Businessmen Meet, Nominate Officers

STORES TO OPEN EVENINGS
STARTING DEC. 14; NEW
DECORATIONS PUT UP

The monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Business Association was held Monday night in the municipal building with 22 members present. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The treasurer being absent, his minutes were not read.

Edw. E. Miller reported that the new Christmas street decorations purchased by the association were being shipped. Since then the decorations arrived and have already been put up at various spots on Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. The decorations, which cost the association approximately \$375.00, are large, attractive ones which add much to the village's holiday appearance.

New officers nominated for the coming year by the nominating committee are: Roger Strack, President, to succeed Jack Koehn, Vernon Butz and Frank Felix, vice-president, to succeed Strack; Wayland Tessar, treasurer, to succeed himself, and Kilian Honeck, secretary, to succeed himself. The officers will be elected by ballot sent out to members of the association.

Members decided to have business places open evenings for Christmas shopping beginning on Monday, Dec. 14, when most stores and other businesses will be open. They will be open evenings until Dec. 24 when they will close at 5 p. m. It was voted to hold the next meeting on Monday, Dec. 14, a week earlier than usual, because of the business places being open evenings.

Other business discussed pertained to the completion of incorporation papers, continuing the Bonus Day setup as is at present, contacting new members, and other matters.

Record 314 Deer Taken in County

MORE KEWASKUM HUNTERS
REPORT SUCCESS; 60
KILLED BY CARS

The "any deer" season in Washington county closed on Sunday and as of Monday morning a record 314 deer were reported killed in the county. This total kill was far beyond expectations, although conservation wardens had reported that the deer were very plentiful in the county and actually caused a hazard for motorists and farmers who suffered crop losses.

The kill may have been even larger as hunters had until 10 p. m. Monday to register their deer. In spite of the large deer kill hunters report there are many, many animals left in the county which made it through the season. The 314 kill does not include deer registered in the field by members of the conservation department. Total figures are expected to be available next week.

Many hunters reported that the deer population in the county was very heavy and they made their kills from deer which were traveling in groups of from three to eight. More than 60 additional deer were also reported killed by cars in the county this year.

Hunters were elated over the results of the deer kill in the county. All of the deer taken were excellent specimens, including bucks and large does. Many hunters who made unsuccessful trips north the first week end of the season had better luck in this county and got their deer near home. The light snowfall on several occasions during the season greatly aided the hunters in tracking the animals.

Added to the list of successful local hunters reported in our last issue are the following who reported this week:

Clark Werner, while hunting with the Oppermann group in the town of Auburn Sunday afternoon shot a 12 point, 175 lb. buck at about 3 p. m., shortly before the season closed. Al Muckerheide, who returned empty handed from a hunting trip in the north, shot an 8 point buck Friday southwest of Kewaskum near the Kohlville road. He trailed the animal out of the Wayne swamp.

Last week it was reported that Allen Kertcher bagged his deer in the Lake 15 area. It should have read Lake 12.

Observe Annual Civil Defense Day Dec. 7

WILL DISTRIBUTE BOOKLETS
IN KEWASKUM SCHOOLS

The second annual National Civil Defense Day on Monday, Dec. 7 (Pearl Harbor Day 18 years ago) is being observed to remind Americans that the best chance of keeping the peace is to be prepared, both militarily and on the home front.

For most American families, Civil Defense preparedness has now come to mean one thing above all others—home fallout shelters, and the equipment and supplies to go in them.

The Milwaukee Metropolitan Target Area commission—seven southeastern Wisconsin counties—is distributing free thousands of copies of a booklet called "The Family Fallout Shelter." It tells how and why fallout shelters should be built, and gives detailed drawings and specifications to aid in building them. The booklet lists the equipment and supplies needed for fallout shelters.

Most larger cities in the MMTA will send the booklet home with school children. Additional free copies may be obtained from the local Civil Defense agencies in Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington, Waukesha, Racine, Kenosha and Walworth counties, or by writing to "Home Shelter, % Civil Defense, Milwaukee 2, Wis."

Pamphlets will be distributed in the Kewaskum and other schools of Washington county on Monday, Dec. 7, in conjunction with the national observance of Civil Defense Day, Marvin Martin, local CD director, announced this week.

Hartford Downs Chevs In Lakes Opening Game

The Kewaskum Chevrolets got off on the wrong foot in their Land o' Lakes league opener Sunday night at Hartford, where they were defeated by a 90-79 score.

