Mrs. Otto Meinecke, 72, nee Ida Stern, of this village, died early Saturday morning, Apr. 23, following an illness of several weeks.

She was born Jan. 5, 1888, in the town of Kewaskum, a daughter of the late Theodore and Bertha Stern, and was a resident of the village and vicinity all of her life. Her marriage to Otto Meinecke took place at the Peace E and R church, Kewaskum, on Aug. 11, 1906. He preceded her in death in September, 1956, and a daughter, Adeline, also predeceased her on Dec. 21, 1927.

Surviving are two sons, Edwin, of 135 W. The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at Peace United Church of Christ from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. The Rev. C. F. Hammen officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery.

Civil Defense Test Alert Here Tuesday

EXERCISE WILL BEGIN WITH SIREN SIGNAL AT 1 P. M.

"Operation Alert 1960," a nationwide Civil Defense test exercise and public take cover drill, will take place on Tuesday, May 3, beginning at 1:00 p. m.

In Kewaskum as well as the entire Milwaukee Metropolitan Target Area control centers will be activated. At 1:00 p. m. the alert siren signal will be sounded for three minutes by a steady blast of the fire sirens, marking the beginning of the Conelrad test.

From 1:00 to 1:30 p. m. there will be a national Conelrad broadcast. Local segments will originate from WEMP (Conelrad control station) at 11800 W. Grange ave., Hales Corners.

From 1:30 to 1:33 p. m. the take cover signal will be sounded (three minutes) by a wavering blast of the sirens. At the sound of the take cover signal, you and thousands of residents of the Milwaukee area are asked to clear the streets and take cover in the shelter of buildings as your part of Operation Alert 1960. Police and auxiliary members will clear streets of pedestrians and traffic will be curbed. The public will remain under cover from 1:33 to 1:40 p. m.

From 1:40 to 1:45 p. m. a simultaneous broadcast over all Milwaukee radio stations will feature a public take cover drill. Observation and broadcast will be made from light airplane circling the city.

From 1:40 to 1:45 p. m. a steady siren again will sound the end of the public phase of the exercise.

As part of the Civil Defense operation, next Thursday, May 5, a convoy of vehicles from Milwaukee, Sheboygan and other municipalities which can spare the equipment, will pass through Washington county enroute from Sheboygan. They will enter the county at the Sheboygan county line on Hwy. 28 and will proceed to Hwy. 144. On 144 the convoy will travel south to Hwy. 33, west on 33 to Hwy. 175, south on 175 to Hwy. 83, and continue south on 83 to Hwy. 30, where it will leave the county again.

—Mike Rafenstein of Milwaukee visited Saturday afternoon at the Louis Heisler home.

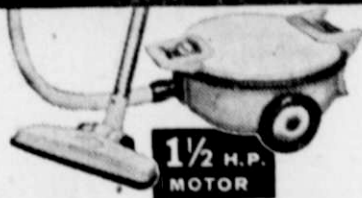

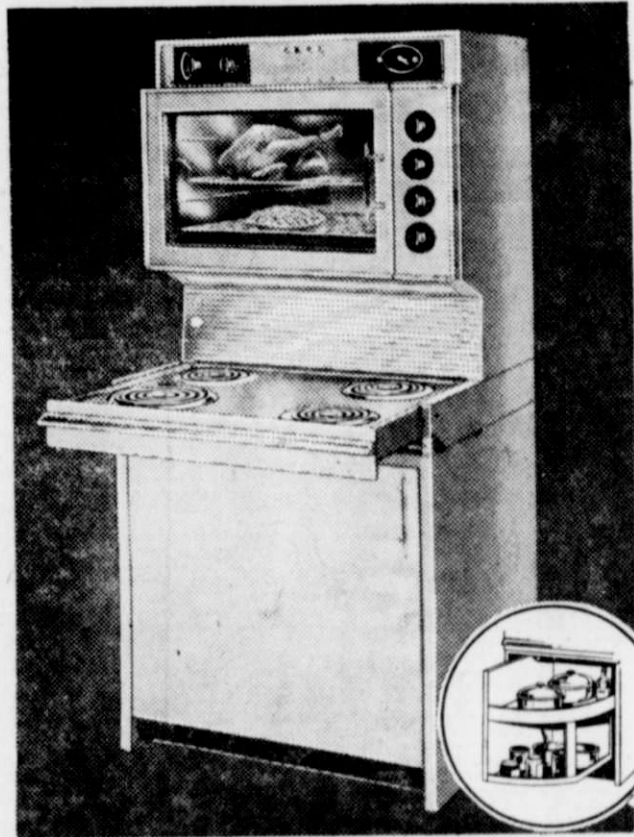

Baganz Harp Concert at St. Lucas Parish Sunday

Otto Baganz of Plymouth, who is rated among the top concert harpists in America today, will give a harp concert at the St. Lucas Lutheran church, Kewaskum, on Sunday, May 1, at 8 p. m. There will be no charge but a free will offering will be taken.

