Seefeldt Elected Vice-President of State 4-H Council

ONE OF EIGHT ELECTED FOR TWO-YEAR TERM AT U. OF W.

The campus of the University of Wisconsin was the scene of another State 4-H Club Week from June 15-18. Among the eleven delegates attending from Washington county was Aldwin Seefeldt, son of Alfred Seefeldt, Kewaskum.

State Club Week is an annual event held for the purpose of recognizing outstanding 4-H leadership, opening new areas of interest, widening horizons, and challenging 4-H members with decision-making facts. Much time is spent to develop a better understanding of the importance of leadership training and education in preparing for future tasks and living.

The theme of this year's club week was "Preparing Today for Tomorrow," a common interest career exploration. A great variety of speakers, including Governor Gaylord Nelson, devoted themselves to the explanation of career areas and the importance of getting an early start in the field that is chosen. Many references were made to the fact that tomorrow will come sooner than one thinks and that career choice and preparations for that career can not be made too soon.

This was the third time that Seefeldt attended State Club Week. In 1956, he attended to study the woodworking project and last summer he attended as a member of the state 4-H Club band.

This year Seefeldt, who is president of the 4-H Junior Leaders and Older Youth Council of Washington county, represented the county at the meetings of the State 4-H Junior Leaders' association. The purpose of this association is to give junior leaders within the state a chance to meet together for inspiration, exchange of experiences and training in leadership. This group also elects the State Junior Leaders Council.

Aldwin has been a 4-Her for 5 years and has carried the junior leader project for 3 years. These qualifications made him eligible for membership on the State 4-H Junior Leaders Council to which he was elected for a two year term. Aldwin, along with Miss Barbara Rynders of Racine county, represents District 8 on the council. District 8 is composed of Washington, Ozaukee, Dodge, Jefferson, Walworth, Waukesha, Milwaukee and Racine counties. Upon being elected to the council of 16 members, Aldwin was elected vice-president of the group, a term to last one year.

The major responsibilities of the State Junior Leaders Council are to assist with appropriate functions of State 4-H Club Week and be ready to serve as official state 4-H representatives at other events such as State Fair, Farm and Home Week and other youth functions. The council may also serve in an advisory capacity concerning 4-H projects, activities and events.

Seefeldt said he is very grateful for the position bestowed upon him. He realizes that it is a position of very great responsibility, but that the experience it will render unto him will be invaluable to him in

Beaver Dam Youth Drowns at Mauthe Lake on Sunday

KEWASKUM RESCUE SQUAD ASSISTS IN RECOVERY, WORKS OVER VICTIM

Leslie David Huettl, 18, of R. 1, Beaver Dam, one of three Dodge county residents who drove to Mauthe lake seven miles northeast of Kewaskum for a few hours of swimming fun Sunday afternoon, drowned in the lake about mid-afternoon.

According to Fond du Lac county authorities Huettl was swimming with his companions about 3 p. m. when he dove into the lake and never came to the surface. Described as having been a good swimmer, the youth apparently suffered from cramps. Authorities who investigated said the group was swimming in about 25 to 30 feet of water outside the protected beach area. Huettl's body was recovered about two hours later.

Alarmed when the youth did not come to the surface, his companions notified park authorities who called the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad and notified Fond du Lac county authorities. Members of the rescue squad sped to the scene in the Kewaskum equipment truck and ambulance and assisted in the operation to recover the body.

Huettl's body was recovered in approximately 25 feet of water by Walter Ormann, a member of the West Bend rescue squad, who was at the lake at the time, in a boat owned by a Milwaukeean, Norman Laskey. Efforts to revive him proved futile. The local rescue squad members worked over the body until a Campbellsort physician pronounced him dead. Members of the Mauthe lake park patrol, the Fond du Lac county highway patrol, Kewaskum rescue squad and other volunteers all aided in the search for the youth. It was the first drowning of the year in Fond du Lac county.

Huettl had gone to the lake with Frederick Nell, 27, R. 1, Juneau, a farmer for whom the youth worked, and William Lindert, 15, Beaver Dam. Coroner Frank H. Decker of Fond du Lac county said that Huettl swam out beyond a roped off area. His companions said they saw him go under once but thought he was fooling. They swam to shore believing he was headed there also. A lifeguard said he saw the youth go under but could not locate the boy.

Firemen Win \$56 At Badger Tourney

Kewaskum firemen made out very well by winning a total of \$56.00 in prize money in the various contests and parade at the Badger Firemen's association annual tournament at Barton over the week end.

In the contests held Saturday afternoon and evening Barton, the host department, won top prize money with \$74. Germantown was second with \$61, West Bend third with \$58, Kewaskum fourth with \$41, Grafton fifth with \$12.50, Newburg sixth with \$10, and Mequon seventh with \$8. Kewaskum most likely would have won more prize money but some of the contestants who had practiced for the events failed to show up for the afternoon contests.

Top winners in Sunday's parade were West Bend with \$30, Slinger \$25, Boltonville \$20, Newburg \$18, Kewaskum \$15 (with 27 firemen participating), Cedarburg \$12 and Germantown, Grafton, Random Lake and Mequon each \$3.35.

This year's races marked the fourth time in a row that West Bend has won the four man hose coupling contest but they were hard pressed by Kewaskum in winning at Barton. The Kewaskum team of Buddy Perkins, Augie Bilgo, Roger Reindl and Harry Heinecke placed second in this event, losing out by only three seconds to West Bend.

