Kennedy Beats Humphrey By Big Margin in Village, 183-108; Geidel, Merwin, Degner Elected Trustees

291 Democratic Votes Cast Here Set New Record

STOLTZ IS COUNTY JUDGE WINNER; 470 VOTERS TURN OUT IN VILLAGE

A total of 470 voters cast their ballots in the spring election in the village Tuesday. This number was larger than anticipated and represents about two-thirds of the total eligible voters.

A big surprise was the number of Democratic votes cast here. Always a Republican stronghold in the past, the GOP votes usually far outnumber the Democratic ones locally. There were 291 Democratic votes cast Tuesday to set a new record high and run far ahead of the 179 Republican votes. However, many Republicans apparently "crossed over" to the Democratic side for Kennedy.

Kennedy easily defeated Humphrey in the village by 75 votes, 183 to 108. Vice-President Nixon ran close behind Kennedy with 179 votes, being unopposed on the GOP ballot. Kennedy also beat Humphrey by over 2,500 votes, almost 2 to 1, in Washington county. Kennedy polled 5,517 votes, Nixon was second with 4,257, and Humphrey ran a poor third with 2,982. Throughout the state of Wisconsin Kennedy ran away from Humphrey by over 100,000 votes—106,867 to be exact. Kennedy received 478,901 votes in the state, followed by Humphrey with 372,034 and Nixon was third with 341,463.

Another race which helped bring out the village voters was the one for trustee. There were five candidates for the three offices elected. Incumbent Arvin Merwin was re-elected, while another incumbent, Joseph Schwind was defeated. Two new trustees elected were John

Blood Bank Goal Is Exceeded First Time, 102 Pints Donated

The blood bank mobile unit's visit to Kewaskum Monday afternoon was the most successful ever held in the village. For the first time since the blood bank was organized the goal of 100 pints was exceeded when 102 pints of blood were donated at the high school gym by residents of the area.

Out of 117 donors signed up to give blood, 15 were rejected, leaving 102 who were accepted. On some previous visits by the mobile unit there were more volunteers who signed up to give blood but there were also more rejects to fall short of the goal. In spite of a late start Monday afternoon the goal of 102 pints had been surpassed by the time the blood bank closed at 5:45 p. m.

Largely responsible for putting the blood bank over the top were a group of neighbors of John Spoerl, who volunteered to donate blood. Mr. Spoerl is ill and requires much blood. In order to repay the blood bank for some of the blood needed by him, members of the Spoerl family solicited neighbors to donate and a large group responded.

This blood is turned in to the Milwaukee Blood Center bank by the Community Blood Donor club and anyone in the community who needs it can draw from the blood bank. Some time this may be you or someone close to you.

The people of Kewaskum and community who supported the mobile blood unit are to be congratulated. Henry Rosenheimer, local member of the Blood Bank board of directors, wants to extend special thanks to each person who gave a pint of blood or offered to give but was rejected for various reasons. Thanks to Mrs. Edw. Miller and her committee of Woman's club members who made all the contacts and appointments. Thanks also to the Ladies' Altar society of Holy Trinity church for the delicious refreshments served and to all who attended the blood bank unit. Kewaskum as a community can well be proud of the splendid cooperation in worthwhile projects such as this.

Break Ground for Peace Church Building



Ground breaking services were held at Peace church, Kewaskum, on Sunday, March 27, at 10:15 a. m. for a new \$80,000 educational building addition. Weather Instrument Found on Haack Farm

A weather instrument called a Radiosonde and numbered 945805, which was released by the weather bureau station at Green Bay early Tuesday, Apr. 5, as a public service, was found at 8:30 a. m. the same morning on the Raymond Haack farm on R. 1, Kewaskum, east of New Fane, by Mr. Haack.

According to the information on the instrument the Radiosonde is used for measuring temperature, pressure and moisture of air at various heights above ground. It is sent aloft by being tied to a balloon which, according to the directions on the carton containing the Radiosonde, bursts at a height of about 17 miles. The instrument then comes down on an attached parachute. During the observation, the Radiosonde operated as a radio transmitter which was tracked by a special radio receiver at the ground

station at Green Bay.

