## Helmuth Lubitz, 41, Killed in Two Car Crash Early Sunday

### West Bend Couple, Rural Resident Hurt in Mishap

Helmuth G. Lubitz, 41, of Barton, a former resident of Kewaskum most of his life, and a son of Mrs. Emma Lubitz of this village, was killed and three other occupants of the car and the driver of the other vehicle involved were all injured in a collision at the junction of Hwy. 41 and the Sherman road in the town of Polk, south of Slinger, early Sunday.

Injured in the crash were William Hron, 49, West Bend, whose condition was described as "serious but improving" at St. Joseph's hospital, Hartford, where the crash victims were taken; Margaret Hron, 50, West Bend, whose condition was reported as "good" Monday, and Clifford Yahr, 28, R. 2, West Bend, who was treated at the hospital and discharged.

Injured also was Arthur R. Mantie, 22, of 5035 N. 39th st., Milwaukee, the driver of the other car, whose injuries were not believed serious.

According to the state traffic patrol report, the accident occurred when Hron, who was traveling east on the Sherman road, attempted to cross Hwy. 41. The car driven by Mantie, traveling southeast on Hwy. 41, braked and attempted to cut to the left, but struck the Hron auto sideways, pushing it sideways down the highway. The Mantie car spun around and ended up in the medial strip on the highway.

Lubitz's death was the second highway fatality in Washington county for 1961.

Helmuth Gustave Lubitz was born April 6, 1919, in Germany, the son of Mrs. Helmuth Lubitz, Sr. and the late Mr. Lubitz, who predeceased him in 1947. He came to this country with his parents 37 years ago, the family settling in Kewaskum. His marriage to the former Gladys Zipperer took place on May 24, 1952 at St. Lucas Lutheran church in this village. The couple resided here for a time and then moved to Barton several years ago.

Surviving are the widow, one daughter, Sandra, aged 7 years; his mother, and two sisters, Erna (Mrs. Russell Neumann) and Lueschen (Mrs. Sylvester Wondra), both of Barton.

Lubitz, a welder at the West Bend Equipment Co., was a veteran of World War II.

The body was in state after 2 p. m. Monday at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum. Funeral services were held Tuesday, Feb. 14, at the funeral home, the Rev. C. H. Meyer of Trinity English Lutheran church of West Bend officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial park, Kewaskum. Military services at the grave were conducted by members of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Kewaskum.

## Heinecke Is Bound Over in Local Minor Bar Shooting Case

Arraigned before Judge Lester A. Buckley of Hartford in county court at West Bend Monday morning, George J. Heinecke, 21, of Barton, was bound over to Branch 2 of county court.

Heinecke is being held under \$2,000 bond, which was continued, under Sec. 940.23 of Wisconsin statutes for "causing great bodily harm to another human being . . . regardless of human life." The charges were brought Heinecke following a shooting at Steve and Mary Rahn's minor bar just north of Kewaskum on the night of Sunday, Jan. 15, in which two girls were wounded.

The wounded girls were Bonnie Carol Stahl, 18, Random Lake, and Maureen Borchert, 20, Kewaskum. The bullet went through both thighs of Miss Stahl and lodged in the calf of Miss Borchert's leg. Both girls have recovered from their wounds and were present at the hearing.

In addition to the girls, Sheriff William Johnson, County Patrolman Wilfred H. Ruffing of Allenton, John E. Norton, 24, of West Bend, who was with Heinecke on the night of the shooting, and Steve and Mary Rahn also testified.

A date for the trial has not been set.

## School Debators Gain Even Split in Regional Meet at Stevens Point

LOCAL TEAM FALLS ONE WIN SHORT OF GOING TO STATE CONTEST

The Kewaskum Community High school debators ended their season at Stevens Point this past Saturday with an even split in six debates. This three-and-three record at the regional debate meet left Kewaskum one win short of going on to the state debate meet.

Sixteen teams representing a large area of the state competed. Five schools compiled winning records and thus won the right to go on to the state contest. These five included last year's state champions from Stevens Point, as well as Wausau, La Crosse, Merrill and Preble high schools.

Nancy Held and Robert Kroncke finished a fine season by winning two and losing one. This gave them a season's record of thirteen wins against only two losses. The affirmative team of Ralph Albrecht and Richard Groh picked up the other win and two losses which gave them a winning season of nine wins against six losses. The season's record for all debates found Kewaskum winning twenty-seven while losing fifteen.

