, ice cream, milk, etc.; a dairy queen contest, a program for women, bands, entertainment and agricultural speakers.

Everyone is invited, from the country and villages and cities as well. There will be special entertainment for the children during the afternoon at the Kewaskum theatre where free movies will be shown starting at 1:30 p. m. An A-1 western film will be shown together with a comedy and several cartoons. Take the kids to the show

and then enjoy Dairy Day.

Over \$700.00 in prizes have already been donated and more are still coming in. Around 50 very valuable prizes will be given. A complete list of the prizes will be published in our next issue after they are all in. The entire program for the day will also be listed.

Dairy Day will begin at 11 a. m. and will continue throughout the afternoon and evening. The free noon dairy luncheon will be served in the cafeteria from 11:30 a. m. to 1 p. m. This will be followed by a concert by the high school band. The afternoon program will feature prominent speakers from the University of Wisconsin and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, including Dr. Jeurs, as well as County Agent Maurice Hovland. The main attraction of the afternoon will be the appearance of Gov. Nelson, who will speak briefly at 3 p. m. about the outlook in the agricultural business in Wisconsin. The speakers will have information for farmers on several subjects of extreme importance to the farming industry.

The booths and displays will be open continuously. Music by the Washington County 4-H band will open the evening program at 7 p. m., followed by a home talent show from 7:30 to 8:00. Incidentally more entrants are still needed for the talent show and anyone wishing to enter should contact Bernard Murray, ag instructor or Orv Behnke. Cash prizes will be awarded to the winners. Village President James D. Reigel and Business Association

President Jack Koehn will say a few words at 8:00 and at 8:15 Alice will crown the dairy queen. At 8:30 Mr. Murray will speak briefly and will be followed by announcement of the home talent winner. Selecting of the door prizes will provide the grand finale.

A special program for the women will be held in the afternoon in the cafeteria. A separate announcement on this program appears at the end of this item. The event is sponsored by the Business association, the FFA and FHA chapters of the high school.

Dairy Day will be a big community event and a very fine one.

Only 62 Vote Here; Hallows, Honeck Win

One of the lightest votes on record in recent years in the village was cast in Tuesday's judicial primary election. Only 62 voters went to the polls to mark ballots.

The two top vote getters in the village and Washington county, Justice E. Harold Hallows and former Atty. Gen. Stewart G. Honeck, Tuesday won the nomination for associate justice of the Wisconsin supreme court. Returns from 3,355 of the state's 3,423 precincts gave Hallows 59,887 votes, Honeck 40,943 and Bruno V. Bitker, a close third, 38,049.

Results in the state followed very closely the pattern set in the county and village. Hallows polled 541 votes and Honeck 422 in the county. In the village Hallows was high with 22 and Honeck got 19. Others followed in this order: Bitker 9, Willis E. Donley 4, Harry Holloway John E. Krueger and William S. Clark, two each, and Christ Alexopoulos 1.

In Washington county returns for the eight candidates were: Hallows 541, Honeck 422, Donley 268, Bitker 229, Holloway 186, Krueger 160, Clark 71 and Alexopoulos 26. The vote in the county totaled only 1,933.

The total vote in the town of Kewaskum was only 22.

The two winning candidates will seek election as associate justice of the Wisconsin state supreme court at the Apr. 7 election. The position pays \$17,500 a year and is for a 10 year term.

The production, "A Night on KBC," will be staged at 8 p. m. on Apr. 4 in the gymnasium.

8 More Inches of Snow Ties Up Area, Is Winter's Worst

Snow in this area isn't news any more but when a snowstorm hits like the one last Thursday and Friday, which was the most severe of the winter's many, it deserves "honorable mention."

Approximately 8 more inches of snow fell but as a result of 25 to 35 mile an hour winds and severe drifting, it was considerably higher in most areas. Add this to the couple of feet already blanketing the ground (to say nothing of the large amount which has melted) and it makes several feet of snow in many places.

Traffic was almost at a complete standstill during the height of the storm. Motorists were unable to see much farther ahead than the front of their cars and there were few who didn't become stalled. There were numerous accidents and many autos ran into snowbanks. Numerous cars and other vehicles were abandoned in snowdrifts on rural roads. Ice under the snow gave tires no traction and numerous cars required shoveling out and pushing.

Most schools closed but those in Kewaskum remained open, although the buses did not go out Friday and attendance was limited to village children. Some buses did not return from transporting pupils home Thursday evening until almost midnight. It is reported that one bus was stalled for five hours and some of the student passengers did not reach their homes until a late hour.

Many workers had difficulty getting to and returning from their jobs Thursday and by Friday only local employees were at work as much absenteeism was reported. Motorists were warned to stay off of highways unless it was extremely urgent. Many workers, truck drivers and others were marooned overnight and stayed at anyplace they could find.

