Barton Youth Held on \$2,000 Bond After Wounding 2 Girls In Shooting at Local Minor Bar

Girls Ready to Leave Hospital **After Surgery**

MAN IS DISARMED BY OWNER, SEIZED BY PATRONS AFTER INCIDENT

Two girls were wounded in a shooting at Steve and Mary's minor bar on Hwy. 45 a short distance north of Kewaskum last Sunday night. The girls, one of them from Kewaskum and the other from Random Lake, were victims of a shot fired by a Barton youth who sat next to them at the bar.

Wounded were Miss Bonnie Carroll Stahl, 18, of Random Lake and Miss Maureen Borchert, 20, of Kewaskum. The bullet passed through the thighs of both of Miss Stahl's legs and then entered the calf and lodged in the bone of Miss Borchert's left leg.






