Six children were born to the couple, one son, Prosper, having passed away in 1937. ## Tom Theusch, 5, Stricken With Polio

ALL CONTACTS WITH BOY URGED TO GET BOOSTER SHOTS IMMEDIATELY

Dr. R. G. Edwards, Kewaskum health officer, reported Thursday afternoon in a call to this office directly from St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, that Thomas Theusch, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Theusch, R. 1, Kewaskum, is critically ill with polio at Johnson Municipal hospital in Milwaukee. The boy was examined by Dr. Max Fox, chief consultant in contagious diseases, who diagnosed his case as acute poliomyelitis.

Tommy is one of five children in the Theusch family and is a pupil at the St. Michael's Parochial school, St. Michaels. Members of the family had been ill with colds or flu the past week and when Tommy began feeling paralyzed over parts of his body a physician was called in for examination.

Dr. Fox informed Dr. Edwards that the best means to control the infection of those who had contact with the boy is for them to obtain a booster dose of polio vaccine immediately from their family doctor.

The Theusch boy had received his polio "shots" but was stricken with the disease nevertheless. Had he not been given the injections his condition would be much more critical than it is, it was reported. It was the first and only case of polio reported in this area this year.

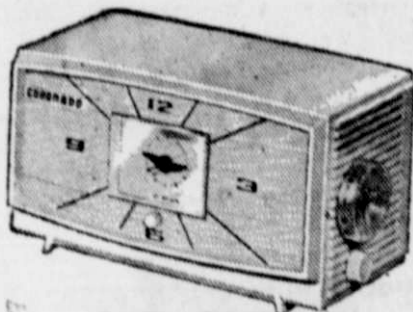
Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Zimmerman have moved into the F. E. Colvin home on West Water st.

### Overseas Servicemen Want "Taste of Home" In Christmas Gifts

**POSTMASTER RECOMMENDS THAT PARCELS BE MAILED BETWEEN NOV. 1-20**

"Be it ever so lumble, there's no cooking like home cooking."

According to Dr. Robert H. Schacht, chairman of the West Bend Chapter of the American Red Cross, that's the word from American servicemen when queried about their "druthers" on Christmas presents from home this year. Cookies, fruit cake and other homemade edibles topped the most-wanted list by a wide margin.

Dr. Schacht states the list was put together from a poll of servicemen taken by American Red Cross field directors stationed with military units around the world.

After discounting the usual reports for one-way tickets home, the poll showed homemade goodies, money, subscriptions to home town newspapers and family photos were the Christmas presents most likely to succeed with men in uniform.

But, there was a big qualification as far as food was concerned. Postmaster Harry Koch reports. The men pleaded that it be packaged for mailing correctly.

Foods should be packaged in a coffee tin or some similar container sealed tightly and placed in

a heavy corrugated pasteboard box. Another tip from the servicemen, Koch states, is that cookies should be individually wrapped.

Money should be sent in the form of a money order. Personal checks are almost impossible to cash overseas.

The women personnel polled were in step with the men on all gift suggestions except one—they added expensive lingerie to their list.

Definitely not wanted by most servicemen were civilian clothing,

toilet articles, jewelry, wallets and cameras. Dr. Schacht adds that all of these can be purchased from post or base exchanges or ship stores at below civilian prices.

Postmaster Koch recommends that Christmas parcels should be mailed between Nov. 1 and Nov. 20 for delivery by surface mail to servicemen overseas and by Dec. 10 for airmail delivery. The farther away a man is stationed, the earlier his parcels should be mailed to insure that they reach him for Christmas.

The recent bereavement which has visited our home, the illness and death of our dear brother, Charles Prost, has brought to us a greater appreciation of our relatives and friends. Such kindnesses and neighborly thoughtfulness can never be forgotten. We are especially grateful to Rev. Hammen, organist,

schoist, pallbearers, drivers, donors of floral and memorial tributes, ladies who served, traffic officer, sexton, Miller's, and all who showed respect.

