Tax Rate Set at \$25 Per Thousand By Village Board

LEVY SAME AS LAST YEAR; BUDGET ADOPTED

Regular Meeting, December 5, 1960
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee Eberle.

Immediately preceding this meeting the public hearing was held on the proposed budget for 1960. The following items (five) on the proposed budget were corrected as follows: General property taxes for village purposes, \$39,854.02; county taxes on property, \$38,165.82; state taxes on property, \$1,744.40; vocational school tuition, \$146.94; state loan to school district, \$5,456.31. Since there were no objections to the budget as presented, the hearing was declared closed.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Degner and duly carried.

Ervin Schmidt again appeared to object to the grade of the curbing on Western Avenue abutting his property.

The commissioner was instructed to inform the engineering firm to prepare plans and specifications for the black topping of village streets so that bids could be accepted at the February meeting.

The commissioner was authorized to order the installation of street lamps at the following locations:

1 lamp on 2nd street near the malting company alley.

1 lamp on 2nd street near the westerly line of the C. & N. W. Ry. right-of-way

1 lamp about mid-block on Highland between Kewaskum and Stark Sts.

1 lamp on the south end of Park View near the sewage lift station.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Tessar:

RESOLUTION NO. 60-6

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1960, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES — \$1,744.40, at the rate of \$0.2261 per thousand.

COUNTY TAXES — \$38,165.82, at the rate of \$4.96591 per thousand.

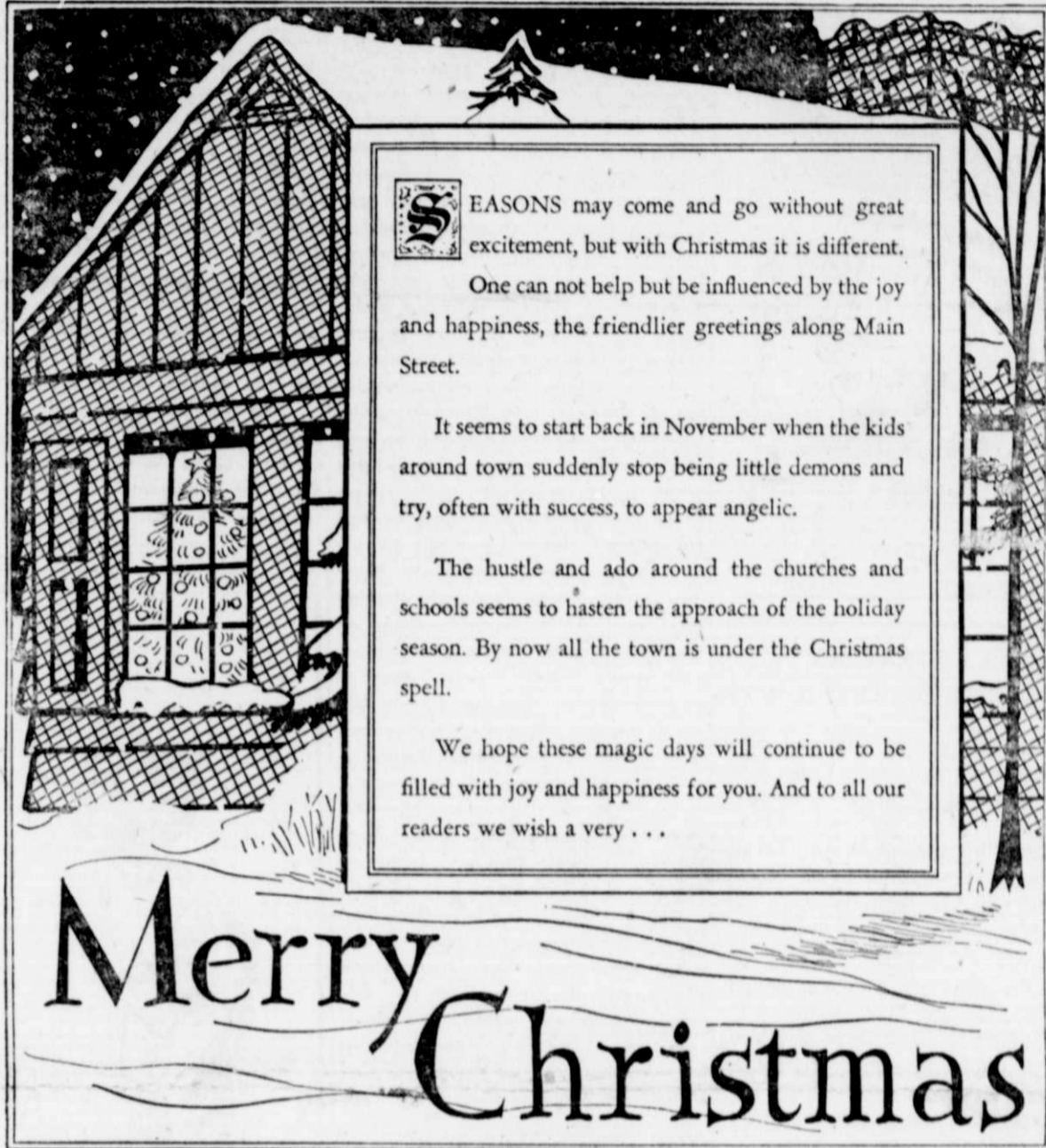
SCHOOL TAXES—District No. 1 and No. 2, \$107,511.15, at the rate of \$13.91603 per thousand.

