AFS Seeking Foster Home for Foreign Exchange Student

Student to Attend Local High School For One Year Term

STEERING COMMITTEE IS FORMED TO ORGANIZE PROGRAM

The Kewaskum American Field Service organization desires to place a foreign student at Kewaskum Community High school when school opens next September.

To achieve this, a foster home must be obtained. Any family interested is asked to contact the high school as soon as possible. The qualifications for anyone interested in becoming foster parents are that they have a student in high school and are willing to accept this foreign boy or girl as a member of their family, not as an outsider, and live within the city limits of Kewaskum.

The AFS program was initiated in Kewaskum by the high school student council. On Jan. 26, the community organization was established as a result of this meeting. A steering committee consisting of Ernest Mitchell, Charles Miller and Rev. Clarence Hammen was formed. The committee contacted members of the community and the following will serve on a committee to organize the program: Paula Petri, Giles Wierman, Mrs. Pat Peterson, Mrs. Agnes Schaefer, John Stellflug, Robert Kroncke, Sr. and Clifford Rose.

The school branch of the American Field Service was organized on Jan. 30. The members of the AFS met with the student councils and officers and advisors of the school organizations on Feb. 1. The AFS program was presented and ways of raising money were discussed. It was suggested that all organizations work on the project and contribute to help obtain the \$650 needed by Feb. 15 to make this project possible.

The American Field Service is an organization designed to bring young people from other countries to study in an American high school for a year. In this way both American and foreign students can benefit from an exchange of ideas. What better way is there to learn from a person who lives there?

Anyone interested and willing to contribute to the fund or desirous of being a foster parent is asked to contact the high school.

The dedication was very well attended by parishoners and friends of the congregation who made it a complete success.

The dedication service was held at 10:15 a. m. with the Rev. Robert C. Stanger, D. D., president of Elmhurst college, Elmhurst, Ill., and former vice-president of the

Evangelical and Reformed church, as guest speaker. The Rev. Paul C. Kehle, D. D., Waukesha, president of South Wisconsin Synod, also participated in the service. The three church choirs provided special music.

Celine Simon High School Homemaker of Tomorrow

Celine Marcella Simon has been named the 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Kewaskum high school.

Having received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes by graduating seniors in her school, she becomes a candidate for the state Homemaker of Tomorrow award which will be announced in March.

Each school Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive an award pin, representing the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is." The examination papers of school Homemakers of Tomorrow will be entered in competition to name the state's Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The \$110,000 homemaking education program sponsored by General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense-paid educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., April 8-13, the trip culminating in the announcement of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow whose scholarship is increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

The testing and judging is conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago. With a record 402,786 girls in 12,633 of the nation's schools participating this year, the Betty Crocker search has enrolled more than two million girls in its seven-year history.

