## Foreign Educator to Spend 3 Weeks at High School Observing Administrative Procedures

TEACHER FROM CEYLON TO BE HOUSE GUEST AT ROSE HOME DURING STAY

The Wisconsin State Department of Public Instruction has invited Kewaskum Community High school to participate in the teacher development program which is a part of the International Educational Exchange program of the Department of State of the United States. The program provides opportunities for qualified foreign educators, including teachers, administrators and supervisors, teacher training specialists and officials of the ministries of education to gain knowledge of the United States' educational methods and systems at the elementary and secondary levels through: (1) attendance at especially arranged seminars and courses in teaching education in institutions of higher learning in the United States; (2) observation of selected school systems and visitations to various educational institutions; (3) opportunities for other educational and cultural experiences in travel; (4) participation in typical school and community activities.

About 400 participants in the Teacher Development program representing 59 countries arrived in Washington, D. C., early last September for a two week orientation program designed to give them an introduction to American life and the fundamentals of education in the United States. They visited places of interest, including schools, exhibits and historical places, participated in educational programs and historical events, visited in American homes and enjoyed a free exchange of ideas with Americans and their fellow educators from many parts of the world.

At the end of their two week orientation period in Washington, D. C., groups of 20-25 were assigned to eight universities for an especially arranged seminar of 3-4 months. Following the university phase, the participants in the Teacher Development program were assigned in small groups (9 in Wisconsin) to a State Department of Education in different geographical areas to study and observe different school systems. It is in this phase of the International Education program that Kewaskum Community High school will be a participant. Other Wisconsin high schools participating are: Two Rivers, Manitowoc, Preble of Green Bay, Oshkosh, Whitefish Bay, Brookfield and Nicolet of Glendale.

Following the three weeks visit in individual schools the educators will return to Washington, D. C., where they will meet with the Office of Education aid Department of State Officials in an evaluation session. They will prepare reports on their activities and will share experiences with each other during their one week stay before departing for their native homes. It is the hope of the participating nations that with a free exchange of ideas on a cultural level a better understanding of the world

Clarence Hammen of Kewaskum, past president; greetings from the United Church Women of Wisconsin by Mrs. Aaron Klug and from the Greater Milwaukee Council of Churches by its president, Calvin Evans. The Rev. R. J. Kalwitz, pastor of the host church, will offer the invocation, and the Rev. J. Milton Nelson, president of the Superior Conference of the Augustana Lutheran church, will give the benediction. The Rev. Carl W. Stromberg, Madison, president of the Wisconsin Council of Churches, will be toastmaster for the evening.

"Our Oneness in Christ" will be the subject of the talk by Bishop Ensley, who will offer a re-examination of the denominations' obligations toward the councillor movement. Bishop Ensley is also a distinguished author and contributor, having written "John Wesley, Evangelist," "Paul's Letter to Local Churches," "The Marks of" (CONTINUED ON PAGE FIVE)

## 1961 Poster Child for March of Dimes Is Victim of Two Grave Birth Defects

Linda Gail Breese, a pictorial and high-spirited young lady of four, who lives in Columbus, Ohio, was named this week as the 1961 New March of Dimes National Poster Child.

Selection of the vivacious child, a victim of the grave birth defects of an open spine and excess fluid on the brain, was announced by Basil O'Connor, president of The National Foundation, parent body of the New March of Dimes. Study and patient aid in birth defects and arthritis, together with continued work in polio, embody the expanded program of the health organization.

In January, during which the New March of Dimes will be held throughout the nation, Linda will probably feel she is facing mirrors everywhere she travels. That's because millions of posters will bear her likeness which, in drawings and photographs, will also be published in thousands of newspapers and magazines. The blonde and blue-eyed child will also appear on network television.

Linda's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Dean E. Breese. Her father is an industrial engineer. Her mother, Dorothy Lohr Breese, in addition to Linda has another daughter, Susan, 14, and two sons, Ronnie, 12, and Terry, six. Tragically, since there is

handicapped Linda among the Breese children, Ronnie is a victim of cerebral palsy but his general physical condition is described as good.

Mrs. Breese has been a Mothers' Marcher for the annual March of Dimes.