STATE LOAN TO SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2—\$5,456.31, at the rate of \$0.70722 per thousand.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL TAX —\$146.94, at the rate of \$0.01905 per thousand.

VILLAGE TAXES, INCLUDES DEBT RETIREMENT AND INTEREST—\$39,854.02 at the rate of \$5.16569 per thousand.

Highs Edged By Fondy in Overtime, Trim Germantown

The Kewaskum Indians again broke even in two contests the past week. At home Friday they easily trimmed Washington High of Germantown, 77-60, and Tuesday at North Fondy they lost a real heartbreaker in overtime, 72-70. The Orioles' win and Grafton's upset over Pewaukee left three teams in a tie for first place.

Fondy came from behind on a wing and a prayer to edge the Indians. They were down by 19 points in the second quarter and still trailed by eight with a minute to go in the game. Then the almost impossible happened as they tied the score and forced the game into overtime.

Jim Hickey led a final surge with four free throws and Crowley connected on a jump shot with 10 seconds of play left to knot things at 64-64. Crowley opened the overtime with a jump that was on target but the Indians' Kons Sadownikow counted with a set to tie it again. Bob Bosin made it 68-66 for the Orioles and then Kewaskum's John Thorn evened it again with a pair of free throws. Crowley delivered again on a jump to make it 70-68 but Thorn came back with two more gift throws. Bob Kleinke finally decided the issue with 10 seconds to go by hitting on a set shot.

The two teams were knotted at the end of the quarter 16-16, but Kewaskum took a big lead at the intermission, 41-28, with a good second period. The Orioles dwined

the lead to 53-44 going into the final quarter and you know what happened after that.

Leading scorers for the Indians were Bill Koepke with 19 points, Sadownikow with 14, Tom Bartelt 12 and Thorn 11. Hickey with 21 points, Moore 14 and Haase 13 paced the winners.

Kewaskum has been an up and down team. It's hard to figure how the Indians beat Grafton, 71-64, Grafton whipped North Fondy, 71-47, and then Fondy turns around and shades Kewaskum.

Koepke and Otto Ramthun led the Indians in their 77-60 victory over Germantown Friday, each picking up 22 points to spark the win. Knepel paced the Warhawks with 21.

The Indians outscored Germantown in every period but the third and led at halftime by a very comfortable 40-23 margin.

The Indians will now be idle over the holidays, playing their next game on Jan. 4, a non-conference game here against Lomira. Then on Friday, Jan. 6, they face the league leaders at Pewaukee.

ICE FISHING CHANGES JAN. 1; ALLOW 3 TIPUPS, MUST HAVE OWNER'S NAME

A buck deer was killed Saturday evening at the Sheboygan-Washington county line northwest of Boltonville. Archers continue their hunt for the animals. However, to my knowledge only one has been taken in either Washington or Ozaukee counties this fall.

The trapping season for mink and muskrat closed Dec. 19 in most counties of the state. The season on raccoon will close Dec. 31.

The 1960 fishing license expires Dec. 31. The 1961 issue is available at all license depots. Your ice fishing shanty or shelter must have your name and address printed on the building in a legible manner.

There are large numbers of tagged walleyes in Pike lake. Tags from these fish may be left at the Eiche farm on the east shore, Daehn's landing or McComb's Resort on the west shore.

Tags taken from walleyes caught at Lake Winnebago should

be turned over to the local conservation warden or mailed direct to the Wisconsin Conservation Dept., Box 358, Oshkosh, Wis.

As of Jan. 1, 1961 the owner must have his name on all tipups used for ice fishing in Wisconsin. Lake Winnebago is the only body of water where three tipups may be used for ice fishing after Jan. 1.

Now is the time when you either have or will move your ice fishing shanty onto the lakes. Let's not forget what happened in past years—it could happen again.

You will remember in past years an excessive amount of snow, especially late in the winter, made removal of your shanty a real problem.