MARCH OF DIMES FUNDS TRAIN HANDS AND MINDS

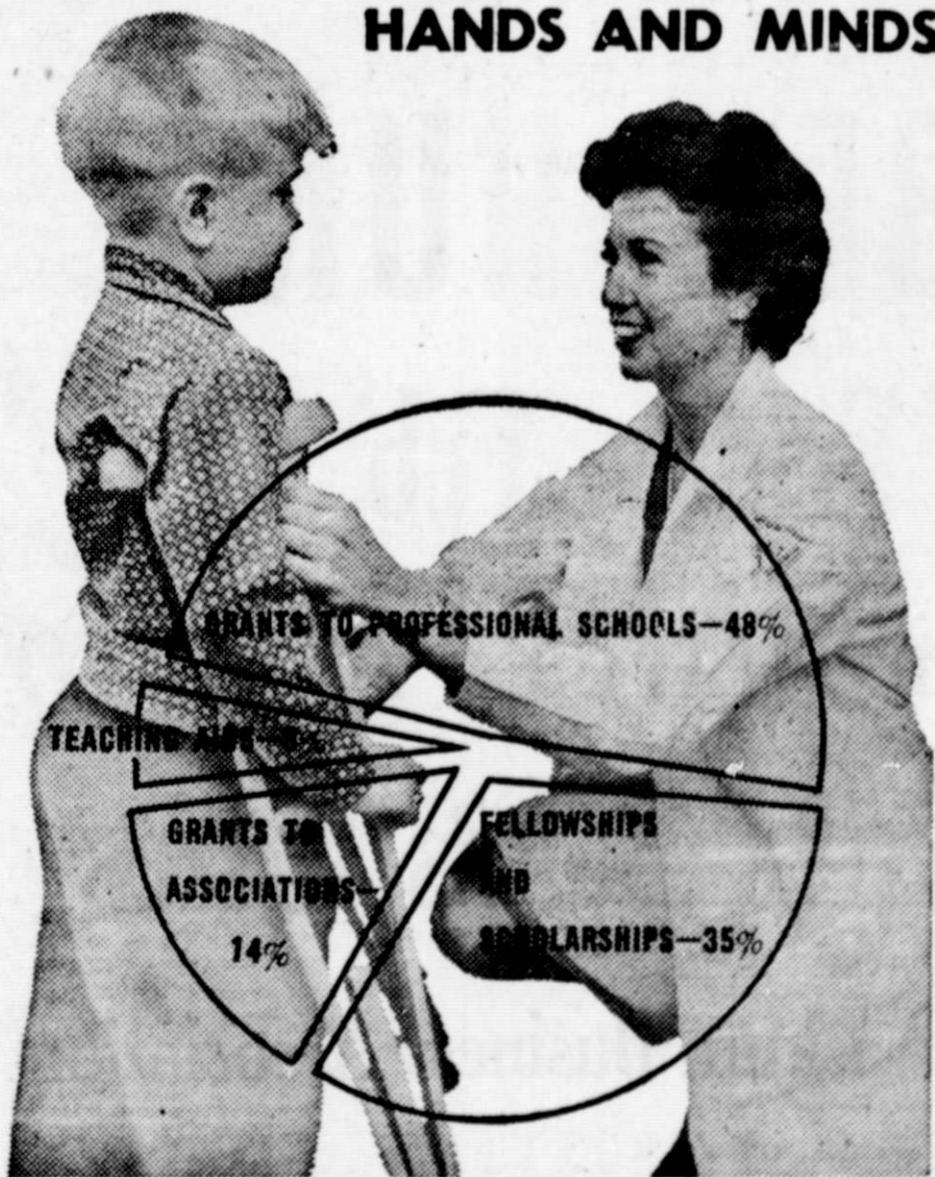


Chart illustrates how the Professional Education Department of The National Foundation allocates the funds it receives from contributions to the March of Dimes in a typical year.

STURGEON SPEARING SEASON OPENS FEB. 11

A fair to good crowd was in attendance for the Richfield Sportmen's Club Fisheree at Bark Lake this past Sunday. The weather was cold and a few fish were caught, however, all had a good time. Prizes were distributed at the end of the day.

A light snow towards the end of the past week brought out the fox and rabbit hunters. Some of the rabbit hunters had excellent luck, particularly those with good dogs. A few fox were shot.

The Elmer Backhaus family of Barton was surprised to see a strange animal on their lawn last week. It was identified as a NUTRIA. It must have escaped from a pen, as they do not fare very well in the wild. A local fur buyer refused to quote a price for this type of skin.

The season on gray and fox squirrel, snowshoe hare, cottontail and jackrabbit will close in Wisconsin on Jan. 31, 1961. Pheasant hunting, BOW AND ARROW AND IN MILWAUKEE COUNTY ONLY, will close Feb. 15.

The sturgeon spearing season for 1961 will be from Feb. 11 to March 1, both dates inclusive. The season will be open on Lake Winnebago and Little Lake Butte des Morts only. There is no season on Lake Butte des Morts, Winnebago or Poygan again this year.

As in past years, the bag limit is one sturgeon per season. It must be at least 40 inches long.

You must attach your sturgeon tag to the fish immediately when taken and the fish must be presented for registration at an official sturgeon registration station established for such purpose not later than 24 hours after it is speared. These stations will be located at various places around Lake Winnebago.

