24 Local Students to Take National Merit Scholarship Test

Twenty-four students at the Kewaskum Community High school plan to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test C. Rose, principal, announced. The test will be administered at the high school at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday, Mar. 7.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the seventh annual competition for four-year merit scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, associations and individuals.

The scores of students who take the test on Mar. 7 will be reported to their schools before the end of the spring semester in time for use by class advisers. The scores are used in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 10,000 semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Each semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become finalists in the merit program. Winners of merit scholarships will be selected from the finalist group on the basis of school records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability, and accomplishments outside the classroom. Each finalist is awarded a certificate of merit attesting to his outstanding performance.

The scholarship stipends are based upon financial need. The minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$1,500. The average stipend awarded to freshman merit scholars in 1960 was \$827.

Election Tuesday for Justice, School Supt.

Voters here and throughout the state will cast ballots for a justice of the supreme court and for a state superintendent of schools at the Spring Primary Election next Tuesday, Mar. 7.

The village of Kewaskum, like most of the precincts in Washington county, will not have a local contest in the primary but it is hoped voters will turn out at the polls to vote for the state candidates for office. Some cities and townships will have local candidates for office in the primary but Kewaskum's officials will be elected in the April election.

Three candidates are in the race to fill the vacancy in the state supreme court. They are Stewart G. Honeck, Christ Alexopoulos and Myron L. Gordon.

In the race for the office of state superintendent of schools are Arlyn F. Wollenburg, William J. Fenelon, Frederick F. Frick, Ralph M. Gibson and Angus B. Rothwell.

County voters will also elect a county superintendent of schools at the April election but will not be voting for this office in the primary Tuesday as the incumbent, Harry Sheski, is unopposed for re-election. The two state offices to be filled in the primary are important offices, voters are reminded, and they are urged to get out and vote.

Voting in the village will be at the municipal building and town of Kewaskum voters will cast their ballots at the Labor Center in the village. A very light vote is anticipated.

Pesch and his sister were branded with a hot poker and beaten into semi-consciousness by the strangers. They took \$8,000 in bonds and \$3,000 cash from a trunk. Officials worked months on the case in an effort to trace the robbers and money. At one time a series of bonds which could not be cashed were found in Illinois. 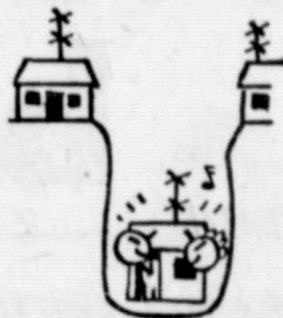

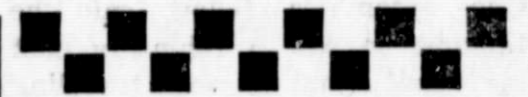

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Signs of things to come—a flock of geese flying north on Washington's birthday, a flock of twenty-two mourning doves sighted in the town of Polk this past week end.

On Feb. 16, two men from Oconto county driving a 1/4-ton Ford truck spent part of the day in Washington county peddling fish. They made most of their sales at farm homes and gasoline stations. The fish were packed in five pound cardboard boxes and sold as frozen, boneless, walleyed pike fillets at \$4.00 to \$5.00 a box. The fish were not walleyes but were skinless Pollock. (Boston Bluefish is the trade name). These fish are purchased from wholesale fish houses in Green Bay (last week's quotations were \$21 a pound).

These men indicated while making a sale in West Bend that they had sold about 200 pounds in the vicinity of Kewaskum and Boltonville. In the event they did, it was a nice profit for a day. Purchase fish for \$42.00 and sell them for \$160.00 to \$200.00.

This is the time of the year when outdoor activities especially hunting and fishing are at an all time low. The ice fishing season, at least for most of you, is over. The sturgeon spearing season is closed. Spring is just around the corner, although it may not look or feel like it, and many of you will be putting your boats in shape for spring use. Several deficiencies were noted relative to the numbers placed on boats during the past summer.

The law requires that numbers be "in block characters of good proportions, not less than three inches in height," and of a color which will contrast with the color of the background so as to be clearly visible and legible.

Small white numbers with black borders, script, and semi-block designs of poor proportions are not acceptable. This is the biggest deficiency we have noticed. Many white or other light colored boats

have light colored numbers with just black borders. They do look nice and are decorative, but they do not meet the requirements of the law.

Numbers should be located on each side of the forward half of the hull as near to the stem as practical and where they can best be seen.

The law also requires a space or hyphen between each part of the number. for example, WS-1234-AA or WS 1234 AA.

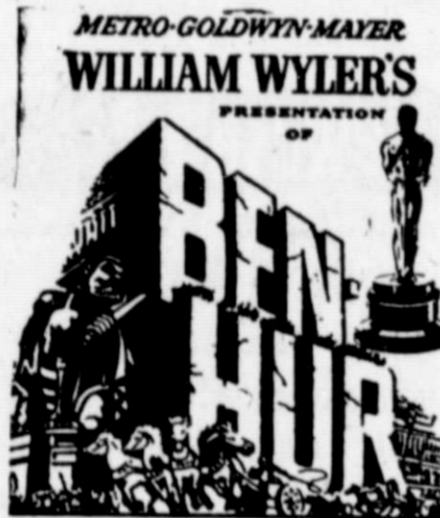
