10 Schools to Compete Here This Saturday in District Music Festival

The long-awaited day for many young musicians throughout the Scenic Moraine conference schools is about to arrive. Climaxing a year's musical efforts for many individuals is the Wisconsin School Music Association District Solo and Ensemble Tournament for 1961 to be held in Kewaskum on Saturday, Mar. 18. Instrumentalists and vocalists from bands, choirs and glee clubs will enter over 50 different contest events as soloists or as members of an ensemble seeking coveted first division awards for their months of hard practice.

There will be every variety of brass, woodwind and vocal solo. A preliminary survey of entries also shows a diversity of piano, percussion and baton events. Highlighting the day of music making will be sparkling brass choirs, whimsical woodwind duets, trios and quartets, charming ensembles of girls' voices, airy madrigals, and the close harmonizing of male quartets.

The range of performers is from grade 7 - 12. Contestants enter according to ability in Class A, B or C. First ratings are possible in ALL classes. Class A entries who receive gold medals are eligible to participate at the State Festival in Madison later this spring. This honor is usually accorded to veterans of these yearly festivals who have worked themselves up through the ranks by diligent practice and conscientious membership in the school bands and choral groups they represent.

Rain or shine, bright yellow buses from Slinger, Waldo, Campbellsport, North Fondy, Port Washington, Pewaukee, Grafton, Germantown and Random Lake will be bringing their loads of eager and talented performers to Kewaskum early Saturday morning. The tournament will be held in the Kewaskum Community High school all through the day of March 18. The public is cordially invited. A nominal admission for the whole day's program will be asked.

The same schools will be in Kewaskum on April 29 for the Concert Groups Music Festival, involving the choirs, bands and glee clubs in another full day event, according to J. Lutz, music instructor at the local high school.

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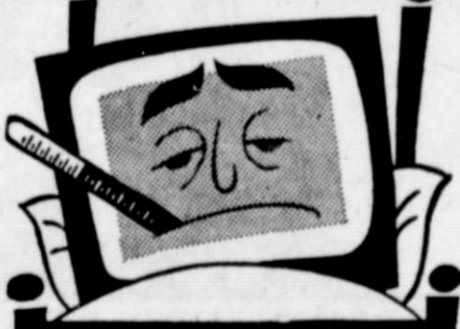

Nominate Officers at Town Kewaskum Caucus

Fifty-seven votes were cast at the town of Kewaskum caucus held Saturday afternoon at the Labor Center in the village. The township will have opposition for its chairman and assessor but none of the other elected officers when the voters go to the polls in the spring election on April 4.

Ed. J. Campbell, present chairman, received 29 votes, Myron Belger 18 and Arnold Bier 7 write-in votes. Campbell and Belger will oppose each other in the spring election. For assessor Roger W. Dobke received 24 votes, John G. Muckerheide, incumbent, 20, and Carl Meilahn, Jr. 12. Dobke and Muckerheide will be on the ticket Apr. 4.

Other present officials who are unopposed and the number of votes they received in the caucus are as follows: Clerk—Alfred H. Seefeldt, 50; treasurer—Lloyd Schmidt, 45; supervisor No. 2—William Becker, 49; supervisor No. 1—Arnold Amerling, 39. There were no candidates for justice of the peace.

The caucus committee consists of Ray Klein, Willard Prost and Louis Martin.

A deal involving several persons was closed which found John F. Schaefer purchasing the filling station and garage on East Water and Main sts. from John Honeck. Schaefer will continue to operate the station business and the garage will be turned over to his son William, who operates a trucking business. Clarence Kudek, who had operated the station, has leased the K. A. Honeck garage on South Fond du Lac ave. Honeck, who recently purchased the former Schaub garage on Fond du Lac ave., will conduct his business there.

CANADA GEESE, BIRDS ARRIVE

This past Sunday large numbers of Canada geese were moving towards Horicon marsh. Many blackbirds and robins have arrived. It was a surprise to see a killdeer flying over Big Cedar lake.

Streams in this vicinity are open. The ice is melting around islands, the inlets and outlets to lakes are unsafe at this time. The ice a week ago on Big Cedar was 12 to 16 inches in depth, today 8 inches. The water temperature just beneath the ice is 36 to 38 degrees. If warm weather continues, the lakes could break up in a hurry.

For those people who fish to fish for pike on the Fox or Wolf rivers when the ice goes out, now is the time to repair the boat. Be sure your boat is registered, has a number on the bow, proper lights for running at night, a life preserver for each party on board. (Be sure that the certificate of registration is on the boat while in use).