In the Individual Hose Coupling contest Kewaskum was prevented from winning when the hose coupling was dropped in sand before the start of the race, resulting in the nozzle turning on too hard.

In the Individual Bucket and Ladder Climbing contest Lee Fellenz, Kewaskum, placed fourth good for \$6. Fellenz was a last second replacement in this contest for the regular contestants who failed to show up.

In the 4 Man Hose Layout Kewaskum placed second good for \$20 with a time of 1:31.8.

In the Relay Coupling race Kewaskum was fourth and won \$15, time 43.5.

WAU-BUN COUNCIL GIRLS TO LEAVE FOR NATIONAL ROUNDUP TUESDAY

Tuesday will be the beginning of a once-in-a-lifetime adventure for 16 Senior Girl Scouts from Wau-Bun Girl Scout Council for that is the day that they leave for the National Senior Girl Scout Roundup at Colorado Springs, Colo.

The girls will leave Fond du Lac at 8:03 a. m. for Chicago, where they will join a special train bound for Colorado. The girls, selected for this opportunity in December, have worked hard training for the event since their selection.

The roundup will be the largest gathering of teen-age girls ever held in the United States. More than 7,500 girls will come from 50 states, all U. S. territories, and more than 20 countries.

Twenty special Girl Scout trains will bring girls across continental

United States to Colorado Springs. Although the roundup officially opens on July 3, half of the campers, including Wau-Bun's sixteen girls, will begin to arrive on the morning of July 1. For the next 48 hours hundreds and thousands of teenage girls will be pouring into Colorado Springs and the Roundup site.

Upon arrival the girls immediately go into action as they start building their city of 6,000 tents. Each patrol will have approximately 2,000 square feet to pitch its five tents, four for sleeping and one an outdoor kitchen.

Several special events, including the first official flag-raising of the 49-star American flag anywhere in the U. S. A. on July 4th, will highlight the activities at the encampment.

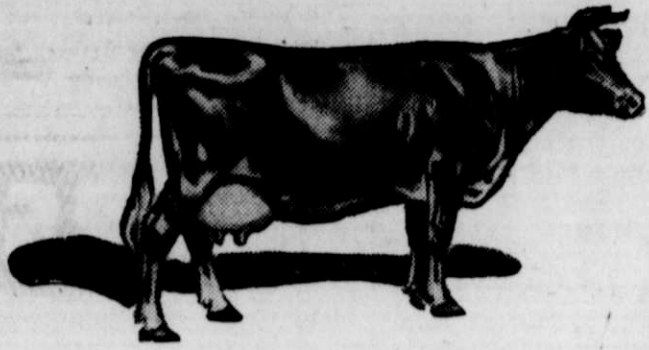

The proposal of the T. R. Schmidt Agency for liability insurance on the village's motorized equipment was accepted by the Board.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by J. Schwind and duly carried, the application of Russell A. Kohl for a Class "B" fermented malt beverage and intoxicating liquor license for the period of July 1, 1959, to June 30, 1960, was approved and the commissioner was authorized to

issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

Upon motion made, seconded and duly carried, the Board adjourned subject to call.

ELEGANT DISH EASY ON POCKET BOOK



New York, New York — As every hostess has discovered when entertaining, economy and elegance are seldom compatible. The presence of one usually means the absence of the other. Usually, but not always, for happily there are exceptions to this rule like so many others. Perhaps the most delectable of all such culinary contradictions is Crepes Montmarte, a luscious, luxurious-tasting main course made from a surprisingly inexpensive recipe. In appearance

alone it would tempt the most jaded gourmet at a Lucullan banquet, and its low budget appeals to the thrifty streak which lies semi-dormant in even the most expansive hostess.

Crepes Montmarte is a cosmopolitan dish which combines food favorites of four different countries. Its mainstay is canned salmon, a product of our Pacific Northwest, with its delicate pink meat blended into ricotta, the mild, creamy cheese from Italy. The French fillip is the crepes

themselves and the Russian touch is the caviar, red in this instance instead of the more costly black variety, topped with sour cream to create an international delight.

Quick, easy, elegantly economical, here is an ideal idea for the budget-minded hostess in a hurry.

CREPES MONTMARTE

12 very thin pancakes or crepes
1 pound ricotta cheese
A 7 1/2 oz. can salmon, drained
3 tablespoons butter
Red caviar
Sour Cream

Combine ricotta and salmon and beat until smooth. Put a heaping tablespoon in the center of each pancake and roll up like a jelly roll. To serve, heat the butter in a chafing dish or frying pan and in it saute the pancake rolls for a few minutes on each side. Top each with a teaspoon of red caviar and serve with sour cream. Serves 6.

CREPES

1/2 cup unsifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup milk

In a mixing bowl combine flour and salt. Stir in eggs mixed with the milk. Strain the batter through a sieve into a large measuring cup or pitcher. Heat a small iron frying pan, about 6 inches in diameter. For each crepe melt about 1/2 teaspoon butter in the pan and as soon as it begins to brown pour in about 2 tablespoons of the batter. Swirl the pan so that the batter coats the bottom evenly. Cook until batter sets and browns. Turn the crepe to brown the other side. Turn out on a clean towel to cool. Makes 12 crepes.
