## Barton Youth Held on \$2,000 Bond After Wounding 2 Girls In Shooting at Local Minor Bar

### Girls Ready to Leave Hospital After Surgery

**MAN IS DISARMED BY OWNER, SEIZED BY PATRONS AFTER INCIDENT**

Two girls were wounded in a shooting at Steve and Mary's minor bar on Hwy. 45 a short distance north of Kewaskum last Sunday night. The girls, one of them from Kewaskum and the other from Random Lake, were victims of a shot fired by a Barton youth who sat next to them at the bar.

Wounded were Miss Bonnie Carroll Stahl, 18, of Random Lake and Miss Maureen Borchert, 20, of Kewaskum. The bullet passed through the thighs of both of Miss Stahl's legs and then entered the calf and lodged in the bone of Miss Borchert's left leg.

Held at the Washington county jail in West Bend in connection with the shooting is George J. Heinecke, 21, of Barton. Witnesses claim that Heinecke had entered the minor bar shortly before the shooting with a companion, John P. Norton, 24, of West Bend. According to Steve Rahn, who operates the bar with his wife Mary, Heinecke apparently drew the gun from his belt and fired from his seat at the bar. The bullet struck the two girls who were seated to Heinecke's left.

Officers called to the scene reported that before the shooting Heinecke had remarked to another patron at the bar, "I need money," and showed the gun in his belt. It is believed that someone may have said something to him and he pulled out the gun, a new .32 caliber police revolver, and fired in the direction of the girls' legs. It was not known whether the shooting was deliberate or accidental but Heinecke told officers who questioned him Monday that he could give no reason for the shooting.

Rahn reported that he had just bent over back of the bar to pick up a case of beer from the floor in front of Heinecke when the gun discharged. Startled he did not realize at first what had happened but then saw Heinecke was holding a gun. When he asked "what happened" he said that Heinecke replied "Firecracker, firecracker." Steve leaped over the bar and grabbed Heinecke and took the gun which he had started to put in his pocket. At the same time he called to his wife, "He's got a gun."

Witnesses said that Heinecke then walked into a washroom and dumped the remaining bullets he had into a toilet. Other excited customers grabbed him and held him after a hard struggle until Chief of Police Roland Pledl and a doctor from Kewaskum arrived. Chief Pledl immediately placed handcuffs on the man. They were

### 25 Years Ago

The truck turned over and was held up by the post on the brink of a 30-foot drop. Reysen was thrown out of the truck and rolled down the incline where he was found by a Sheboygan county traffic officer in a dazed condition, in a direct line with the suspended truck.

Paul Landmann submitted to a successful appendicitis operation at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac.

A number from here were at Hartford Saturday night to attend the dance at the Schwartz ballroom featuring Wayne King, and his famed radio orchestra.

The past weeks have been moving weeks for the Kewaskum Statesman. Due to the fact that Walter Schneider, owner of the building on Fond du Lac ave. formerly occupied by the Statesman, has made plans to alter the building and open a new business, we moved to a new location. It is across from Holy Trinity school on Main st.

Work on the new dam being built on the Milwaukee river in connection with the new public park project in this village is now underway. The dam will take in about 1400 feet of 7 acres of river

frontage. The measurement of the dam will be 147 feet overall with a spilling of 92 feet. A foot walk will be built over the dam. The pond is to be dredged to a depth of 3 feet and 250 feet wide for swimming and boating. Bath houses will also be erected. The river will be widened 8 to 12 feet, stones from the park placed on the shoreline, and the entire river area cleared of rubbish. The dam will raise the river 9 inches. The wooded section of the park will be made suitable for bird and life sanctuary. There will be 2 entrances to the park and parking space on the flats. Gravel walks and a picnic grounds will be constructed as well as a band stand erected. At the highest point upstream the river is being prepared for a ski-slide, sledding, etc. Land for the project was purchased from K. A. Honeck and Mrs. Alvina Backhaus. Funds for the park and dam are made possible through a federal grant of \$19,028.23 and \$5,038.00 from the village. There are 35 men from Fillmore, Barton, Kewaskum and Boltonville employed on the project, which is expected to be completed in several months. The project is sponsored by President A. L. Rosenheimer Jr., acting for the village council and park planning board.

#### FIFTY YEARS AGO

Jan. 14, 1911

We are in a receipt of a letter from Thomas Manning that he is now attending the Marquette Medical college at Milwaukee. Mr. Manning formerly had charge of the grammar department of the local school for two years.