We recall a great many individuals stating in past years that they had not used their shanty for several months and how were they to get them off now with all the snow? This, of course, was a reasonable question under the circumstances, but now let's not forget our past year's experiences.

We would suggest that when you feel you may not use your shanty regularly, you remove it from the ice, or at least move it near shore. Also, the weatherman did a pretty good job of forecasting those big storms in past years, and this year, when he makes such predictions, it would be wise to get your shanty near shore so

it can be removed if necessary.

Each year when the time for removing shanties comes, several of them are still on the lake. Arrests are necessary and we hear all kinds of excuses and get many complaints.

Most of the complaints come from boaters and those who own property along the lakes. Debris of this kind in the water is a real hazard to boaters and, of course, when it drifts to the shore of a property owner, it is a real mess. So let's remember when we put those shanties out this year, it is your responsibility to move them from the ice on or before March 5.

Another word of caution, each fish shanty must have the name and address of the owner or occupant painted on the outside thereof, in such a manner as to be readily seen and read at all times. This must be on the structure itself and not just on a piece of paper or board attached to the structure.

Use care with your smokes during the holidays. Every fourth fire, according to studies by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, is caused by matches and smoking. Make sure there are plenty of ash trays about this Yule Season if there are smokers in your house. Empty trays frequently. And make sure any fire in trays is out before emptying.

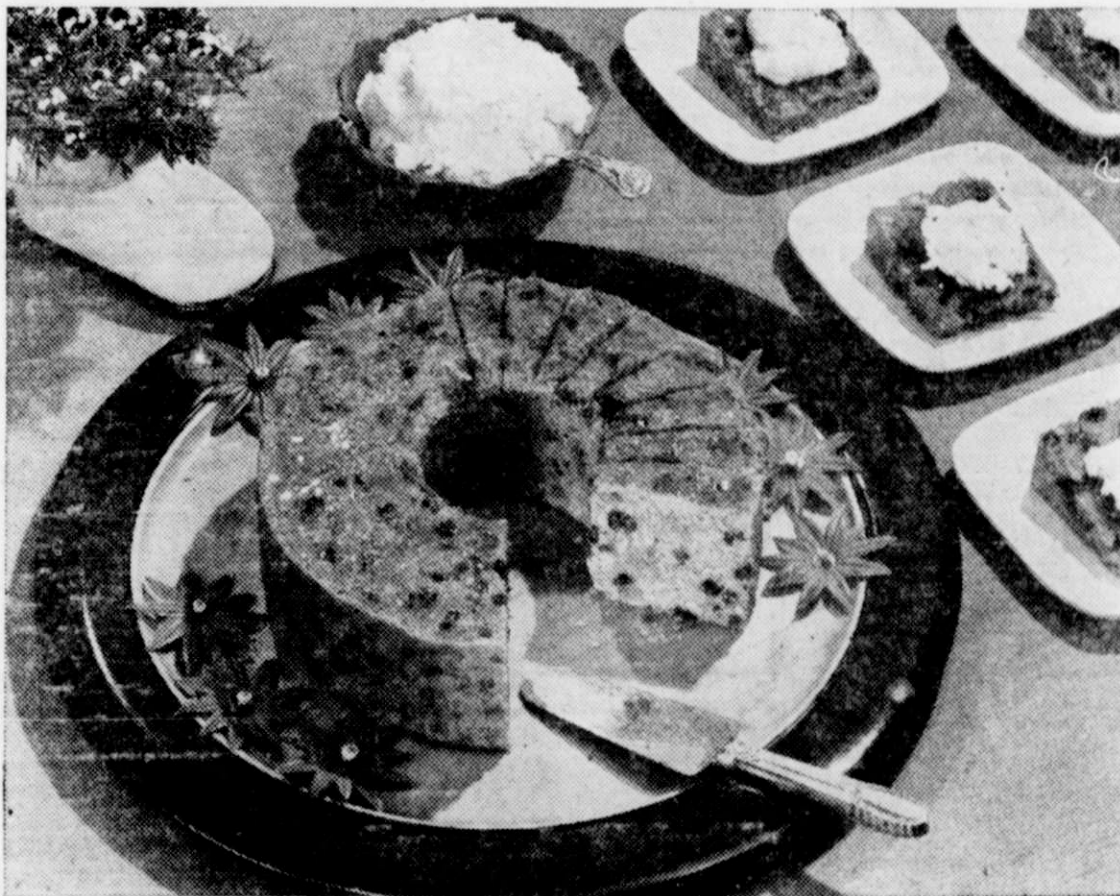

An Old Favorite . . . Baked Plum Pudding



For centuries the English have served plum pudding at holiday time, and it is a real part of the festivities. But it is as welcome in our homes today as it was in the castles of the feudal English lords and in the cottages of their serfs. Plum pudding has always been a wonderful way to say Merry Christmas and a Very Happy New Year.

