DR. OGI ATTENDS STATE VETERINARIANS MEETING

Dr. Charles Ogi, Kewaskum, was among some 300 Wisconsin veterinarians who attended the 44th annual meeting of the Wisconsin Veterinary Medical Association at the Schroeder Hotel, Milwaukee, Jan. 10 - 12.

Members attended sessions covering many phases of veterinary practice, research and regulatory programs. The current tuberculosis problem received special consideration. Other subjects included sterility, virus infections of cattle and the use of tranquilizers in veterinary medicine.

A one day session was devoted to small animal practice, including discussions on cataract operations in dogs, fluid therapy in small animals and leptospirosis.

A special session on light horse practice was held.

Rev. Hammen to Preside At Wisconsin Council Of Churches Dinner

The Rev. Clarence Hammen, Kewaskum, is president of the Wisconsin Council of Churches and a delegate from the South Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. Rev. Hammen will be toastmaster of the ecumenical dinner.

Some 116 council officers and delegates are expected to attend the one-day meeting being held at Bethel Lutheran church. Arrangements are being made in cooperation with the Madison Council of Churches for the dinner.

The Wisconsin Council of Churches is the official organization through which 10 Protestant denominations in the state cooperate together. The council office is located at 308 Washington Building, Madison. Further information about the meeting and tickets for the ecumenical dinner can be secured through this office. These tickets must be purchased in advance.