The above regulations are the same as in past years. There is, however, a rather new law which requires a special license for sturgeon spearing. This year again, it is necessary to purchase a special sturgeon spearing license if you wish to engage in the sport. The fee for such license is \$2.50 and may be issued only to persons 14 years of age and older. Therefore, persons under 14 years of age may not take part in this sport. When you buy your license you will be supplied a sturgeon tag with it. This is the tag which must be attached and locked to the tail of your sturgeon immediately after it is speared.

This year you may cut the hole for spearing sturgeon 48 hours before the opening of the season, previously this could be done only 24 hours before.

We urge that if you use your fish shanty primarily for sturgeon spearing, you remove it from the lake at the close of the sturgeon season. At that time, if we have heavy snows, there are usually trails plowed on the lake. Past years, many people who left their shanties out experienced considerable difficulty in getting them off the lake. All shanties must be removed by March 5.

Farm management associations may be the answer to give you help on farm records and business management. The groups are non-stock cooperatives who employ one or two trained fieldmen. There are now four in the state.

Ralph Kies Is County Easter Seal Chairman

The appointment of Ralph Kies as chairman of the 1961 Easter Seal campaign in Washington county was announced by the Wisconsin Easter Seal society.

Kenneth L. Svec, WESS executive director, said that Kies will direct county volunteers in an all-out effort to finance the fight against crippling.

The campaign, marking 40 years of service to the handicapped by the Easter Seal organization, is scheduled March 2 - April 2. The appeal will give county residents the opportunity to give service to the handicapped in their own communities.

Money given to the Easter Seal campaign will send state children and adults to Camp Wawbeek, Wisconsin Dells, for two week vacations. Easter Seal homecraft shops and sales booths give income to homebound handicapped adults by selling, without profit, the craft articles they make. Money from Easter Seals also pays for medical care, braces and other equipment.

As chairman of the month long appeal for funds in the area, Kies will appoint committees to help in the mail campaign, in publicity, and in every phase of the drive.

March of Dimes Funds Support New Live-Virus Polio Vaccine

In the late summer of 1960, the federal government announced that it had found the new oral live-virus vaccine developed by Dr. Albert B. Sabin under grants from The National Foundation with March of Dimes funds to be "suitable for use in the United States."

Thus did the American people, through their contributions to the March of Dimes, make possible another forward stride in the long fight to prevent paralytic polio. The first great stride was the Salk killed-virus vaccine, released to the world in 1955 and since injected into more than 100,000,000 Americans.

The Sabin oral vaccine will help finish the task of preventing paralytic polio that was begun by the Salk injected vaccine. Many millions of dollars of March of Dimes funds went for the development of the Salk and Sabin vaccines. Grants to Dr. Sabin alone, affiliated with the University of Cincinnati, totaled \$1,500,000.

In the winter of 1960-61, there is only the Salk vaccine available to protect against paralysis. It is a very good vaccine. A Salk shot series begun in the winter will give a measure of protection before the 1961 polio season.

Announcement that the new vaccine is good does not mean that the Salk vaccine will soon be outmoded. U. S. Surgeon General L. E. Burney said that "in our judgment, the live-virus vaccine will not replace the Salk vaccine. There is need for both and they will complement each other."

March of Dimes funds are still supporting research on the Sabin vaccine—research which seeks more details on dosage, spacing and possible combinations of the two vaccines.

A contribution to the 1961 New March of Dimes will help to bring nearer the day when paralytic polio no longer will be a major threat to the American people.

Schedule Brotherhood Week Observance in Co.

Bernard C. Ziegler, West Bend, secretary, West Bend Aluminum company, has been named Washington county chairman for the 1961 Brotherhood Week observance. "All weeks are equally in need of the practice of brotherhood. However, the week of Washington's birthday has been set aside as a time of resolution to sustain brotherhood throughout the year. This can and should be done with-

out seeking a union of religious bodies, without modifying the distinctive beliefs of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, and without weakening the loyalties of those of any faith. It is our hope that the people of Washington county will make every effort to participate in this observance."

A Washington county committee will be appointed soon to direct the Brotherhood Week activities.
