County Assessors Competent at Job

Nearly one-half of the assessors in Washington county have been taking the assessment for more than five years and are trained in appraising rural real estate.

Joseph Klinka, West Bend; William Krause, Cedarburg; Ed. Melius, Jackson; Alois Neuburg, Allenton; Andrew Noller, Colgate, and Franklin Scharrer, West Bend, each has had five or more years of experience in appraising rural real estate as well as gathering data for the Department of Agriculture.

Other assessors who make annual calls on Washington county farmers to evaluate real estate and collect agricultural data are: Robert Cleary, Hartford; Arnold Hawig, Campbellsport; George Hiller, Sr., West Bend; Raymond Horst, Sr., Hartford; John Muckerheide, Kewaskum; Harold Schmit, Germantown, and Andrew Vogelsang, West Bend.

Many long time trends in agriculture have been mapped out by using the data furnished by the local township assessors for the past 42 years. Washington county assessors counted 2 per cent fewer cows on farms in 1958 than in 1957 when they made their annual farm statistics enumeration for the Wisconsin Crop Reporting Service. Records show that last year milk production per cow had increased 5 percent in the county.

Although, the primary job of the assessor is to gather real estate information for tax purposes, they are also required by law to collect agricultural data for the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture. State and federal laws prohibit making individual farm statistics reports available to the public. Individual figures are kept confidential and only totals are published.

25 Years Ago

The Rev. Aloysius Fellenz, one of Holy Trinity parish's own sons, celebrated his first solemn high mass at the church. Fr. Fellenz was elevated to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Archbishop Samuel A. Stritch, D. D. at St. John's Cathedral, Milwaukee, Saturday. Fr. Fellenz is a son of John Fellenz and was born at Kewaskum Oct. 6, 1906.

Edwin Morgenroth of Kewaskum, member of Phi Delta Kappa honorary educational society, is among 30 members of University of Southern California scholastic honorary societies honored at a special annual scholarship day program held on the U.S.C. campus.

Three men were arrested and one of the largest alcohol distilleries ever uncovered in Fond du Lac county was seized when 7 federal agents invaded an abandoned farm 3 miles north of Dundee. The district in which the still was seized was one of the "wettest" in eastern Wisconsin during prohibition days. Stills were found in the vicinity of Dundee frequently and on one occasion alleged distillers engaged a federal agent in a gun battle. Lane Maloney, veteran of more than a score of raids in the county, led the raiders. The barn is located just off Hwy. 67 at the north end of Long lake. The feds found 78,000 gallons of mash in 10 vats of 7,800 gallons capacity each and 7,000 gallons of alcohol.

YELLOW BUTTER CAKE



As delicate as the first daffodils of the season, is this golden Yellow Butter Cake with its Creamy Butter Frosting.

Yellow Butter Cake is simple to make too. As simple as the conventional method of mixing a cake. First cream the butter and sugar thoroughly, then add the eggs. Yellow Butter Cake
 1/2 cup butter
 1 1/4 cups sugar
 3 eggs
 2 cups sifted cake flour
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 cup milk
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Cream butter. Add sugar and mix well. Add eggs one at a

time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour with salt and baking powder and add alternately with the milk. Add vanilla. Pour into two buttered and floured 8-inch round cake pans and bake in a preheated 375° oven for 25 minutes.

Butter Frosting
 1/2 cup butter
 1 1-lb. package confectioners' sugar, sifted
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon milk or cream

Cream the butter. Add 1/2 of the sifted confectioners' sugar. Cream thoroughly. Add salt, milk or cream, and vanilla and blend. Add egg and beat until smooth. Add rest of confectioners' sugar and beat until smooth and fluffy. If frosting is desired a little thinner, more milk or cream may be added.

Lemon Butter Frosting
 Omit vanilla. Blend in 2 tablespoons lemon juice in place of milk or cream. Add grated rind of 1 lemon.

Orange Butter Frosting
 Omit vanilla. Add 1 tablespoon orange juice in place of milk or cream. Blend in grated rind of orange.