He is the only living exponent of Lutheran choral and christian hymns on the harp in the nation. Baganz studied under such greats as Enrico Tramonti, recognized as the world's greatest harpist; Edmund Schluucker, the great chorale harpist, and Joseph Vito of Chicago. For many years Baganz was a member of symphony orchestras in the midwest. In Lutheran circles he is known throughout the nation as the founder of the famed Baganz Trio.

Baganz's harp is claimed by experts to be "the last word in the harp maker's art." It is truly a thing of beauty and excellence in construction, which required two years of completion. Its tone is of superlative beauty and volume, so much so that the instrument has been termed "the Stradivarius of Harps."

When Otto was nine years old, his father, who lived in a little crossroads town called Dotyville, bought him a harp. That was the start of a career. For over 40 years now, Otto Baganz has been earning his livelihood with a harp. Although he has played the harp on national radio programs, Baganz prefers to limit his work to churches, being a deeply religious man.

The next meeting will be held on May 5. Carole and Curtis Erdmann will be our hosts at the home of Mrs. Art. Petermann.

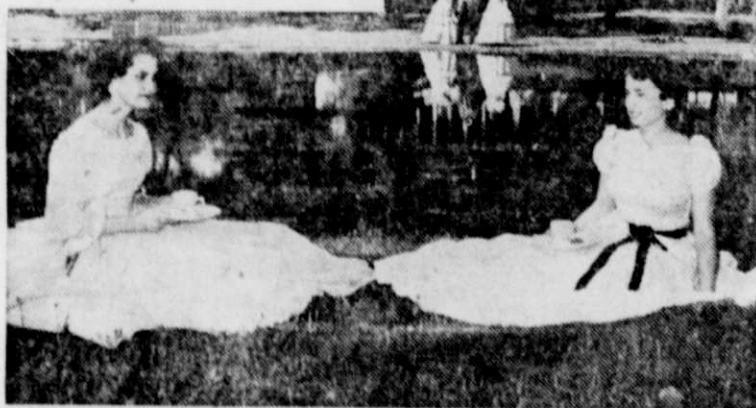

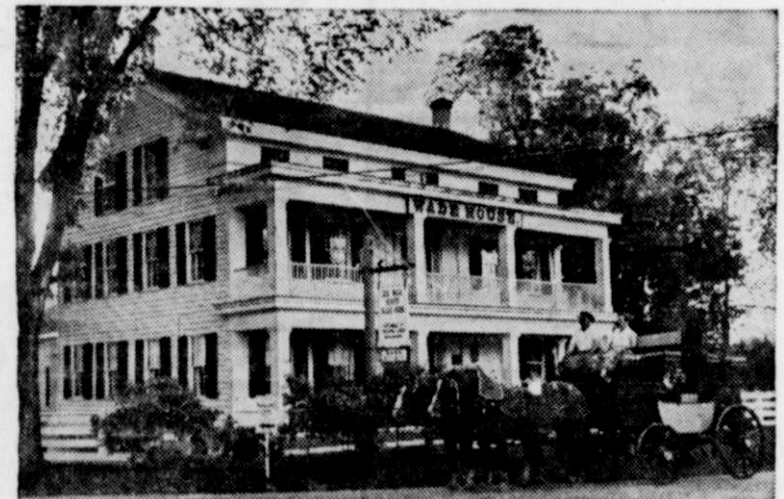

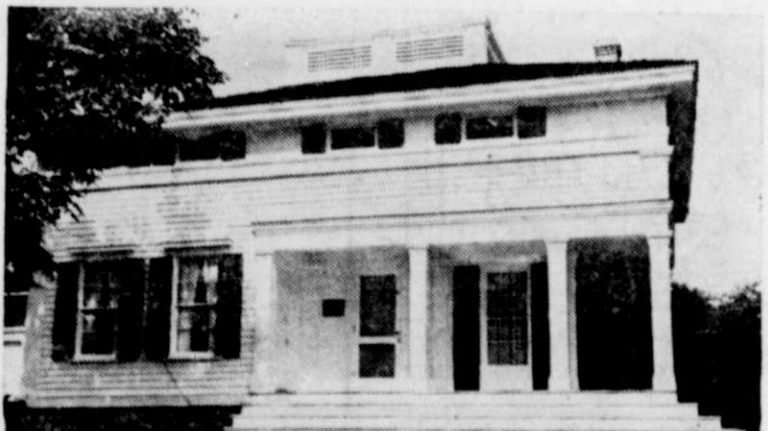