A big plum pudding, topped with lots of creamy-rich buttery hard sauce is a perfect ending to any festive meal. And when both the plum pudding and the hard sauce have that extra-special flavor that only butter can contribute, people will be sure to come back for a second piece. For butter is one of nature's most flavorful foods and it retains its natural flavor throughout any cooking process.

Instead of steaming this pudding, the batter is baked in a ring mold or a spring form pan in the oven. It's easy and quick to prepare, and tastes as if you have spent hours working on it. Bread crumbs form the base, and there are raisins, dates, currants, and candied orange and lemon peels

in it in addition to orange juice for moistness.

Butter and confectioner's sugar are the main ingredients for the hard sauce, which can be put in the center of the ring if desired. When you're planning to serve a number of people, increase the recipe one-half and you'll have a pudding that will serve sixteen, for it takes only a small piece of this delicious cake for dessert, it is so rich. In this case it will have to be baked longer, however. For a snack at tree trimming time, this pudding is without equal. It can be prepared in advance like a fruit cake and kept for weeks in aluminum foil. If it is then baked in the oven in its aluminum foil, it will be just like it was when originally made.

BAKED PLUM PUDDING

2 qt. ring mold 8-10 servings
250°, 50-55 minutes

1 cup sugar
½ cup butter
6 eggs
½ cup orange juice
1 cup chopped dates
¼ cup chopped lemon peel
¼ cup chopped orange peel

¼ cup currants
½ cup light raisins
½ cup dark raisins
1 cup pecans
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups dry bread crumbs
2 teaspoons cinnamon
½ teaspoon cloves
½ teaspoon allspice

Sift the sugar. Cream the butter and add the sugar to this. Beat the eggs in one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine the chopped fruit, pecans, and flour. Add to the egg mixture. Combine the bread crumbs and spices and add this to the batter. Add the orange juice and pour into a greased waxed paper lined 2 quart pan. Since this cake does not rise, the batter can fill the pan. Bake for 50-55 minutes in a 250° oven. Serve warm with hard sauce.

HARD SAUCE

½ cup (1 stick) butter
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
Cream the butter and add the salt and vanilla. Then add the sifted confectioner's sugar and mix well. Chill and serve.

Winter Wonder—Mincemeat Baked Alaska



Bring a bit of the wintertime wonderland of drifting snow to the holiday party with this glistening dessert—Mincemeat Baked Alaska. Beneath the swirl of lightly baked meringue, is a bakers' layer cake, generously covered with mincemeat ice cream for the holiday flavor.

A dessert to talk about—it can be made in advance and held in the freezer. Or, days ahead, an uniced cake layer is purchased from baker or food mart, the ice cream filling made and both frozen. The recipe has a slick trick for handling the ice cream. At serving time, the meringue is drifted over the layers and the dessert baked for just five minutes at 450° F. Serve the Alaska with the fan fare of jingle bells.

Mincemeat Baked Alaska

- 1 pint vanilla ice cream
- 1/2 cup prepared mincemeat
- 3 egg whites
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 (8-inch) bakers' yellow or white cake layer

Soften ice cream slightly and fold in mincemeat. Line a (2-quart) shallow (7-inch) skillet or saucepan with waxed paper, allowing paper to extend above sides of pan. Pack mincemeat-ice cream into pan. Freeze until firm. When ready to serve: Beat egg whites until foamy, but not stiff. Add sugar gradually, beating after each addition. Continue beating until mixture is shiny and holds peaks. Blend in vanilla. Lift ice cream from pan by paper; turn upside down onto cake. Remove paper. Cover all with meringue. Bake at 450° F. for 5 minutes, or until lightly browned. Serve immediately.

COUNTY'S PATIENTS IN TB HOSPITALS INCREASE

Washington was one of 22 counties which showed an increase during 1959 in the number of patients treated in Wisconsin TB sanatoriums.

Totals of hospitalized patients were 22 in 1958 and 30 in 1959. For Wisconsin as a whole, the corresponding totals were 3,298 in 1958 and 3,024 in 1959, a decline of 8 per cent.

These facts were revealed in the county-by-county analysis of Wisconsin's TB situation, compiled and issued by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association as one of its Christmas Seal-supported social research studies.

Through its annual Christmas Seal campaign, the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association raises funds to carry on a year-round program of x-ray and tuberculin testing clinics, health education, research and other TB control activities. The campaign continues through December.
