3 From Here Awarded Degrees at Lakeland

Four years ago, three graduates of the 1956 class of Kewaskum Community High school decided to attend Lakeland college, Sheboygan. On Sunday June 5, these same three graduates received their degrees at the 98th annual commencement exercises of Lakeland. Dr. William Beckmann, dean of instruction, announced that 63 seniors graduated, the largest class in the school's history.

Curtis L. Yahr was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Science, Calvin J. Schaub the degree of Bachelor of Arts, cum laude, and Fredric A. Seefeldt, Bachelor of Arts, cum laude.

All three have played an active part in campus organizations and events.

Yahr is affiliated with Mu Lambda Sigma fraternity. He is a charter member of the Lakeland chapter of N.S.E.A. In addition, Yahr participated in the varsity basketball and baseball program and was active in the German club and C. F. Yahr, a secondary education graduate, majored in biology with minors in chemistry, general science and English.

Schaub, a three-year recipient of the Lakeland honor scholarship, was also a member of the dean's list. He is affiliated with MU Lambda fraternity and served as fraternity secretary and chaplain while at Lakeland. A charter member of the student N. E. A., he served as chairman of the constitution committee. Schaub participated in many German club presentations and also served as treasurer of the scholarship awarding organization. He served two terms in the student government and was a member of the elections board and a freshman counselor. Schaub, a secondary education graduate, has a double major in German and sociology. He will teach German at the Clinton High school in southern Wisconsin next fall.

Seefeldt is a 1960 nominee to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. A three-year recipient of the Lakeland honor scholarship, he was also a member of the dean's list. During his senior year he served as vice-president of the student body and business manager of the college yearbook. He was also a charter member and secretary of the new Lakeland Young Republican club and was a delegate to the 1960 state convention of the YGOP. He was also selected a student member of Rotary International. He served as a co-chairman of two of the college's major social events, homecoming and winter carnival. Past president of the Christian Fellowship Caravan group, he was delegate to the national convention of the United Student Fellowship. Other activities included the College Theater, college newspaper, and the German club.

Seefeldt, a sociology major with minors in history, philosophy, English and German, will attend Concordia Theological seminary, Springfield, Illinois in the fall.

Their degrees were conferred by Dr. Arthur M. Krueger, president of the college. Dr. Walter E. Bauer, Dean of the Faculty, Valparaiso University, Ind., delivered the commencement address.

Ours New Self-Service Laundry Being Built

Rites Held for Pfc. Howard Haack, Others

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday, June 6, at Miller's Funeral home for Pfc. Howard A. Haack, 25, formerly of Kewaskum, who was serving with the U. S. Army Airborne Service at Fort Campbell, Ky. He died at nearby Clarksville, Tenn. on Tuesday, May 31.

The Rev. Donald Bitter officiated at the funeral rite, which was followed by burial in Lutheran Memorial Park, Kewaskum. Robert Romaine Post 384, American Legion, conducted military services at the cemetery. The body was shipped by train from Fort Campbell, arriving here Saturday morning. Prior to the services the body was in state at the funeral home after 2 p. m. Sunday.

Haack was born on July 20, 1934 at West Bend and moved to Kewaskum with his parents in 1947. In 1952 he graduated from Kewaskum High school, following which he enlisted in the U. S. Air Force. After serving four years he received an honorable discharge and took employment with Northwest Airlines in Chicago. In the fall of 1959 he joined the airborne service.

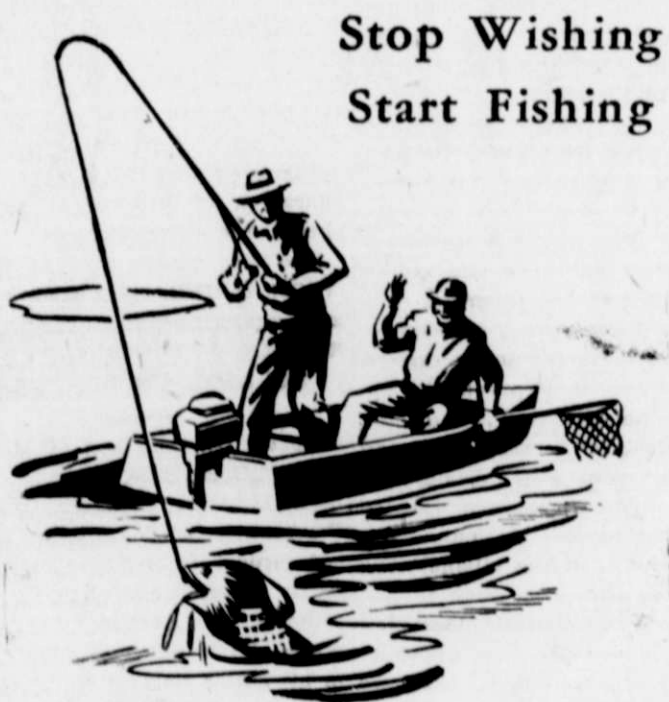

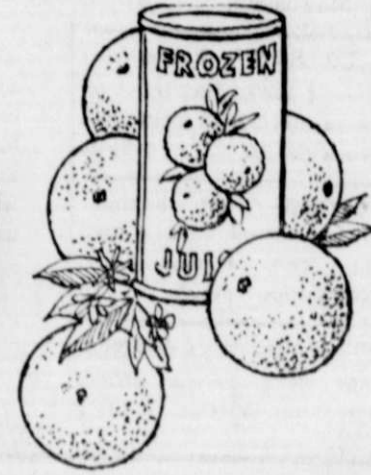
