## Peace Church to Hold Mission Feb. 19-26, Rev. P. Olm Guest Preacher

Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, is joining with the neighboring churches in the teaching—reaching—preaching mission to be held during the week of Feb. 19-26.

The mission, referred to as the TRPM, has as its purpose (1) TEACHING the Church, (2) REACHING the Unchurched, and (3) PREACHING the Living Work of God.

Rev. Paul Olm, pastor of St. John's church at Monroe, Wis., will be the guest missionary for the week. He will preach at the Sunday morning service and at special evening services on Monday through Thursday at 8 o'clock. There will be meetings of church officers and leaders in which Rev. Olm will instruct and encourage them in their work.

In South Wisconsin Synod he has served as youth advisor and is well known among our youth as a counselor, teacher and director of youth camps at Green Lake for ten years. He is married and the father of two children.

All of the participating churches of the area will unite in a mass rally to be held at the West Bend High school gymnasium on Sunday, Feb. 21, at 8 p. m. Dr. James Wagner, president of the Evangelical & Reformed church and co-president of the United Church of Christ, will be the speaker. One of the features of the service will be a mass choir of 350 voices representing all of the participating churches. The choir will be directed by Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer of Kewaskum and Mrs. Harry Baumer of West Bend.

"These citizens realize that the heart diseases constitute the nation's number one defense. It is through your contributions to the Heart Fund that needed research can be continued and expanded and thus provide the answers to the mysteries still surrounding diseases of the heart and blood vessels," he said.

A record of all Heart Fund contributions is kept at the Bank of Kewaskum for the benefit of those who wish to use their donations for tax deduction purposes and for verification of the contributions.

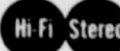
STANCHFIELD IS RE-ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE

The committee meets again May 24 at Fond du Lac.

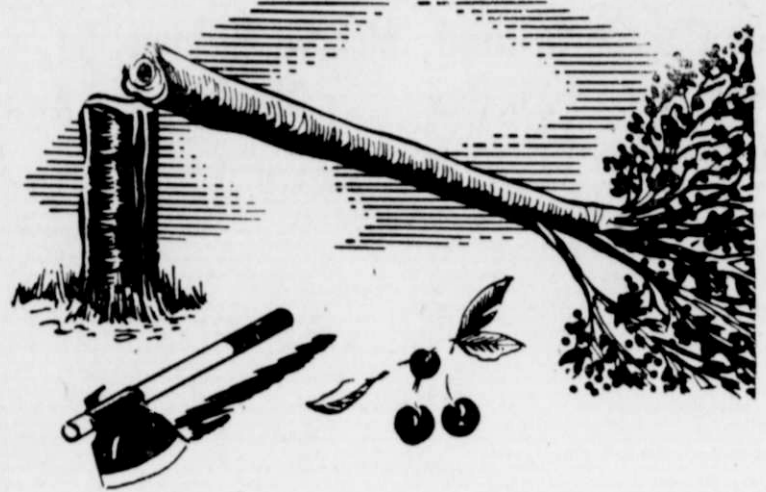
### Our Police Chief Says

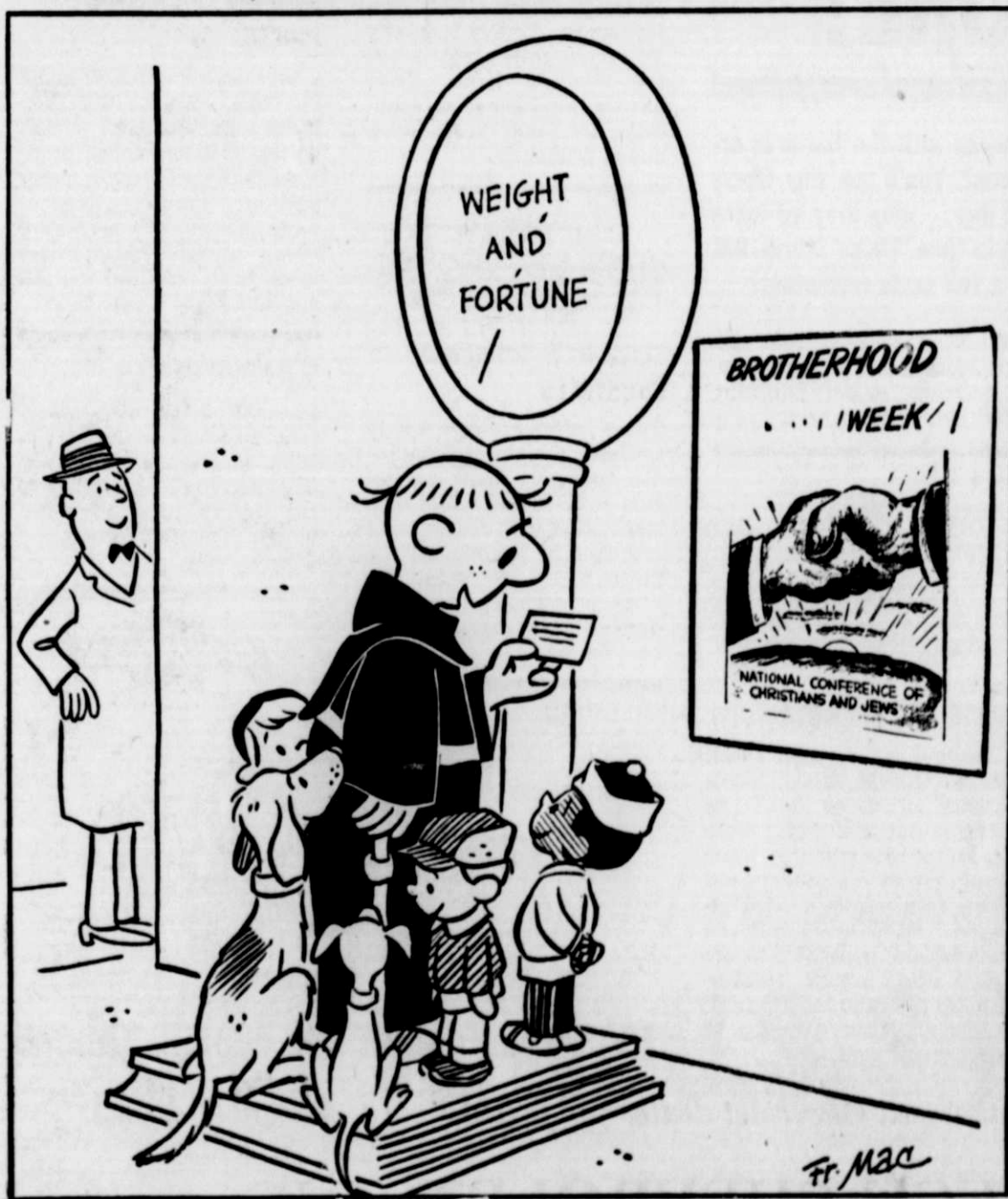
