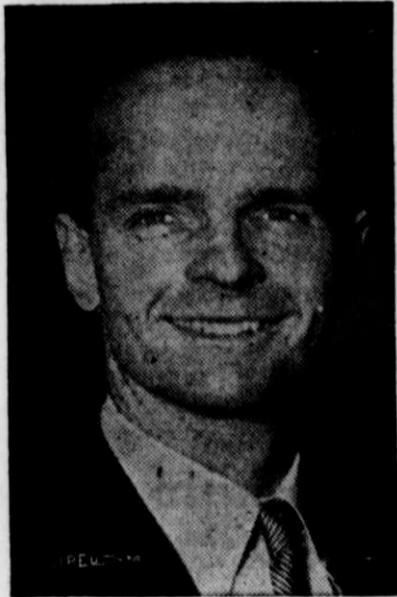

## Harold's Photo Studio Moves to West Bend

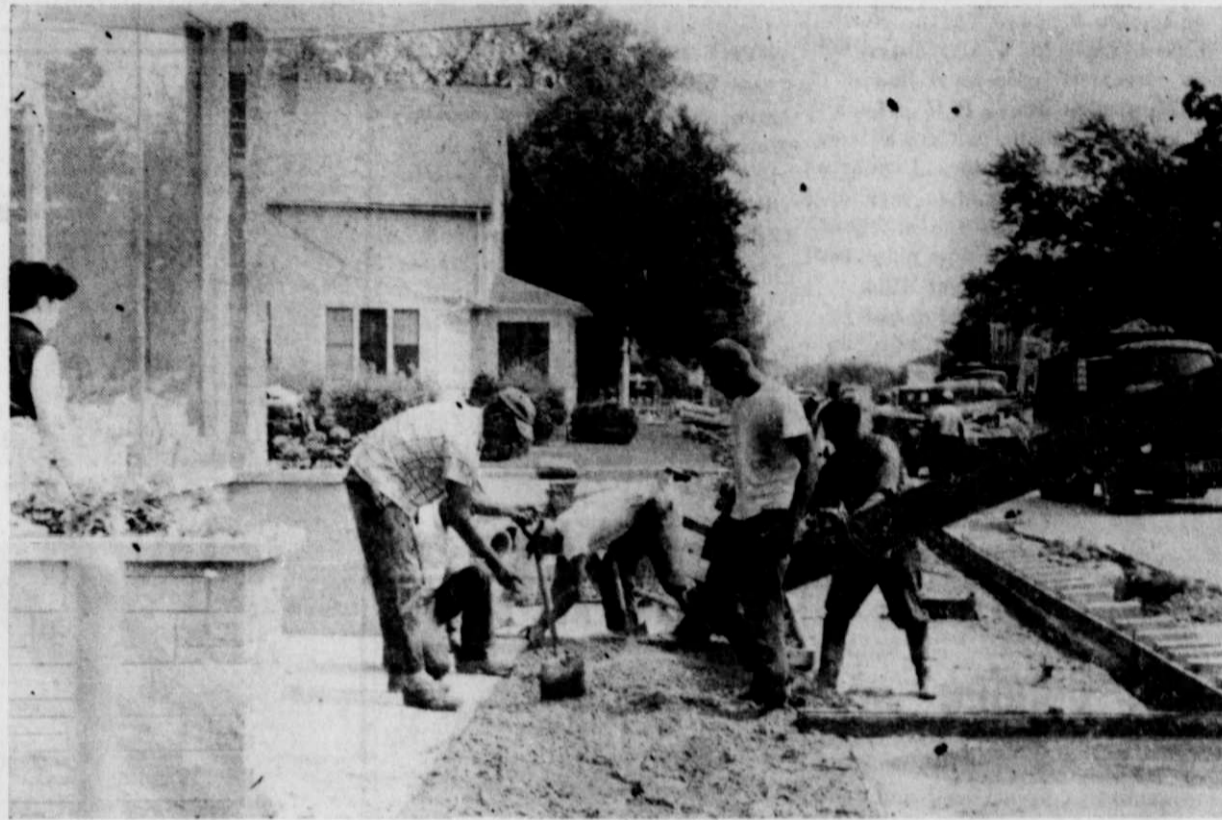

## Street Improvement Project Well Along



The above picture, facing east, was taken last Thursday noon as concrete was poured for the new sidewalk in front of the Statesman office on Main st. The sidewalk is part of a huge street improvement project in Kewaskum which also includes new storm sewers and catch basins and mercury-vapor type street lighting on Main st., paving and about 29,000 feet or nearly six miles of new curb and gutter on the other streets.

Work on the project is well along. The storm sewers and catch basins have been constructed and buried. Construction of the sidewalk on both sides of Main st. is expected to be completed about

the middle of next week. The new sidewalk and street lights will extend the full length of Main st. from Fond du Lac ave. to the east village limits. The sidewalks have been graded and graveled and will be left this way to settle until next spring when they will be paved. Nearly half of the six miles of curb and gutter work is completed.

Wieseler Construction, Inc. of Appleton has the contract for the general construction work and the street lighting work is being done by Household Utilities, Inc. of Kiel.