All available snow plowing equipment was called out in the county and worked practically around the clock. Many county trunks and town roads were still snow blocked and were not plowed out until Saturday, Sunday and even Monday. Crews had to keep patrolling main highways continuously to keep them open and on many there was only one lane traffic. In many areas highway crews were unable to keep up with the storm.

Crews are still busy clearing snow from streets and it took until Saturday for them to win the battle in clearing outlying roads. Trains and buses ran late. Meetings and other activities were practically all cancelled.

25 Years Ago

Mr. and Mrs. Mathias Thull of the town of Farmington recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at St. Michael's church, St. Michaels.

The village board approved the appointment of the following election officers: Clerks of election—Edw. C. Miller and Val Peters; inspectors of election—Emil Backhaus, Frank Kudek and Frank Heppe; ballot clerks—Henry Ramthun and Fred Schleif.

The Kewaskum Creamery stockholders held their annual meeting and elected the following board of directors: Arthur T. Barlass, Chicago; Ben Nuzum and R. E. Shepard of Tomah and Henry Quade and John Muckerheide of Kewaskum. Officers elected were: President, Barlass; vice-president, Nuzum; secretary-treasurer, Quade. The company reported a very favorable year in spite of numerous milk strikes.

Saturday night at about midnight there were plenty of scrambled eggs scattered about the roadway on Hwy. 55, two miles north of the

village, near Kohn's Curve, when a truck loaded with about 15,000 dozen of eggs went off the road and capsized. The truck was damaged considerably but both occupants escaped injury.

While Mrs. Ervin Ramthun, residing just east of the village, teacher of the Jt. School Dist. No. 5 of the towns of Wayne and Theresa, 6 miles west of the village on Hwy. 28, was nearing her school Monday morning she noticed smoke penetrating through the roof of the building. She drove speedily to the Mrs. Katherine Schmitt home a short distance away and called the Theresa fire dept. but they would not respond unless a school board member OKed the call. Then a call was placed with Harry Schaefer, chief of the Kewaskum dept. who sent the chemical engine. Before

firemen arrived the building was enveloped in flames and was completely destroyed, only the brick walls remaining. The fire started in the attic presumably from a defective chimney. Paul Schmitt, a neighbor, as usual started the fire in the furnace at about 7 a. m. and everything was all right when he left the school. The school was built in 1913-14 and Albert Opgenorth of here was the mason. Enrollment at the school was 5 pupils.

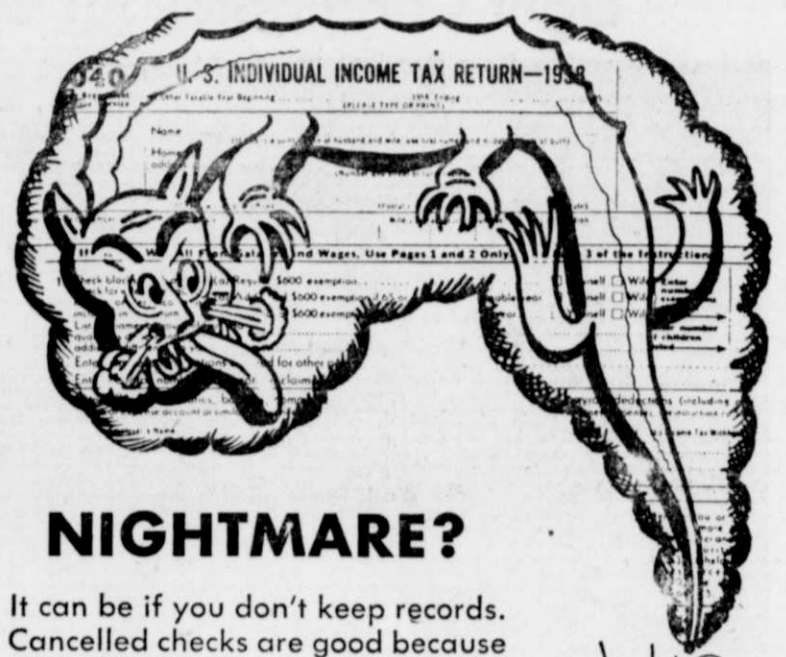

Funeral services were held Saturday at 10 a. m. at the Mueller funeral home, Grafton. Burial was in St. Mary's cemetery, Saukville.

