Two Youths Taken Into Custody for Vandalism At Local Junk Car Lot

Two 16-year-old youths, one of them residing near Kewaskum and the other at Barton, who were taken into custody by Undersheriff Raymond J. Howard of Fond du Lac county in connection with vandalism at a junked car lot a short distance north of the village were turned over to the juvenile court officer at West Bend for prosecution.

Howard divulged the vandalism this week. He said that the youths had damaged windshields on 13 cars owned by Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. of Kewaskum at the lot located just outside of the Washington-Fond du Lac county line on Hwy. V. However, windshields on 28 other cars had been broken earlier, and Juvenile Officer Hugh Carpenter of the Washington county court was to question the youths on these.

In all, the damages amounted to more than \$1,600, according to an

estimate made by Kilian A. Honeck. Honeck got a list of the costs for new windshields for each car damaged and then cut the total by 50 per cent to arrive at his figure.

Howard's investigation took him to Kewaskum and Barton where identification of the two youths was made. Another boy, 12, had been with the older companions but did not participate in the vandalism, the undersheriff said. No charges will be placed against him.

Assisting Howard in his probe was Traffic Officer Miles S. Rahn of the Fond du Lac county police department.

FIREMEN PUT OUT GRASS FIRE ON SCHAEFER FARM

The fire department was called to the farm owned by William F. Schaefer in the town of Kewaskum, southeast of the village, at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday to snuff out a grass fire. The blaze started at a rubbish dump on the farm and, fanned by a strong wind, spread through high grass, threatening nearby farm buildings.

Deer Kill Very Light On Opening Week End

ONLY 9 BUCKS REGISTERED IN COUNTY; RESULTS IN NORTH ALSO POOR

The first week end of the deer hunting season showed a marked decrease in the number of hunters in Washington county and also the number of deer registered. Only nine deer were registered up to noon on the third day of the season Monday and some of these were shot in Sheboygan and Fond du Lac counties.

On the first two days of the 1959 season over 150 deer were registered in this county, 141 more than this year. Warm weather (in the 50's), water in the marshes (instead of ice) and no tracking snow (in fact none at all) accounted for the big decrease in the number of deer shot and sent many disgusted hunters home early. Conservation Warden Bob Lake said that in one township there were more men fishing and hunting ducks than there were deer hunters.

Due to the same conditions in the north woods, hunting there also was reported as poor and not too many hunters were successful. Some hunters who had intended to stay up north for several days or the entire week returned home over the week end, giving it up for a bad job.

Only a few hunters who were successful in bagging a deer reported to this office. First to report was William Edwards, who shot a large buck early the opening morning on the Leo Kaas farm in the Mauthe Lake area.

Damaging Property In State Forest Here Is Costly to Youths

Blasting public property with gunshot turned out to be an expensive form of recreation for a young Milwaukee man and four irresponsible juvenile friends, who blazed away at farm buildings in the Kettle Moraine state forest recently.

The Wisconsin Conservation Department last week received a check for \$118.62 to pay for fire-arm damages to a department building in the town of Kewaskum in Washington county. Another check for \$35.53 was paid to a nearby farmer whose property was also shot up.

James J. Junkait, 21, of 720 W. Greenfield Ave., Milwaukee, was ordered to foot the bill when he appeared in Washington county court at West Bend before Judge R. J. Stoltz. Junkait pleaded guilty to a charge of criminal damage to state and private property. He was placed on probation for one year and ordered to post a \$200 bond.

His four juvenile accomplices appeared in Milwaukee County Children's Court where they were ordered to share the damage costs.

The arrest in the case was made by Conservation Warden R. J. Lake, West Bend.

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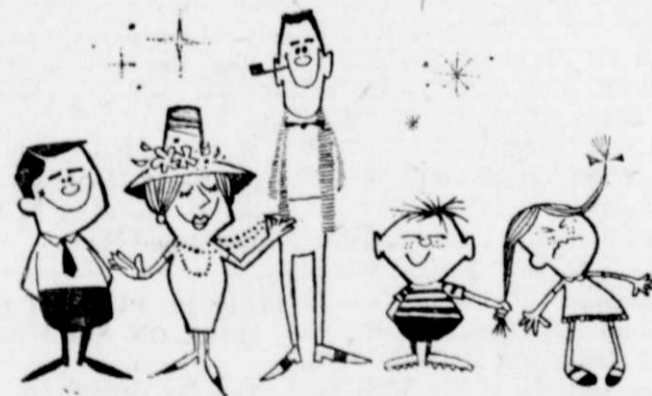

Our Police Chief Says

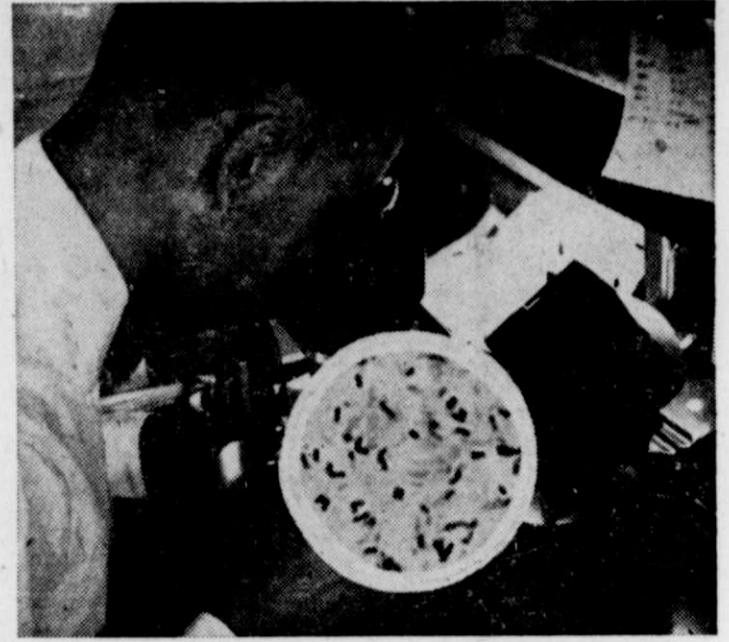

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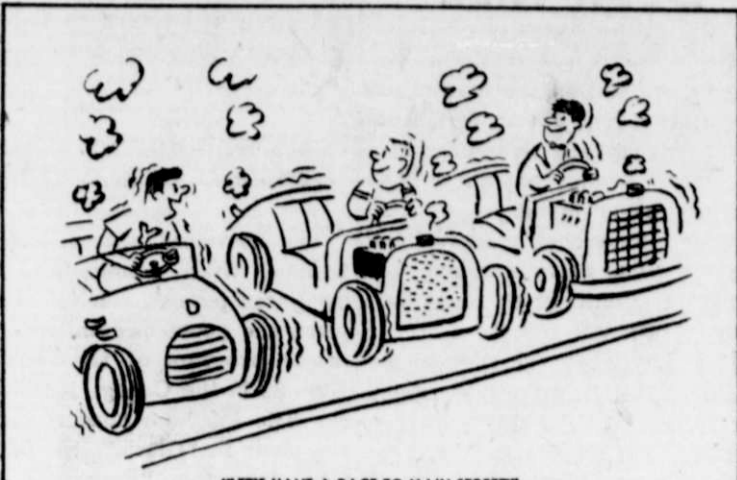
