Golf Course to Be Opened In Kewaskum By Bud Korths

COURSE BEING LAID OUT
ON FORMER HONECK FARM
WEST OF VILLAGE PARK

A golf course will be opened in Kewaskum by Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert "Bud" Korth of this village. Work on the course already is well along and it is expected to be ready for play by late next summer. Few communities of this size can boast of such recreational development.

The course is being laid out at the southeast village limits, directly east of the village park on the Korth land, formerly known as the K. A. Honeck, Sr. farm. It will be a nine-hole course to begin with but Mr. and Mrs. Korth own sufficient land to expand it into an 18-hole links, which they intend to do in the near future.

The initial nine-hole course will cover an 85-acre plot of land owned by the Korths. The second nine would be laid out on 80 acres south of this property which Korth purchased from Jim Koenen several years ago. The owners have selected the name "Honey-E-Kor" for the course. This title includes part of the names of both Korth and the maiden name (Honeck) of his wife.

The course is being laid out by Rudy Buuck of Crystal Lake, assisted by his father and brother. Several other men are also employed on the project. Buuck said that the Korth land is the most natural layout for a golf course he has ever seen.

It will be a public course, which will include the construction of a spacious clubhouse on the northwest corner of the links where the cattle barn now stands on the farm. The clubhouse will consist of a large bar-room with a Y shaped bar, lockers, shower room, recreation or gathering room and a patio on the east side. Lunches will be served and small parties will be catered to. Work on the clubhouse, which will be 40 by 80 feet in size, will be started this winter and is expected to be open for business next spring.

The course will be 3,260 yards in length and the size of all the greens will be from 3,000 to 4,000 square feet. Par for the course will be 36. Golfers will drive east. They will also end up at the clubhouse. Only one green fairway will be located within the village limits, the remainder of the course to extend into the town of Kewaskum.

Work already completed this fall includes the greens laid out and ruffed, sand traps laid out, drainage pipes and water piping for sprinkling installed. The course will contain three ponds, a drainage ditch or creek, walk-over bridges, and more trees will be planted. When the second nine is completed it will extend across the Milwaukee river at one point and one or two additional bridges will be built there.

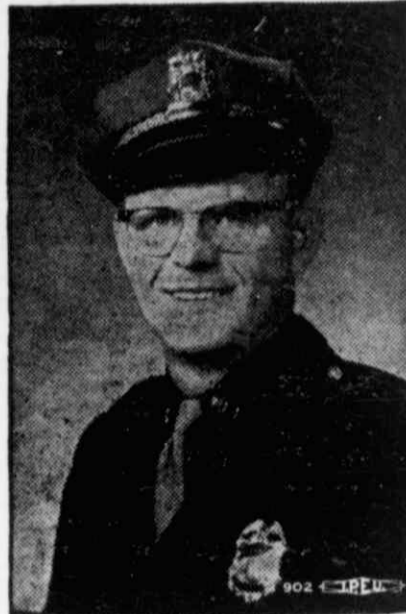

Wisconsin's corn crop was roughly two weeks late going in to September, but the warm spell speeded it along.

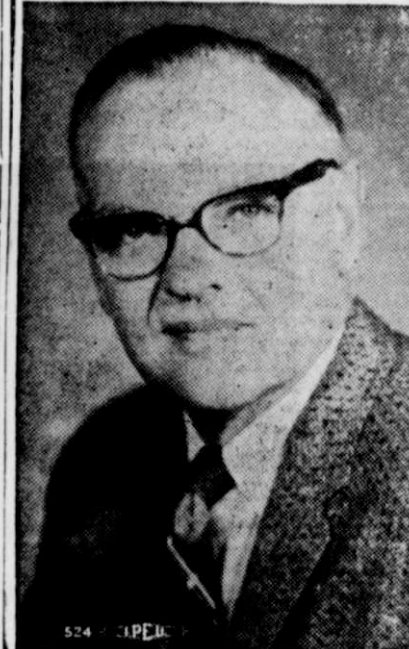

Washington county doctors again urge everyone to be protected against tetanus on Tuesday, Nov. 1. The injections will be available at each doctor's office in Washington county from 10:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 4:30 to 5:30 p. m. All adults, including those of high school age, desiring this protection are advised to see their family physician. No appointment is necessary. The special fee per shot is \$1.50.

This immunization is recommended for those who do farm work or other outdoor work, who drive or ride in cars, whose work in industry which requires the use of

tools and those who hunt, fish, or go on picnics.

To be protected against tetanus (lockjaw), a booster dose is necessary every four to five years. It is of concern that all adults take advantage of this health service to keep themselves and our country free of this dreaded disease—tetanus.

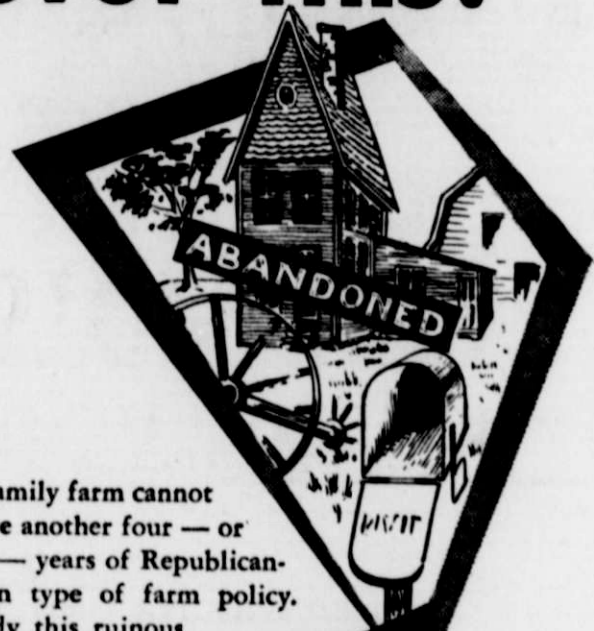

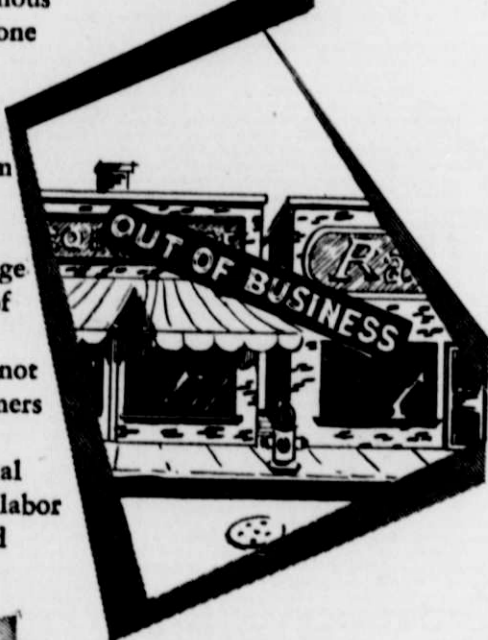
