## 200 Hikers Meet Here For Ice Age Park Tour Through Moraine Area

Ranging in age from 4 to 74 years, around 200 residents of Wisconsin met in Kewaskum Sunday morning to take part in a hike through the rugged Kettle Moraine area northeast of this village.

More than 75 cars converged on the village at 10:30 a. m. and created a minor traffic problem in handling the vehicles. Chief of Police Roland Pledl assisted in lining up the autos for the motorcade to Butler lake where the hike began.

The tour, the first "Ice Age National Park" hike held to stimulate interest in the project to establish a national park in Wisconsin, was organized by Atty. Raymond T. Zillmer of Milwaukee.

Leading the hike was Henry S. Reuss, Democratic Milwaukee congressman and author of a bill to establish a national park in Wisconsin. Included in the proposed park are inter-lobate moraines, terminal moraines, eskers, kames, drumlins, kettle holes and outwash plains, most of which were viewed by the group Sunday.

Clyde T. Smith of Mauthe lake, state area forester, met and accompanied the group, which he said was the largest that had ever taken the particular hike outlined for Sunday's trip. The hiking proved to be difficult over the rugged terrain. Although the distance traversed was only about 4 miles, it seemed much longer because of the rough going.

From Butler lake the group followed a marked trail along the southern section of the Parnell Esker, a long ridge which stretches in a meandering fashion between deep kettle holes and watery marshes. It is considered the longest esker route in this country.

The hikers ate a picnic lunch along the way, following which various talks were given by leaders of the hike. Representative Reuss said he had been assured by National Park Service officials that Wisconsin may expect an answer in October as to whether it will get an Ice Age National Park.

Atty. Zillmer explained the glacial geology of the region. Stanley Polachek, retiring president of the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology, said more than 100 different species of birds have been identified in the Kettle Moraine area. He warned that if Wisconsin does not preserve these areas, it will lose this bird life.

Hikers participating came from as far south as Kenosha, from the west to Madison and to the north from Wausau. Many Milwaukeeans were in the group.

Postmaster Harry E. Koch reminds post office patrons that postal service will be curtailed on Saturday, May 30, in observance of Memorial Day. There will be no

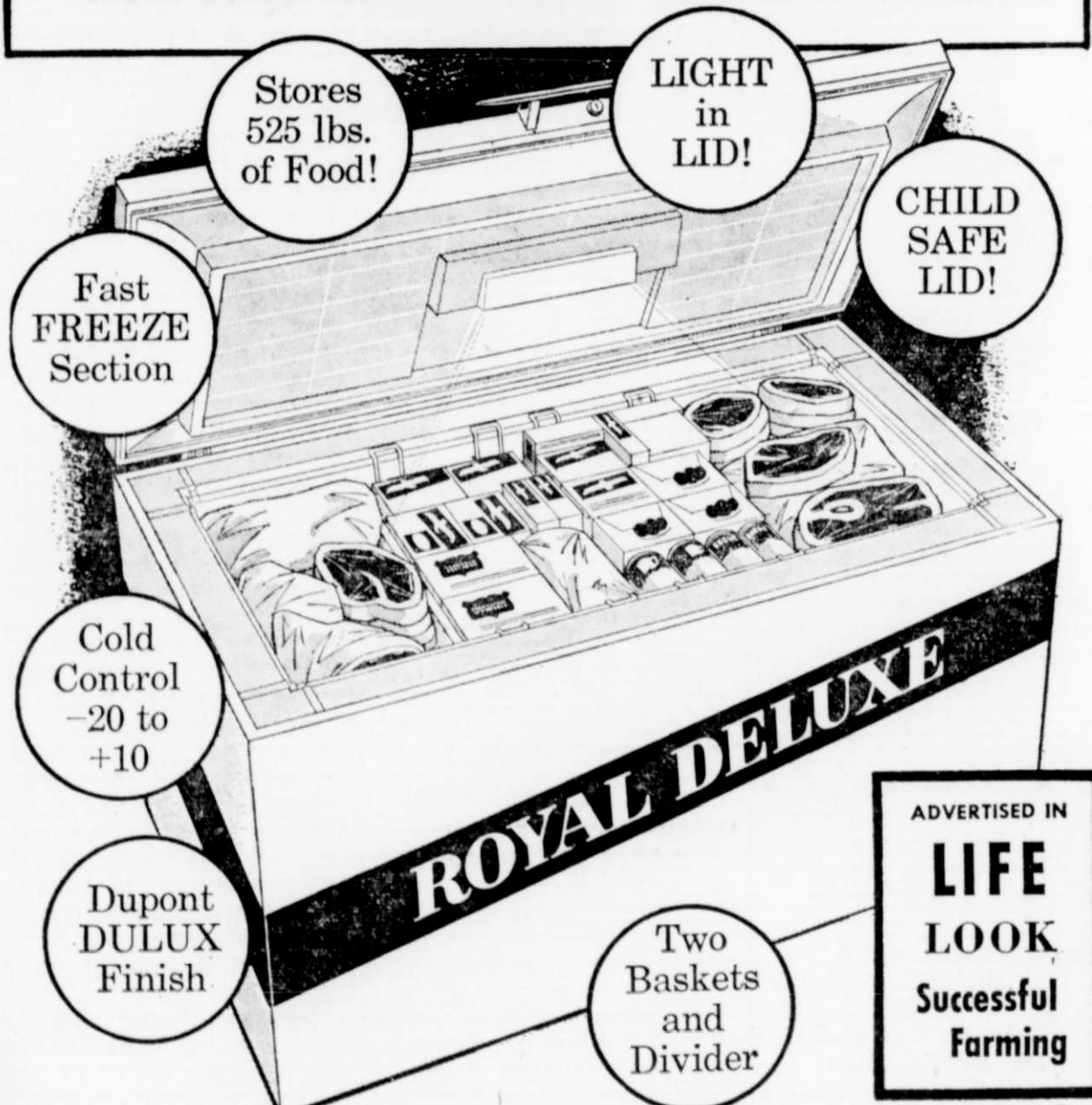

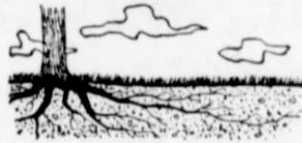