## HEART FUND DRIVE TO BE CONDUCTED HERE FEB. 25

Saturday, Feb. 25, will be Heart Saturday in Kewaskum. On this day volunteer workers will conduct a door-to-door canvass for contributions to fight diseases of the heart and blood vessels.

R. G. Edwards, M. D., who heads the drive in Kewaskum, said Al G. Hron has been appointed chairman for industries and Arnold Prost chairman for the rural areas.

"Heart disease is a threat to us all and is responsible for some 900,000 deaths in the United States each year," Dr. Edwards said. "This number one public health enemy is responsible for more deaths than the next five leading causes of death combined. One out of every two deaths in the country is caused by heart diseases," he said.

## Dem. Election Workers Must Be Party Members

Larry Harty, chairman of the Washington County Democratic party, announced this week that he has sent a letter to all Democratic precinct committeemen in the county requesting them to contact all election workers now employed in their precinct's election booths as Democrats to determine if they are paid up members of the party.

Harty said that "anyone working at the polls as a Democrat who refuses to become a dues paying member of the party will be removed from the eligible list and the name of a dues-paying member will be submitted to replace that person."

"The election laws of Wisconsin," Harty explained, "clearly state that not more than two inspectors of election, nor one clerk of election, nor one ballot clerk shall be members of the same political party. The poll workers in each precinct are appointed by the mayor of the city or the chairman of a town board from a list of eligible workers submitted to him by each of the two major political parties. The list of eligible workers are compiled in each precinct by the precinct committee chairman, and confirmed by the chairman and secretary of the county political party involved."

Harty stated that this procedure has not always been followed in the past but promised every effort will be made by the Democratic party to correct the situa-

tion.

## Local Students to Take NEDT Exam

Ninth and tenth grade students at Kewaskum Community High school will get an objective insight into their scholastic development by participating in the National Educational Development Tests, Clifford M. Rose, principal, said today. The tests will be given at 9 a. m. Tuesday, March 7, (or Saturday, March 11,—at the same time the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test will be written by juniors.

Last year over 300,000 students in 4,461 schools throughout the nation took the tests.

Prepared and administered by Science Research Associates in Chicago, the annual three-hour NEDT examination provides scores in English, social studies, mathematics, natural sciences, and word usage. The NEDT fee is \$1 for each student, payable at testing time.

Each participating student may plot his scores on a student profile leaflet, to learn how he compares with other students at his grade level in the country.

This evaluation of educational strengths and weaknesses, says, Principal Rose, helps students plan their high school and college courses and make career decisions. The tests also enable teachers to spot talented students, so that they may receive realistic guidance and motivation early in their educational career, he said.

In recognition of their ability, the top-ranking 25 per cent of test participants in the state will receive "Certificates of Educational Development," according to Principal Rose.

#### FISHING SEASON CLOSED FEB. 15

There seems to be some confusion among fishermen in regard to the open and closed season on black bass, northern pike and walleyed pike. The season on these species closed Feb. 15 in Washington and Ozaukee counties. It remains open all year for hook and line fishing on Lakes Winnebago, Poygan, Winneconne and Butte des Morts. You will find this information listed under "SPECIAL WATERS" in your 1961 fishing regulations.

Due to mild weather, and the fact that this is the mating season, a number of skunk and raccoon are killed on the highways.

This past Friday evening a deer was hit by a car on Highway 45 about 1/2 mile south of Hwy. 143. The animal, after lying in

the ditch about five minutes, ran into a swamp east of the highway. The vehicle was only slightly damaged.

Feb. 11 to March 1 is the sturgeon spearing season on Lake Winnebago only. One per season, 40-inches long. A special license is required to fish for them. The 1961 fishing regulations are out, READ THEM.

Each year we are asked a question several times—whether or not skin diving equipment may be used for spearing sturgeon. The answer is "no."

The Wisconsin Administrative Code states very clearly that pan-fish and rough fish only may be taken by the method commonly known as skin diving by divers under the water with the use of spears or spear guns in certain specified waters. The specified waters include these lakes in this area: Lake Ellen and Lake Seven in Sheboygan county, Lake Five in Washington county. In Little Cedar and Big Cedar lakes in Washington county—rough fish only.