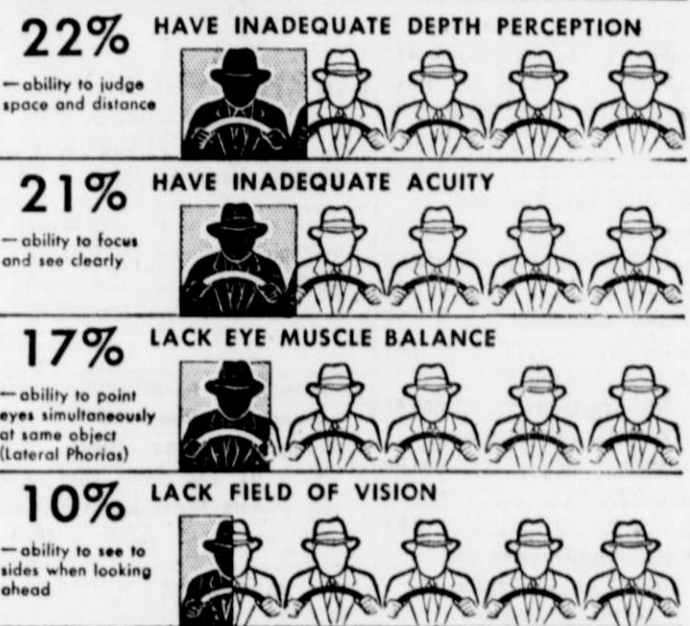

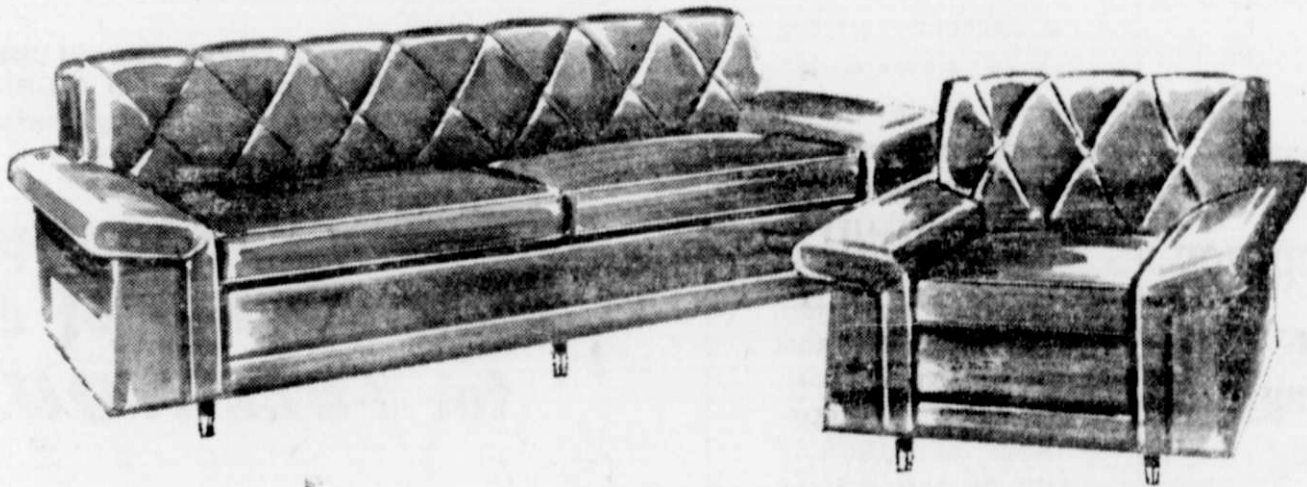

Because of the blizzard, snow blocked roads and treacherous driving conditions, Dr. Edwards notified the county sheriff's office. The sheriff's department, in turn, notified highway officials of Washington and Fond du Lac counties and highway crews of both counties as well as West Bend crews all joined in opening the way for the safe arrival of the ambulance bearing the expectant mother at St. Joseph's hospital.

The ambulance bearing the patient arrived at Dr. Edwards' office at 3:15 a. m. and the doctor followed the snow plow and ambulance in his car. All arrived safely at the hospital at 3:30 a. m.

The baby, an 8 pound, 2 ounce girl, was born at 4:44 a. m. The baby, mother, doctor, ambulance crew, highway crews and sheriff's department are all doing fine after the ordeal. The girl is the fourth child born to Mr. and Mrs. Meyer who reside on a farm on the outskirts of Campbellsport.

Tomato Crab Casserole

- 1 1/2 quart casserole 4-6 servings
- 350° preheated oven, 45 minutes
- 2 1/2 cups thin spaghetti, broken
- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1 can cream of tomato soup
- 1 6 1/2 ounce can crabmeat, flaked
- 1 1/2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 1/4 teaspoon marjoram
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Buttered bread crumbs

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender, about 10 minutes. Drain. Mix evaporated milk, tomato soup, flaked crabmeat, 1 cup of the shredded cheese, green pepper, onion, and seasonings. Mix in the spaghetti. Pour into a buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole. Top with the remaining 1/2 cup shredded cheese and the buttered crumbs and bake in a preheated 350° oven for 45 minutes.
