Firemen's Tourney at Barton This Week End

THREE DAY PICNIC EVENT TO OPEN FRIDAY NIGHT; CONTESTS SATURDAY

The Badger Firemen's association annual tournament is held each year in the home town of one of the member departments and this year's event will be staged in Barton. Firemen from most of the 20 some departments of the association will be present at the Barton picnic to be held this Friday evening, Saturday and Sunday, June 19-21, to participate in the tournament contests Saturday and picnic parade Sunday.

The contests are scheduled at 3:30 p. m. and again at 6 p. m. Saturday. Kewaskum will compete in the contests and the participating firemen have been practicing for the various events. Visiting firemen, including Kewaskum, will also march in the big picnic parade at 1 p. m. Sunday.

Tournament contests will consist of individual hose coupling races and individual bucket and ladder climbing contests at 3:30 p. m. and the team events consisting of relay coupling races and a four man hose layout contest at 6 p. m. Prizes range from \$25 to \$10 and \$5 offered in team events and from \$15 to \$4 in the individual contests. About a dozen departments are expected to participate in the races and plenty of competition and excitement is anticipated.

McKenna's Rides and Amusements will be present to provide fun and entertainment. In addition to the carnival rides, firemen's contests and other events, there will be plenty of amusements, food and refreshments.

Second Coat of Asphalt Laid on Hwy. 45 Project

Work on the paving of Hwy. 45 from Barton northward to Kewaskum is going ahead at a rapid pace. Workers for the Rasmussen Construction Co. of Oshkosh completed laying the second coat of hot-mix asphalt on the highway this week and will begin laying the final finishing coat shortly.

When the roadway is completed, a splendid new highway will be provided for motorists between Barton and Kewaskum. It is hoped to have the entire project completed in time for the July 4 holiday traffic.

Highway workers are also improving the shoulders of the road and are busy in Barton preparing the roadbed for widening and paving. Traffic can travel over the road shortly after the hot-mix is laid and the highway is being kept open.

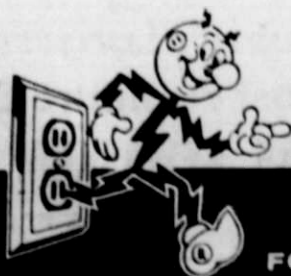
