Village Board Accepts Annexation Petition

Regular Meeting, October 3, 1960.
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by W. Tessar and duly carried.

Joseph Schwind, Wilmer Bunkelman, Erwin Schmitt and John Geidel voiced objection to the grade at which curbing was installed along their respective properties. The proper committee is to investigate the objection.

A delegation from the American Legion met with the board in regard to their application for a special liquor license for clubs.

The petition of residents of Meadow Lane for the construction of sidewalk was accepted and this work is to be included under the present street improvement program.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Degner:

RESOLUTION NO. 60-4 RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE BOARD ACCEPTING PETITION FOR ANNEXATION

WHEREAS, a petition for direct annexation of the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, was filed with the Village Clerk on September 27, 1960.

That part of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Nine, Township Twelve North, Range Nineteen East, Washington County, Wisconsin, described as follows: Commencing at the point of intersection of the north line of said 80 acre tract, with the westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road, said point being marked by an iron pipe and also being identified as the most easterly corner of Lot 8, Block 15 of the Assessors plat of the Village of Kewaskum, said point being south 88 degrees 54 minutes East, 1249.4 feet from the Northwest corner of said 80 acre tract; Thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East, 75 feet; thence North 89 degrees 43 minutes West 25.2 feet to the point of beginning of lands herein described;

Thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East along the westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road, 70 feet; Thence South 61 degrees 08 minutes West, 110 feet; Thence North 11 degrees 37 minutes West 117.23 feet; Thence South 89 degrees 43 minutes East, 86.13 feet to the point of beginning.

WHEREAS, the Village Clerk has investigated said petition and certified to the village board that it was signed by all of the owners of land in the territory proposed for annexation as of the date of filing of the petition and that the territory to be annexed is properly described in the petition and shown on the scale map attached thereto, is contiguous to the village of Kewaskum, and is unin-

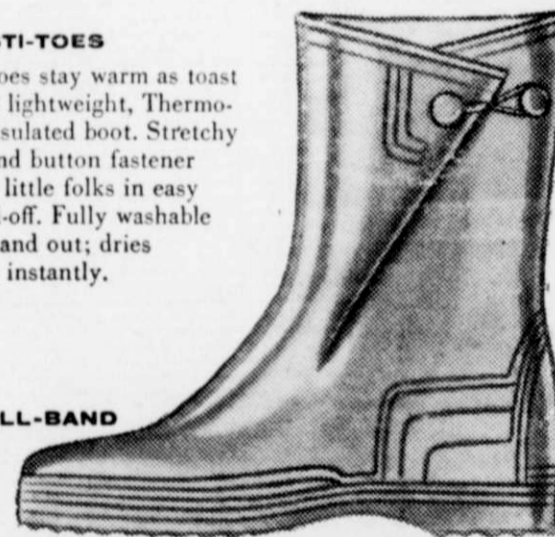

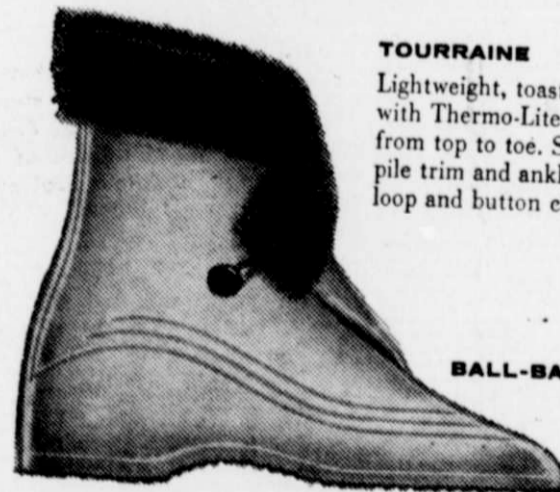

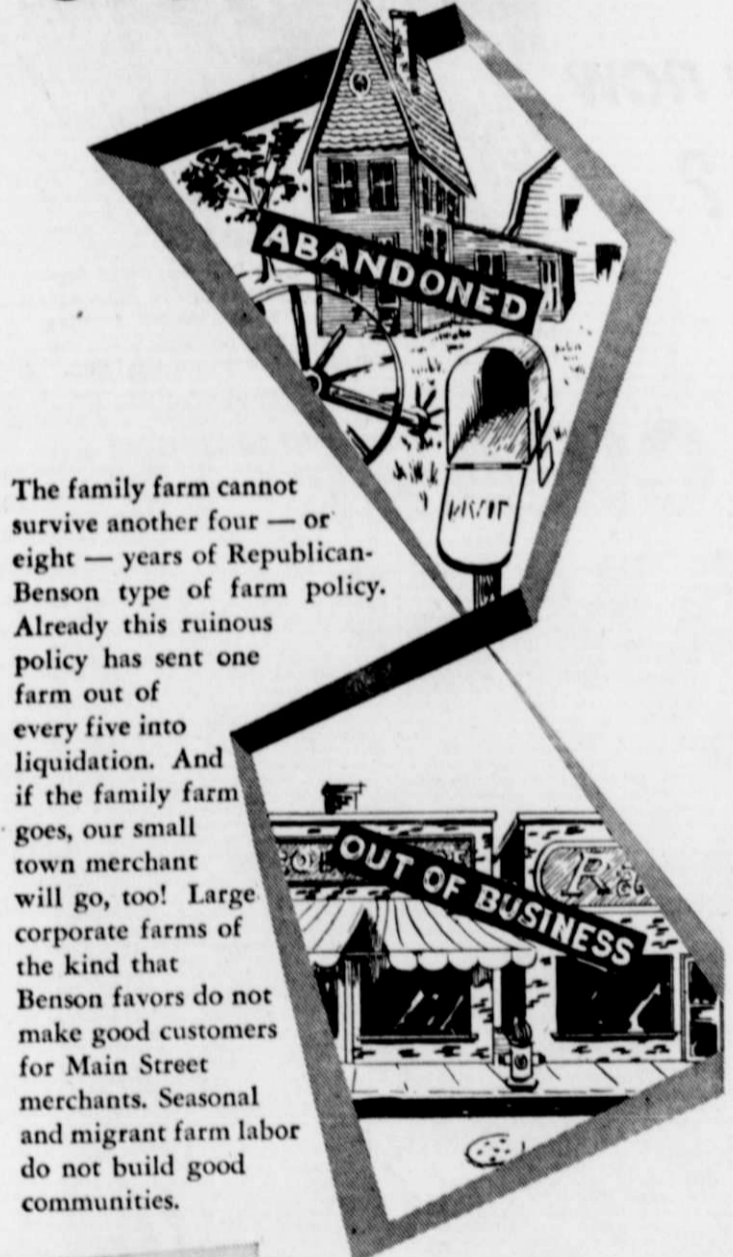
