A GO TO STATE CONTEST

The co-operation of the weatherman enabled the full day of musical activities at Kewaskum High school to proceed as planned on Saturday, March 18, when the district music festival was held

Nearly 600 performers put their final efforts into music prepared especially for this occasion, then received a rating from one of the specialist judges. The judging staff included members from the University of Wisconsin (both Milwaukee and Madison) and Music directors from various high schools in Wisconsin.

Each performance was entered in one of three general ability levels (class A, B and C) and was rated 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 by one of the seven judges.

A tabulation of results shows that 25 per cent of all the ratings were 1st division and 68 percent fell into either the 2nd or 3rd division range-an indication of the high level of performance achieved. A somewhat general consensus of opinion was that judging seemed to be somewhat more rigorous than has been heretofore experienced.