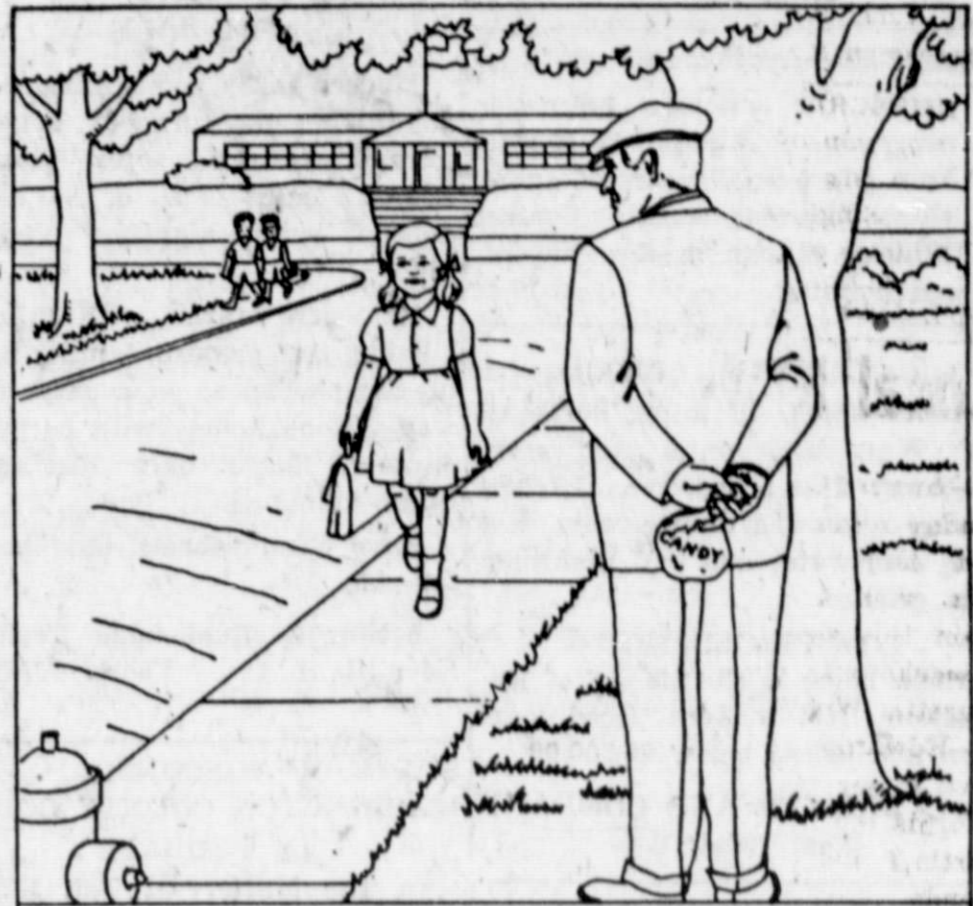
Plan now to attend your Conservation Congress hearing Monday, April 17, at 8 p. m. at the court house, West Bend.

