## Turkey Shoot Is Best Ever Held; Over 3,000 Attend

Officials of the Kewaskum Kiwanis club evaluated their 7th annual live turkey shoot held at the Bar-N Dude Ranch on Sunday as "the best we've ever had." The shoot, which becomes "bigger and better" every year that it is held, financially as well as in attendance and entertainment, attracted more than 3,000 persons to the Bar-N grounds, located six miles northeast of the village.

Profits from the turkey shoot, expected to exceed \$2,000, go to the Kewaskum Youth and Community Benefit Funds. It is the Kiwanis club's major fund raising activity for the year.

Rain early in the morning threatened the success of the shoot but the weather cleared by the time the event started. The sun shone and it turned out to be a warm, ideal day for the affair, which continued until sundown. Hundreds of persons poured in and out of the grounds all day and at times parking of the many cars became a problem. But the Kewaskum auxiliary policemen on the job did a fine job of handling the traffic.

Close to 300 turkeys, in the bunkers, almost 50 more than last year, were hit and taken home by the shooters alone, not to mention the poultry won in the other marksmanship events. Another popular activity was the trout fishing. Many whoppers were hauled in from the pond with prizes being given for the largest ones caught. Other activities receiving busy attention were the cross bow, deer target and trap shooting contests, along with a new "sausage shoot."

The Wambull Indian dancers, in full costume and make-up, made five performances during the day and were well received. The group set up their tepees and camped on the grounds. Tasty bratwurst and other hot and cold lunch and refreshments were sold on the grounds.

Members of the committee that headed the annual shoot included James D. Reigle, Bruce Koth, Dr. R. G. Edwards, K. A. Honeck Jr. and Harry Koch. They praised the work of the auxiliary police, Boy Scouts, wives of the Kiwanians and all others who worked, especially the men who helped in the bunkers. The club wishes to thank everyone who helped and attended to make the event a grand success.

### Reuss to Speak at West Bend Dinner October 3

Congressman Henry S. Reuss, Democrat of Milwaukee, will address a Washington County Conservation dinner at West Bend on Saturday, Oct. 3.

Reuss will discuss progress toward the establishment of the proposed Ice Age National Park in Wisconsin, and other aspects of conservation legislation.

The dinner, sponsored by the West Bend-Barton Sportsmen's club, will be at 7 p. m. at St. John's Lutheran church in West Bend.

In his five years in Congress, Reuss has been a leader in the cause of conservation. He sponsored legislation to expand the federal wildlife refuge acquisition program which will go into operation this year. He fought to end subsidized farm drainage harmful to wildlife. He has supported ex-

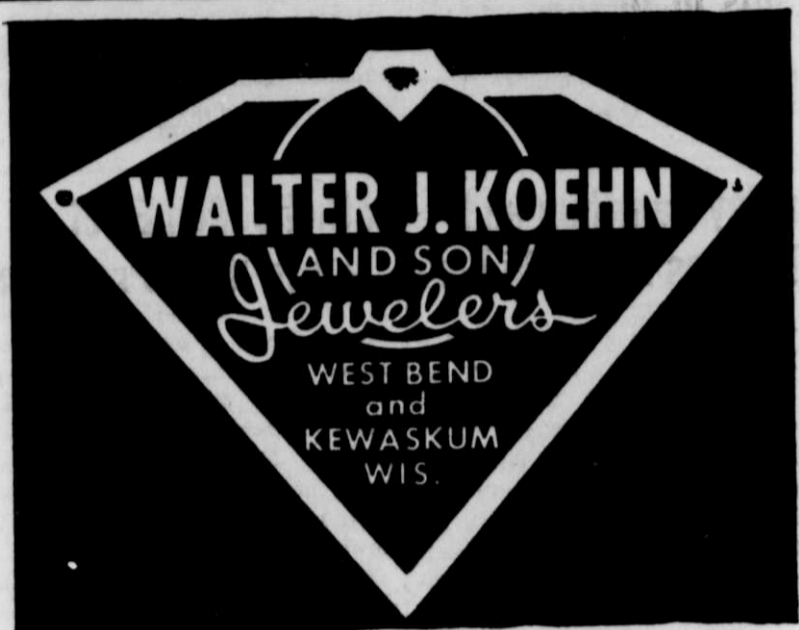
pansion of the federal-local water pollution control program, and is now sponsoring legislation calling for new federal research to protect the nation's water resources from pollution. Most recently, Reuss obtained approval of a \$60,000 appropriation for water control facilities at the Horicon Marsh National Wildlife Refuge needed to restore the Horicon's waterfowl production.

The Sport Fishing Institute, Washington, D. C. estimates that fishermen will spend more than \$98,000,000 in Wisconsin this year. It points out that Wisconsin is fourteenth among states in total population and ninth in the sale of resident fishing licenses and first in the sale of nonresident fishing licenses. The institute estimates that 117,000 youngsters and oldsters fish in Wisconsin without a license.