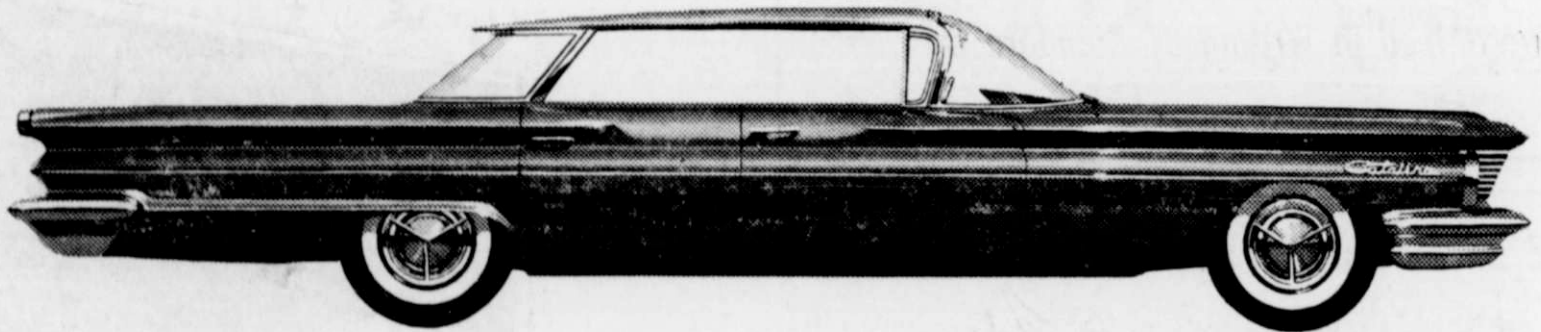

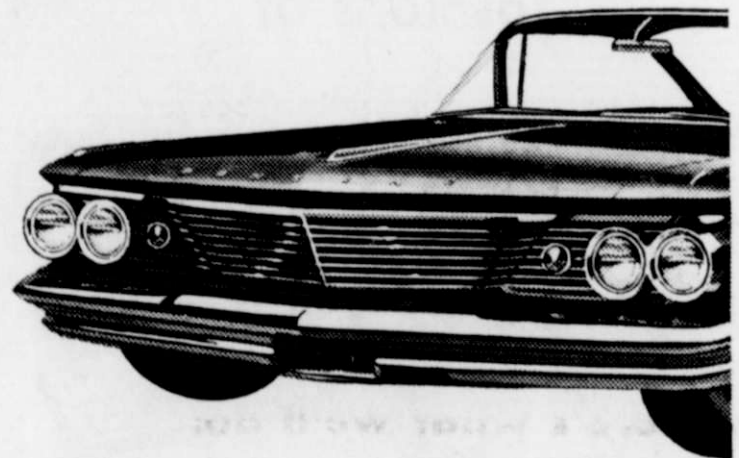

# Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Washington County Conservation Warden and area headquarters at Oshkosh

It was remarkable to see the number of cars traveling the side roads in the Big Cedar lake and Holy Hill areas this past Sunday. It seemed that at least fifty per cent of the parties had a camera. The woods were at the height of their color.

People are either careless or they neglect to read their game law pamphlet. It seems that they would rather pay a fine and costs than buy a cheap gun case. It is all right with me, the school fund can use the fine money. Guns carried in a car or on a tractor must be unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case.

Three deer have been killed by cars in this area in the past week, all between 9:00 p. m. and 2:00 a. m. The rutting season is on and they run all night. This will continue for about a month.

### DON'T SHOOT HENS

The pheasant hunting season opens Saturday, Oct. 24, at 12:00 noon in the entire state. The population of these birds is very low. For this reason, the length of the season has been shortened considerably and the bag limit has been reduced—for the first 3 days of the season, Oct. 24, 25 and 26, to 1 cock per day, with a possession limit of 2 cocks. After the first 3

days, the bag limit is 4 cocks. Without question, if the pheasant population is to again reach the level we knew in past years, it will be as a result of increasing the breeding population. You may ask what can be done to accomplish this.

The best answer we can give to this is DON'T SHOOT HENS. They are the birds that will provide the hunting in the future by raising broods of young birds each year.

If you wish to preserve and better the sport of pheasant hunting, DON'T SHOOT HENS and impress this upon your hunting companions and the other hunters you talk to. If and when you observe anyone shooting hens, report it to the nearest conservation warden, giving the violator's name, if that is possible, a good description of the individual, and an accurate description of how he is dressed. If an automobile is involved, be sure and report the license number.

### Training Course in Civil Defense Will Begin Here Nov. 3

COURSE FOR CITIZENS OF KEWASKUM AREA, ON PROBLEMS OF AREA

Marvin Martin, Kewaskum Civil Defense director, this week reminded citizens of the village and town of Wayne that a Civil Defense training course will be offered at the Municipal building in Kewaskum, starting at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Nov. 3. The class will meet for two hours each Tuesday during the month of November.

Martin stated that the basic Civil Defense course covers Civil Defense organization, planning assumptions, a discussion of radio-active fallout, and the measurement of radio-active fallout intensity, emergency welfare services in Civil Defense including mass feeding, clothing, lodging and information and registration services, and an operational plan for these services. The problems discussed will be focused on the Kewaskum area and the immediate problems which will be facing local residents as well as evacuees who may be cared for in the Kewaskum area.

Martin emphasized the fact that Civil Defense activities become operational on a municipality basis, and for this reason it is necessary to develop a trained core of interested citizens who can take appropriate action if it is ever needed.

He said the course is designed for those who want to continue training and to take an active part in local Civil Defense affairs, as well as those persons who want to know more about how to take care of themselves and their families in a Civil Defense emergency.

Since registration is limited to approximately 35 students for each class, Martin suggests that interested citizens make arrangements for advance registration by calling Mr. Martin at Kewaskum 143, Mrs. Roland Pledl at Kewaskum 160-R or the Kewaskum Municipal building at 94.

Residents in the town of Kewaskum can also contact Donald Koerble, Civil Defense director for the town of Kewaskum, at R. 3, Kewaskum. Residents in the town of Wayne can also contact Orville Kern, Civil Defense director in that township, at R. 3, Kewaskum.