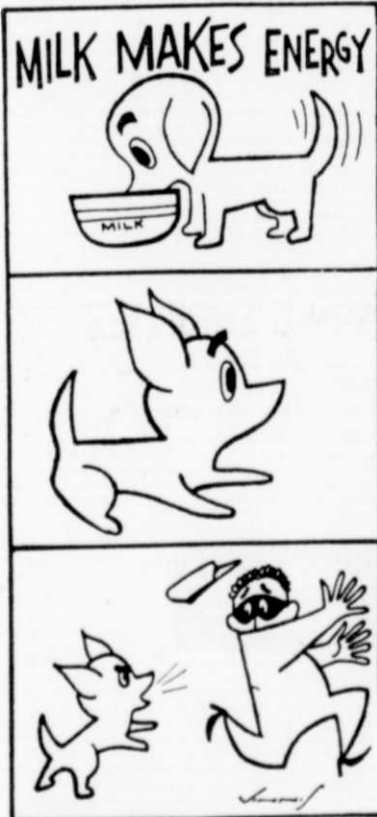

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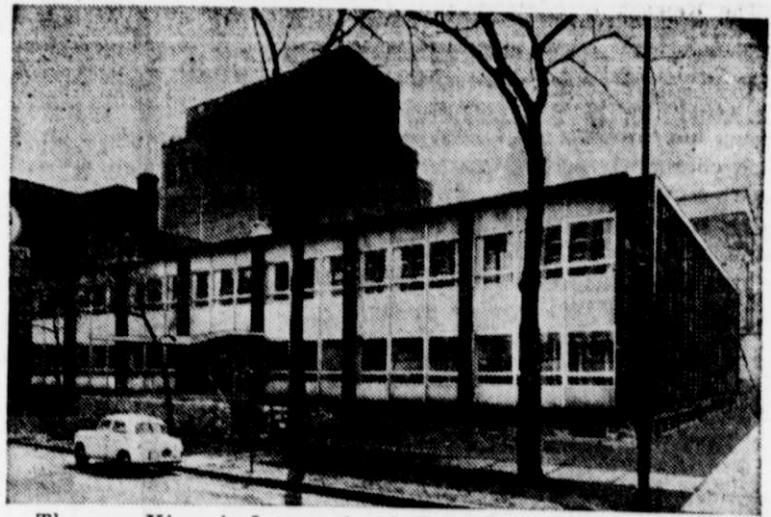

When the kiddies are busy playing outdoors in the summertime, a nutritious easy lunch served on the back porch is most appropriate. With an attractive lunch built around hot dogs and cheese toasties, orange chip cookies, and plenty of frothy, cold milk, they'll eagerly scamper in from play.

Since cheese is a universal favorite and hot dogs are a child's delight, the combination of the two in a sandwich spread is bound to draw enthusiastic squeals.

Besides being good in all kinds of sandwiches, cheese shows its versatility as an appetite teaser, a nourishing main dish, a dinner finale, and a between-meal snack. And it's so convenient to keep plenty of cheese on hand for use from morning to midnight.

Cold milk is the logical beverage choice for the children's lunch. At least four glasses of milk a day are recommended for a child to build and maintain his body in a healthy condition. The calcium contained in milk is especially needed for little 'tots' bones and teeth.

The adequate amount of butter used in the orange chip cookies of the lunch shown here is the ingredient that especially enriches them and gives a pleasing flavor. Because of its natural flavor and natural vitamins, butter is unmatched for cooking and for use as a table spread.

ORANGE CHIP COOKIES
5 doz. cookies
375° 10-12 minutes
1 cup butter

½ cup granulated sugar
½ cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons orange juice
1 tablespoon grated orange rind
1 egg
2½ cups sifted flour
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon soda
2 ounces semi-sweet chocolate, grated

Cream butter, granulated sugar, and brown sugar. Add orange juice, orange rind, and egg and mix well. Sift the flour, soda, and salt together. Add to the orange mixture. Then blend in the grated chocolate. Shape into three rolls about 1½ inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper, and store in the refrigerator overnight or until thoroughly chilled. When ready to bake, slice thinly and place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375° for 10-12 minutes or until browned.

HOT DOG AND CHEESE TOASTIES

2 cups spread
½ pound sharp Cheddar cheese
½ pound hot dogs, cooked
½ cup catsup
1 egg
1 tablespoon pickle relish
2 teaspoons prepared mustard

Put cheese and hot dogs through a food grinder, using a medium coarse blade. Mix with catsup and cook over very low heat until the cheese melts. Add the beaten egg and cook 2 minutes more. Remove from heat, add relish and mustard. Spread on buttered toasted buns and serve at once or spread on buns and broil for 2-3 minutes. Top with a little more grated cheese.