### Indian 11 Rolls Over Rams in Opener, 27-0

The Kewaskum Community High school Indians opened the 1959 football season very impressively with an easy 27-0 victory over Random Lake Friday night in a non-conference tuneup game played on the Rams' gridiron. In the one-sided contest, Coach Ernie Mitchell's gridders outgained Random by a huge margin, 365 yards to 60, including 148 yards passing.

Quarterback Kons Sadownikow did his usual good job of directing the Indian 11 and appeared in mid-season form with his fine passing. His tosses were right on the target repeatedly and Kewaskum could have run up a larger margin of victory except for several of his

passes right in the receivers' arms being dropped, one of them directly on the goal line.

Another veteran, Norm "Butch" Rodenkirch, was the big scoring gun. He reeled off a 43-yard dash early in the game to give the Indians a 6-0 lead. Sadownikow immediately kicked the extra point to make it 7-0. He made good on 3 out of 4 points after touchdown.

In the second quarter Ken Johnson cracked over from the two for the winners' second score. Kons hit Don Theusch with an 18-yard aerial shortly before the half to bring the count to 20-0 at the intermission. In the second half Rodenkirch climaxed more overhead success with a five-yard touchdown plunge. The point after made it 27-0 to end the scoring.

Although it was the lid lifter for Kewaskum, Random Lake already

had one game under the belt. The week before the Rams were nosed out by a narrow 7-6 margin by a pretty fair high school team from Appleton but they were no match for the Indian juggernaut.

Tonight, Friday, Kewaskum will host a very tough foe in Kohler in another pre-season battle starting at 8 p. m. here. Kohler rolled over Grafton last week by a one-sided 32-0 score and will give the Indians' a real test. The outcome of this game should give some indication of what the team's chances will be in the Scenic Moraine conference this fall.

In other non-conference games last Friday North Fond du Lac easily downed Juneau, 27-0, and last year's champion, Slinger, was trounced by Horicon, 40-7. The Indians open their conference sche-

dule at North Fondy a week from Friday, Oct. 2.

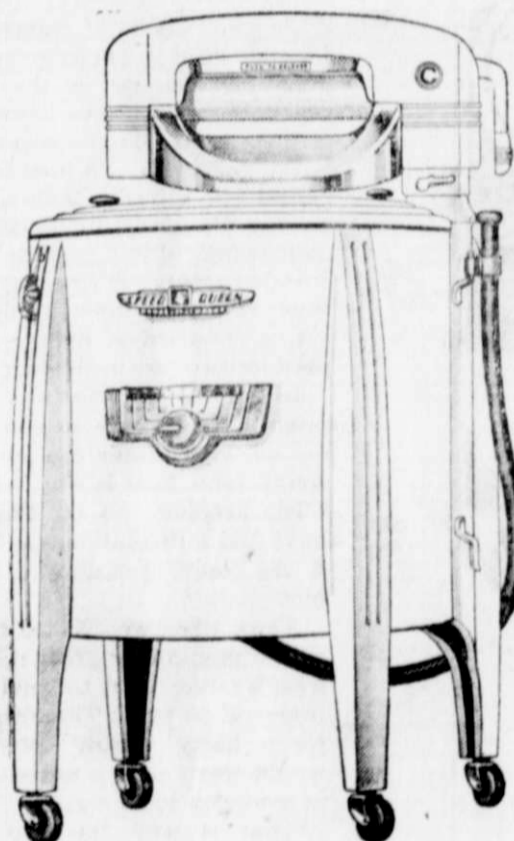

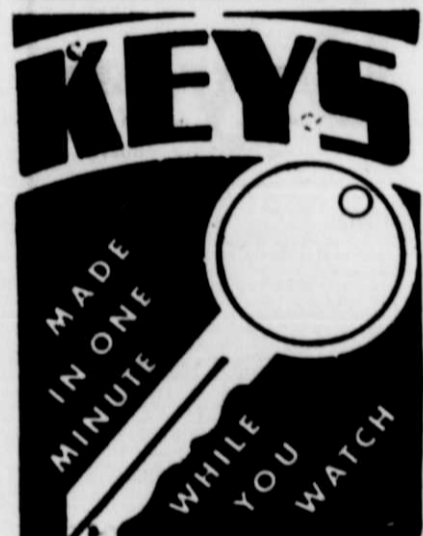

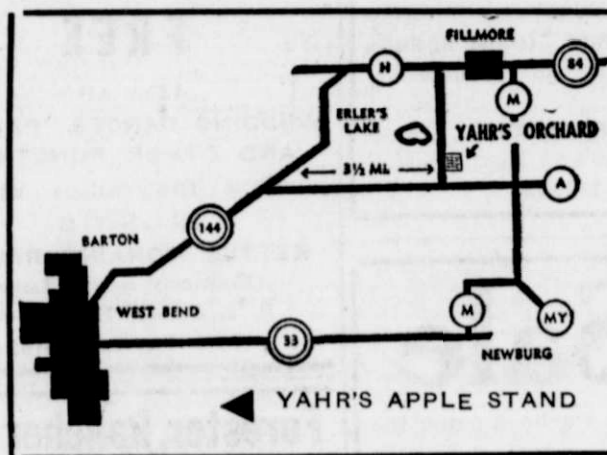