The Chevs weren't hitting, the officiating was a joke, even to the Hartford fans, according to the players, and Kewaskum's center, Tom Larson, failed to show for the game. Put them all together and they spelled defeat for the Chevs. Larson, a teacher in the local schools, was gone for the Thanksgiving recess.

Hartford outscored the visitors in every period but the third, running up a 19-9 first quarter advantage and adding to it at halftime, 43-32. In the third quarter the Chevs dropped in 22 points to Hartford's 19, bringing the score to 62-54, which was the closest Kewaskum came.

Three players scored 65 of the Chevs' total points. Augie Bilgo and Frank Krueger tied for top honors with 22 points apiece and Don Meisenheimer was a close second with 21. Veteran Del Renzaglia was top man for the winners, also with 22 points, followed by Dondlinger with 16.

This Saturday, at 8 p. m., the Chevs play their home opener, hosting Berlin, a new team in the league, about which little is known. Berlin's scheduled contest with Beaver Dam last week end was postponed. West Bend was also idle.

After being bumped in their first two games, the Kewaskum Indians gained their initial victory of the season at Random Lake Tuesday evening, 39-32, in the final tune-up tilt before opening play in the Scenic Moraine conference tonight (Friday) at North Fondy.

The Indians jumped off to a 13-6 advantage in the first quarter and

increased their lead to 25-16 at halftime. Each team scored only 4 points in the defensive third period and Random Lake outscored Kewaskum in the final quarter, 12-0, to bring the final count to 39-32.

Kons Sadownikow paced the winners' scoring with 10 points, followed by Bob Berg, Tom Bartelt Otto Ramthun, each with 8. Arndt and Falk led the Lakers with 9 and 8 points respectively. The Indians bested Random from the free throw line, 13-10.

Scenic Moraine teams start playing for keeps with the conference openers tonight finding Kewaskum at North Fondy, Campbellsport at Germantown and Grafton at Sling-er. The seventh team, Pewaukee, has a bye. Kewaskum can expect rough going against the Orioles, one of the pre-season favorites, along with Campbellsport.

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) each, which note shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent (4%) per annum, said note to be dated November 10, 1959, and shall be payable on the 9th day of March, 1960, and signed by the said president and clerk, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that to provide for the payment of the principal and interest of said note on or before the thirtieth (30th) day of August following the next tax levy there shall be and there is hereby levied on all the taxable property of said village, in addition to all other taxes, a sum sufficient to pay the principal of twenty thousand and no/100 dollars, (\$20,000.00) and interest thereon at the rate of four per cent (4%) per annum from the date of said note to the date of maturity of said note as aforesaid, which tax after receipt of the borrowed money shall become and continue irrevocable and shall be carried into the next tax roll of the village and collected as other taxes are collected, as provided by law and when said tax is so collected it shall be kept in a separate and distinct fund and be used for the sole purpose of paying the principal and interest on the said note provided in this resolution.

The deer season closed Sunday evening and we find many happy hunters in Washington county. From the number of deer hanging from trees and buildings in the county the boys enjoyed their hunt. This brings to mind another subject.

It is a pleasure to watch a farmer or a butcher kill a beef, hog or sheep, how very careful he is to remove all of the viscera, wash and cool the animal out, and then cut it up. Now, see how many of the deer are handled. The animal is shot, the hunter removes the intestines, the heart, liver and lungs remain in the animal. In most cases there is no water available so the deer is placed on the fender, trunk or top of the car, at the end of the day it is hung in a tree near the home. The weather is warm, the rains or the snow come, the animal becomes sour and slimy, I can well understand why many people shake their head when the word ve-

nison is mentioned.

One of our wardens working in Washington county observed a man and his son coming out of one of the larger marshes. They were dressed in red and each had a sack over his shoulder. They contained heart, liver and lungs of the deer that were properly field dressed. That was as close as they were able to come to a deer.

About 12:15 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 28, a deer was killed by a car on US Hwy. 57 north of Saukville. About twenty minutes later another was hit at the north limits of the village of Barton, another was killed at Highway 60 and 41 early Sunday evening.

Three swan are using the south end of Big Cedar lake, apparently they are not ready to fly south. Is this an indication of a mild winter?

In the event the weather holds, the ice fishermen should be out in force this coming week end. These hardy individuals should check the thickness of the ice, many lakes are not safe to travel on.