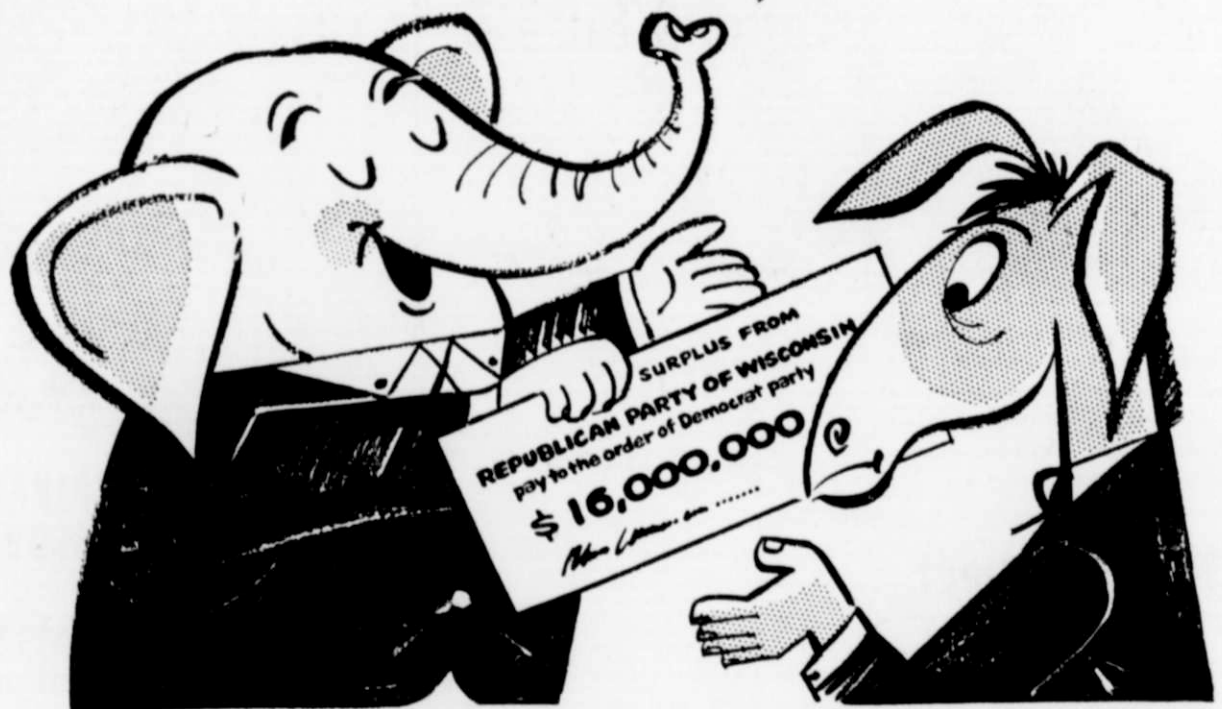

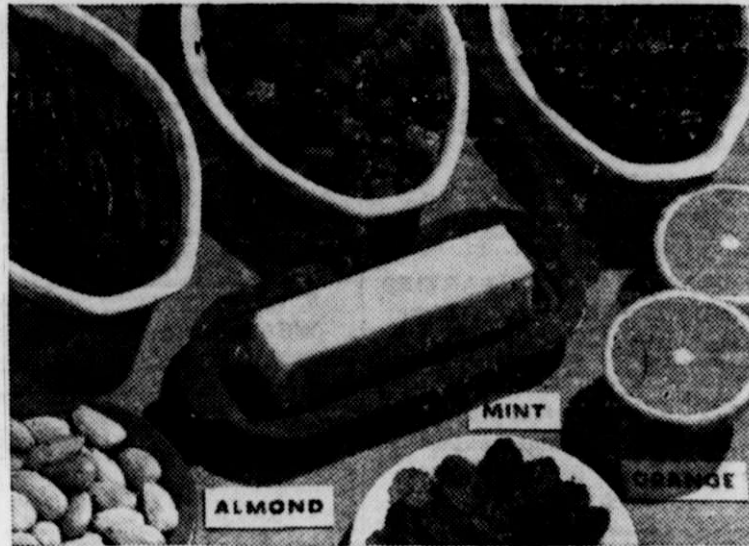

Add Zest to Vegetables with Flavored Butter



Butter alone goes with vegetables just as salt goes with pepper, but when the butter is lightly flavored with other ingredients, it's an even better taste treat. Flavored butters give a lift to everyday vegetables which makes eating them a new, exciting adventure.

There is a variety of ingredients that can be added to butter to make its combination with vegetables different and especially interesting. For green beans and other green vegetables, chopped salted almonds and a small amount of lemon juice are added to ¼ cup of butter. Beets are

good with an orange butter containing both orange juice and grated orange rind. Mint butter flavoring, made with melted butter and chopped fresh mint leaves, makes either peas or carrots alone taste light and spring-like as well as the combination peas-carrots dish.

These are only a few suggestions for the use of butter and other flavorings. The ingenious cook can add many others that will make vegetables a real meal-time treat.

FLAVORED BUTTERS FOR VEGETABLES

MINT: To ¼ cup melted butter, add 1 tablespoon chopped fresh mint leaves. Serve on peas, carrots, or a combination of the two.

ORANGE: To ¼ cup melted butter, add 3 tablespoons orange juice and 1 tablespoon grated orange rind. Simmer for a few minutes over low heat and serve hot over beets.

ALMOND: To ¼ cup melted butter, add 2 tablespoons chopped salted almonds and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Serve with green beans, Brussel sprouts or broccoli.