Mr. and Mrs. Haack and son brought the instrument into the Statesman office for observation. All of the instruments and wires are contained in a corrugated carton. They followed the instructions on the box to pack the parachute and rigging back into the carton and mail it back to the weather station, after filling out the attached card with their name and address and the place where the instrument was found.

JOANNE REITZ ON HONOR ROLL AT OSHKOSH STATE

Geidel and Harold Degner. The third incumbent, Henry Becker, was not a candidate because of establishing his residence outside of the village. Geidel polled the greatest number of votes, 319, followed closely by Merwin with 318, Degner 309, Schwind 230 and Harry R. Heinecke 121. Robert G. Kroneke, unopposed for justice of the peace, polled the most votes, 335.

Atty. Robert J. Stoltz, West Bend, was decisively elected as county judge of the newly created Branch 2 of the Washington county court, chalking up 6,881 votes in the county, compared with 4,434 for his opponent, Atty. Theodore W. Simester, West Bend. County Judge Lester A. Buckley, Hartford, unopposed in the Branch 1 race, polled 9,796 votes. In the village Stoltz beat Simester better than 2 to 1, 283 votes to 135. Buckley received 350 votes here.

Opposing the state and county trends approving appropriations for improving port facilities in Wisconsin, village voters voted against amending the state constitution to take such action in a close vote, 193 to 191. In the county 5,277 voters approved the amendment while 5,251 opposed it and

voted "No." Incomplete returns Wednesday showed that 454,587 state electors voted "Yes" while 425,177 voted "No" on the referendum issue.

TOWN OF KEWASKUM

In the town of Kewaskum balloting, done at the Labor Center in the village, a total of 196 votes were cast, considered to be a good turn-out. In the township Kennedy defeated Humphrey by almost 2 to 1, receiving 90 votes to only 47 for Humphrey. Nixon received 59 votes.

For county judge Stoltz ran ahead of Simester almost 4 to 1. He polled 142 votes to Simester's 38. Buckley was given 126 votes for the Branch 1 post.

On the referendum issue there was only a one vote difference, with 83 "Yes" votes and 82 "No".

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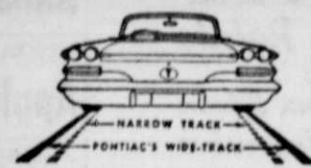

Deer are showing up on the highway. A doe was killed on U. S. Hwy. 41 this past Sunday morning, another on Hwy. 33 near Newburg early Monday. High water is apparently driving them to higher ground.

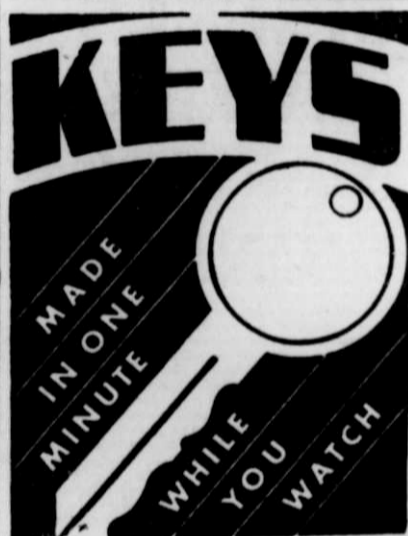

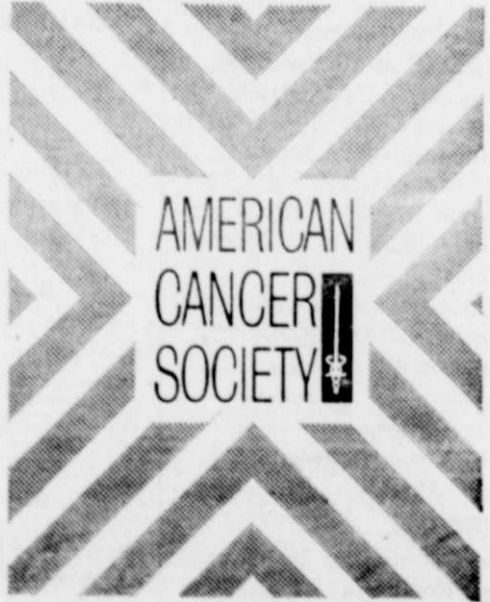