Shown in the photo are a few of the dozens of Wieseler workers spread throughout the village at various jobs. The storm sewer and

cable for the street lights have already been laid under the sidewalk after tearing up the old concrete. Dark Main st. (no lights), the dust and dirt, the noise, rough streets, removal of trees, curb and gutter excavating, torn up landscape and all have made a mess but it will be appreciated so much more when the work is completed.

You will note the "vice-president" of the Statesman firm at the left of the picture keeping a watchful eye on the workers to see that the job is done right, or what is the attraction? Probably asking them for a few pastel shades in the concrete. "Be sure you get enough cement in there boys and keep away from the geraniums."

## Cyclist Is Seriously Hurt in Crash Here

Physicians from Kewaskum and West Bend and a Milwaukee specialist worked all Friday night in an effort to save the badly mangled right leg and foot of Donald Desens, 17, R. 1, Allenton, after the youth was injured in a motorcycle-automobile crash on the Kewaskum hill just south of the village shortly before 10 p. m. Friday.

The accident occurred when the cycle driven by Desens, a Kewaskum High school senior, on which he and a companion, Mary Yearling, 17, West Bend, were traveling north on Hwy. 45 and a car driven by Mrs. Allen Tackes, 34, R. 2, West Bend, collided at a driveway from the Johnson trailer court as Mrs. Tackes was leaving the court and turning south onto the highway.

The motorcycle careened onto the Sylvester Schmidt front lawn on the west side of the highway. Miss Yearling suffered facial cuts and other injuries in the mishap and Mrs. Tackes suffered severe shock. All were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, Desens and Miss Yearling in the Kewaskum ambulance.

A passing motorist, Chris Nielsen of Greendale, who was returning with his two sons from a camping trip at Mauthe lake, and other spectators gave assistance at the

accident scene. Desens was 15 years old on Saturday, the day after the mishap.

Wilbert Weinhold, 40, R. 1, Waldo, escaped injury at 2:15 p. m. Sunday in a mishap at the junction of Hwys. 45 and 28 at the north village limits. He was eastbound on 28 when his auto went out of control, ran into the ditch and struck a guide post on the left side, then crossed Hwy. 45 and went into a ditch and up against an embankment on the east side of 45. Weinhold reported that he apparently blacked out, causing the accident, and was in a dazed condition.

Three autos were involved in a crash at 1:05 a. m. Monday on Fond du Lac ave. in front of Keller's Tap. Drivers of the cars were three youths, Mike Fettig, 20, 203 South st., West Bend, Dennis M. Hutto, 18, 2814 S. 63rd st., Milwaukee, and LaVern Beder, 19, R. 5, West Bend. All of the vehicles were southbound on Fond du Lac ave. When Miss Beder turned toward the curb, Fettig struck the rear of the Hutto auto, pushing it into the rear of the Beder car. All three vehicles were damaged.

INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR; THREE NEW SISTERS ADDED TO STAFF

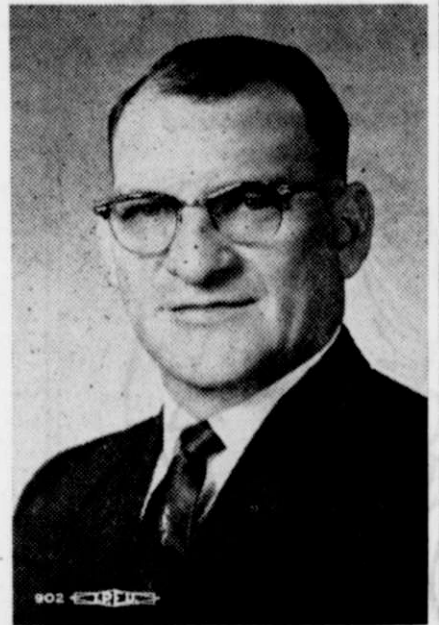

## Public Schools Will Open Tuesday, Sept. 6

The Kewaskum Public schools will open on Tuesday, Sept. 6, at 9:00 o'clock, with a record enrollment expected. The grade and high school cafeterias will begin operating on Wednesday, Sept. 7, the second day of school. Lunches for the remaining three days of the first week of school will be 75c and must be ordered and paid for on Tuesday, the first day of school.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance throughout the year. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance.

The kindergarten and grades one and two will be housed in the new elementary school building. All others, grades three through eight and special education, will be housed in the upper grades building, formerly the old high school. This year there will be two sections of grade one, two sections of grade two, one section composed of third and fourth grade pupils, one third grade, one fourth grade, and one each for grades above four.

There was a total enrollment of 376 in the elementary school during the past year and indications are that it will be larger during the 1960-1961 year.

Mr. Zarling, serving as principal of the elementary school, will teach eighth grade classes during a part of each day and for the balance of the time will attend to the administrative and supervisory duties of the school. Mr. Larsen will teach eighth grade classes for a part of each day and will have charge of the physical education program for the remainder of the day.

One hundred ten freshmen have registered for the 1960-1961 school year as compared to last year's number of 104. This year's high school enrollment is expected to exceed last year's