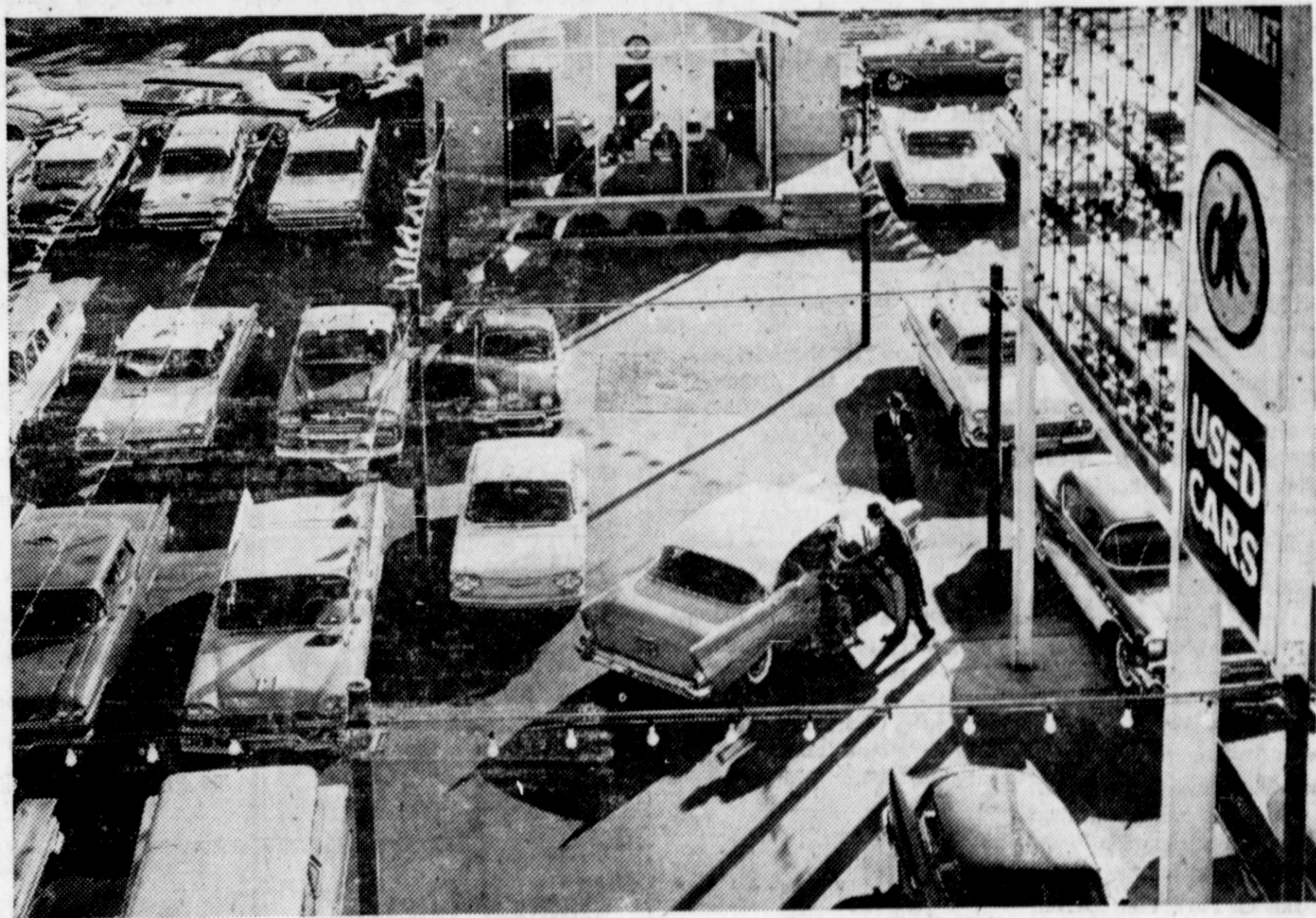

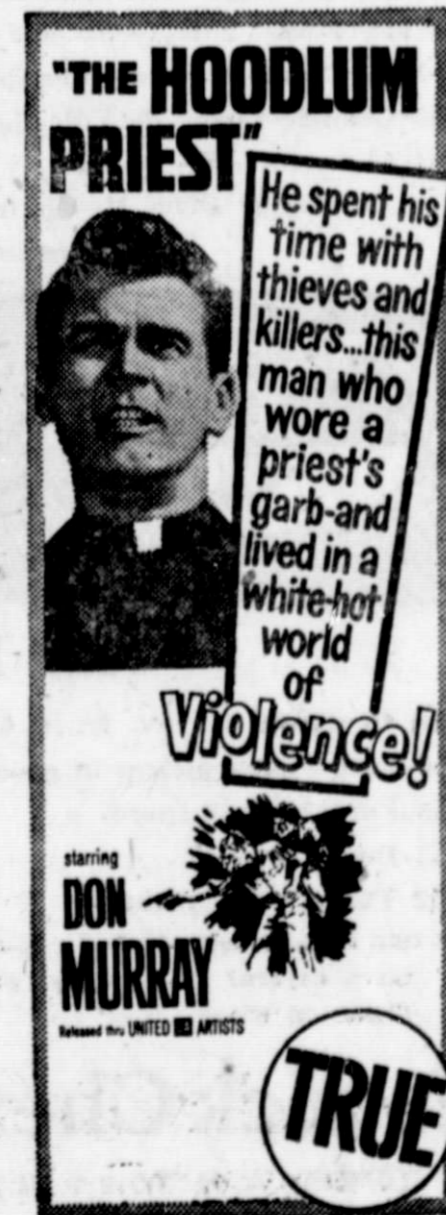

Mrs. Fancher Colvin, 89, the former Eda Schnurr, of 713 High st., West Bend, a former resident of Kewaskum for many years, died on Saturday, March 11, at 9 a. m. at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, following a lingering illness.

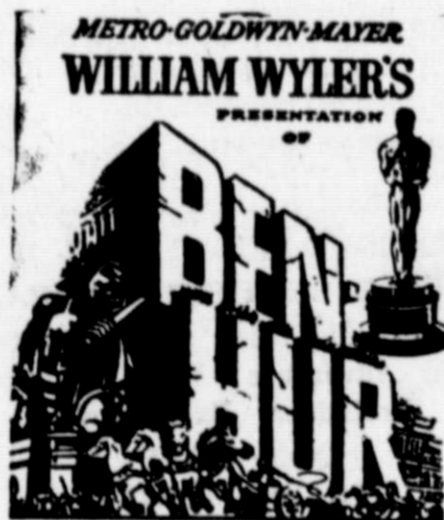