"My husband and I are deeply grateful that at last something constructive is being done about birth defects," she says. "We pray that The National Foundation which, through public contributions to the March of Dimes, financed the development of the Salk polio vaccine, will in time also solve the puzzle of birth defects, which are the largest unmet childhood medical problem in our country today."

Emphasizing the enormity of the problem, Mrs. Breese cited statistics showing that 250,000 infants in the United States are born annually with significant birth defects. Also, because of these congenital malformations, 34,000 babies a year in the nation are stillborn or die in the first four weeks of life.

Linda underwent surgery to close her spine when she was less than a day old. The operation was performed at Children's Hospital, Columbus, where The National Foundation with March of Dimes funds established the nation's first Birth Defects Study Center a few months ago. Nine months

later, she again had surgery for excess fluid on the brain, and the little girl today wears a "shunt" tube to drain off this liquid. Linda also uses crutches but has been able to discard her leg braces.

Recently, while helping her mother wash dishes, she took three steps without her crutches—a memorable and hopeful event.

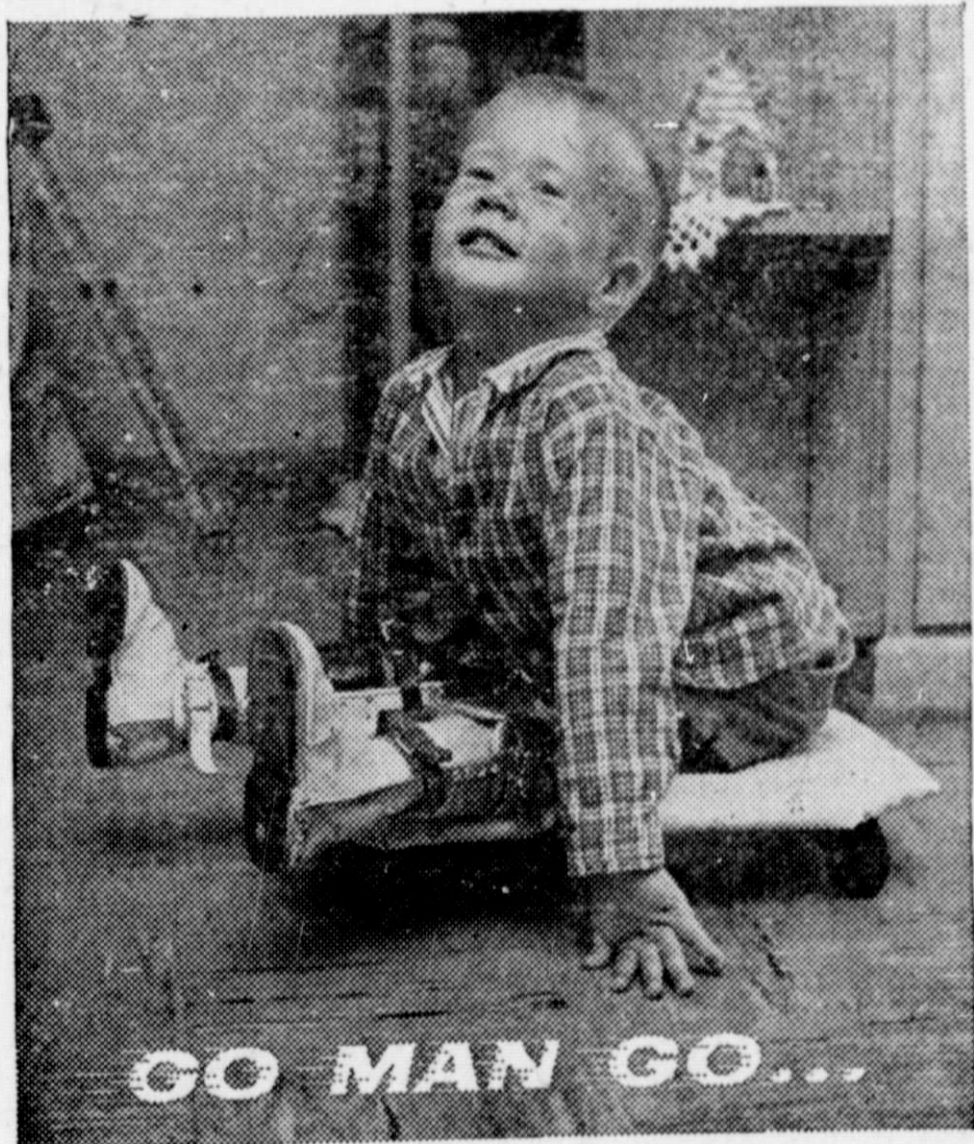

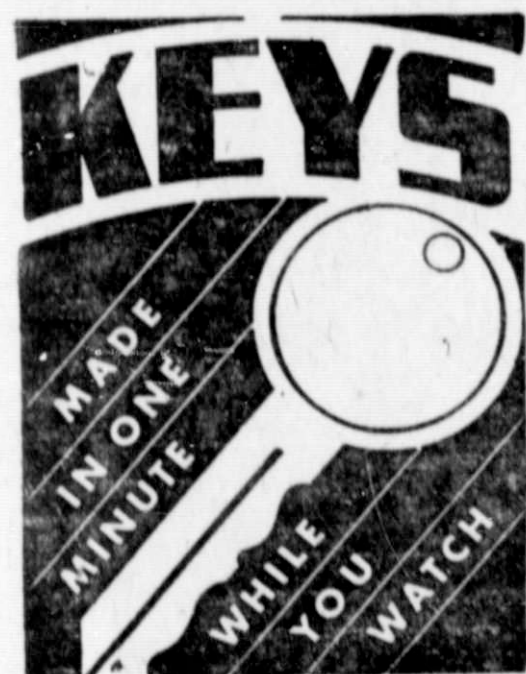

### TOTAL DEER KILL BY CARS IN COUNTY IN 1960 IS 45

The Wisconsin Conservation Department requires annual reports from those who have the following licenses: Bait dealers, deer farms, private fish hatcheries, game bird and animal farms, fur farms and operators of wildlife exhibits. Such reports are to be mailed to our Madison office at this time.

The number of ice fishing shanties on local lakes increases each year. Fishing thru the ice to date has been only fair to mediocre, yet the number of ice fishermen increases also.

The car kill of deer continues to mount. The 1960 figures are as