While Andrew Martin Sr. was going across lots to the Fred Backhaus farm from Henry Klumb's place to Kewaskum he saw something in the air at an altitude of about 800 ft, coming from the south and going east to Kewaskum. It came within a mile of him and he made out it was a balloon. It was one of the balloons which left St. Louis and was entered in the international balloon race.

Sunday morning while Henry Koenen and son William were attending mass fire broke out in

their barn just outside of the village limits, burning it to the ground. Mrs. Koenen and children tried to save the horses but failed.

Wm. Luedtke, 19, son of the Fred Luedtkes of the town of Kewaskum, broke his leg below the knee while coon hunting with two companions. The trio treed a coon and in attempting to capture it they chopped down the tree, which, in falling, pinned Luedtke's leg.

The death of Mrs. Lena Eichstaedt, 79, occurred at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Brunner, in this village.

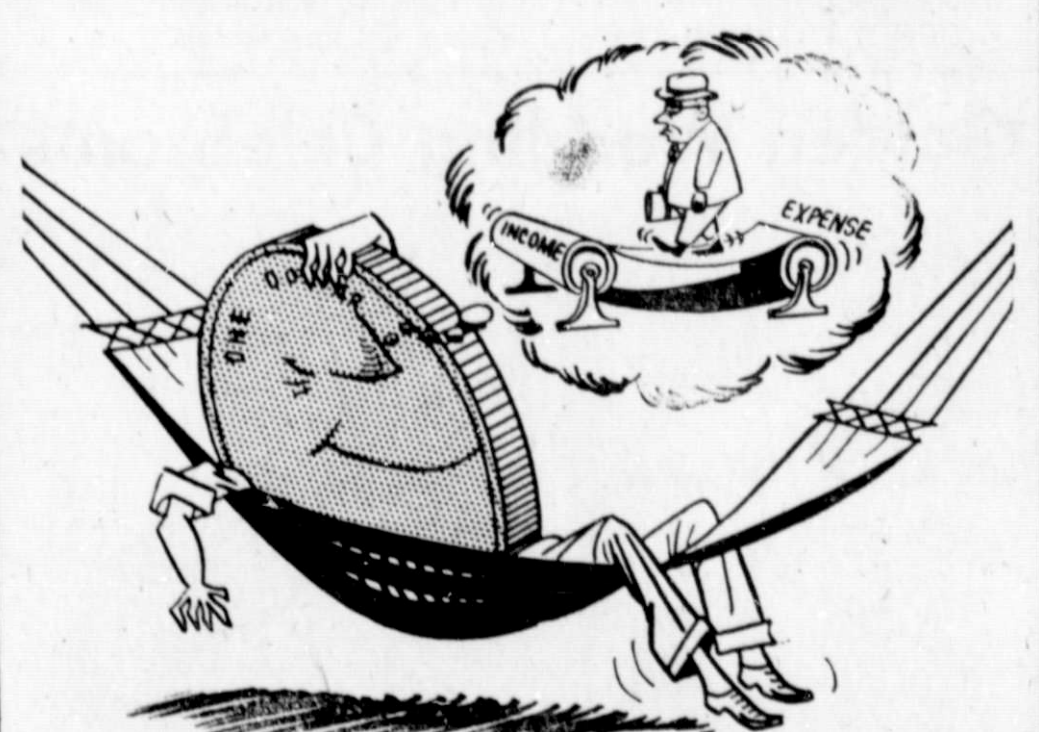

**County Men to Attend State Highway Session**

County highway commissioners and committee members from throughout Wisconsin will meet in Milwaukee next week Tuesday through Thursday (Jan. 24-26) for their 48th annual Mid-Winter Highway conference.

Officials invited to attend from Washington county include Albert Rettler, West Bend; Adolph Lofy, Hubertus; Reuben Schmahl, Jackson; John Kratz, West Bend, members of the county highway com-

mittee.

