Recovery of part of the loot taken by torture bandits who robbed Mich. Pesch, 78, and his sister Kate near Kewaskum on April 23, 1933, was indicated this week when Wm. Newman, head of the Sullivan Detective agency, Milwaukee, received a check for \$2,250 from a Kansas City bank, one of whose customers had innocently purchased some of the stolen bonds. Newman declared that 11 additional bonds valued at \$4,700 had been traced to the U. S. treasury where they had been redeemed for cash. Pesch and his sister were branded with a hot poker and beaten into semiconsciousness by the strangers-They took \$8,000 in bonds and \$3,000 cash from a trunk. Officials worked months on the case in an effort to trace the robbers and money. At one time a series of bonds which could not be cashed were found in Illinois. 