follows: Washington county 45, Ozaukee county 15. This is double the gun kill during the past season for the two counties.

Fishing continues to be fair on local lakes, perch and walleyes at Pike lake, bluegills and northers at Little Cedar, perch and bluegills at Big Cedar. Long lake has produced some fairly large perch.

I note in the state papers that the authorities of Waukesha county plan to prohibit the driving of cars on their lakes. Far sighted officials of the towns of Hartford and West Bend passed such an ordinance about ten years ago. They are to be complimented. No one will ever know the lives they may have saved. These small, spring fed, deep water Kettle-Morraine lakes are not to be trusted with heavy vehicular traffic.

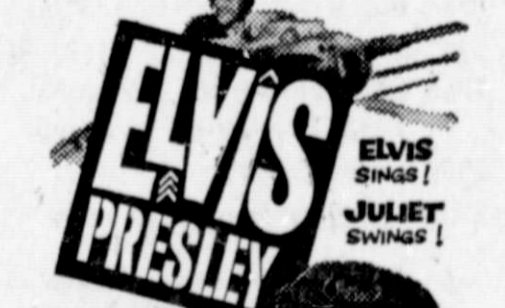

### Around the Town

They were bloody and gruesome but very educational as well for first aid personnel. Various wounds and injuries and how they happened were shown. First aid corps on the scene demonstrated how to stop the flow of blood, proper bandaging, preventing them from being fatal wounds, applying temporary splints, keeping the patients from choking on blood from head and internal wounds, making the patient as comfortable as possible, preventing them from going into a state of shock, preventing broken necks and backs from becoming fatal, and other life-saving methods. It would be beneficial for all persons to learn a lesson in first aid from this film. We were informed that the pictures were shown to a grade school class of 65 pupils and only 15 of the nerviest ones were still around at the end.

All members of the fire department were registered and fingerprinted by the C-D Corps this week for identification in fire-rescue emergency assignments. These are kept on file and an official card carried on the person of each member. Only bad part of it now that we're on file is that we'll have to be so careful on the next job we pull not to leave