Gov. Gaylord Nelson will address the opening session of the conference. Other main speakers include Chairman Harvey Grasse, G. H. Bakke and V. L. Fiedler, state highway commissioners, and A. J. Thelen, executive secretary, Wisconsin County Boards association. Out of state speakers include Fred B. Farrell, Chicago, regional engineer, Bureau of Public Roads; Robert S. 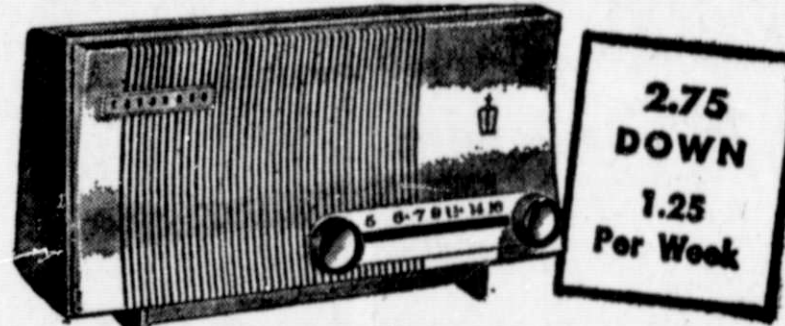

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) summoned by Mrs. Rahn, who also called the local rescue squad and ambulance. Deputy Sheriffs Wilbur Ruffing and Donald Mertens also arrived and helped quell Heinecke and remove him to jail where he was turned over to the custody of the sheriff's department, which began their investigation.

The shooting occurred about 10:45 p. m. and officers reported that there were still about 35 young patrons in the crowded bar when they arrived. When Sheriff William Johnson and members of his department tried to recon-

struct the shooting Monday, Heinecke claimed he did not remember much what had happened.

The wounded girls were helped to a kitchen off the tavern and after being given medical aid at the scene by the physician, they were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the ambulance. They submitted to surgery at the hospital Monday morning when the bullet was also removed from Miss Borchert's leg. Both were reported later this week as doing fine and they expect to be released from the hospital this weekend, probably Friday. Miss Stahl, whose parents are deceased, lives with Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Guenther at Random Lake. Miss Borchert is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Borchert, 127 Elm st.

He was charged under Sec. 940.23 of Wisconsin Statutes for causing "great bodily harm to another human being by conduct imminently dangerous to another and evincing a depraved mind, regardless of human life." The charge carries a prison term of "not more than 10 years."

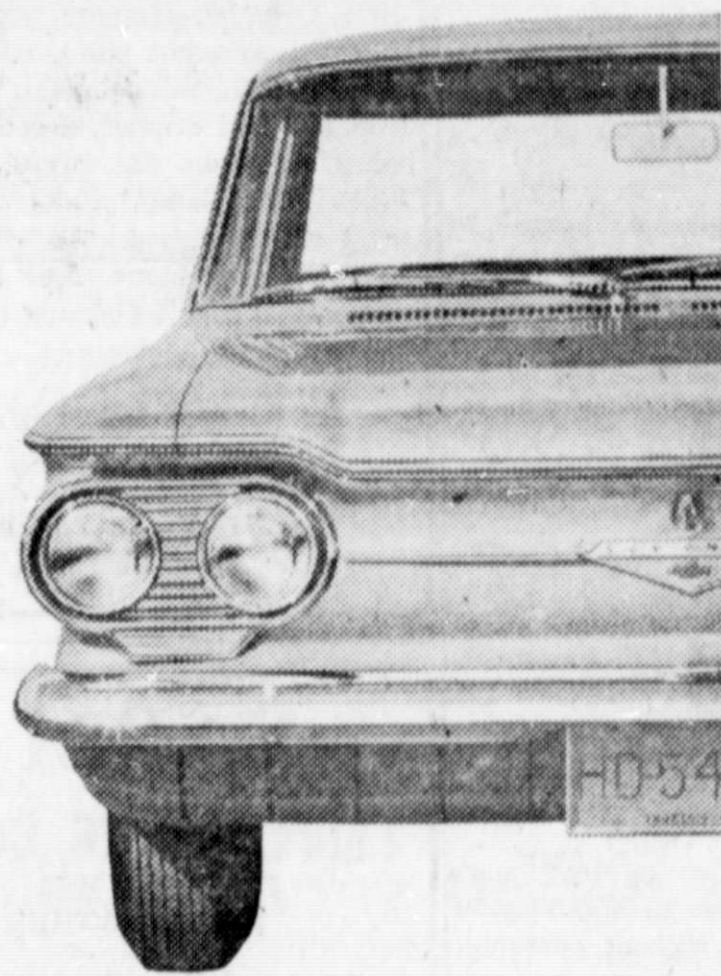
