Set for Big Dairy Day Event Here

Record Crowd Expected; Over \$550 in Prizes Will Be Given

Feature Notable Speakers, Displays, Fine Entertainment

The stage is all set and a record crowd is expected to attend the 3rd annual Kewaskum Dairy Day program, sponsored by the Kewaskum businessmen, to be held this Saturday, March 25, in the high school gymnasium, cafeteria and ag rooms. Everything is for FREE, so don't miss it, starting at 11 a. m.

Over \$550.00 in very valuable and worthwhile merchandise prizes, donated by businessmen of the village, will be given away free in the evening to those who register throughout the day and are lucky enough to have their name selected. Other prizes, souvenirs, tokens and literature will be given away in the individual booths of the businessmen.

Features of the event will include the appearance of national, state and county officials and agriculture leaders as well as Miss Karen Marie Fahnenbach, "Miss Wisconsin," a dairy queen contest, style revue, home talent show, many free valuable prizes, free noon dairy lunch, free movie for the youngsters, numerous exhibits, entertainment, music and other highlights.

The free movie for the youngsters to be shown at the Kewaskum theatre at 1:15 p. m. will feature an A-1 picture, "My Dog Buddy." Lots of cartoons and a "Three Stooges" comedy will also be shown.

The day's program will get under way at 11 a. m. when the many displays of new products and merchandise will be opened to the public in the gym and ag room. A free noon lunch will be served starting at 11:30 a. m. in the school cafeteria and following this the afternoon program will start and there will be continuous entertainment for the rest of the day and evening.

The afternoon program will get underway at 1:15 p. m. with a half hour concert by the high school band, following which Maurice Hovland, Washington county agent, will take over the microphone. Appearing on the program will be George Groves of the University of Wisconsin, who will speak on "Future Trends in Milk Utilization;" State Sen. Wm. A. 600 Musicians, Vocalists Perform In District Music Festival Here

KEWASKUM, OTHER WINNERS OF 1ST AWARDS IN CLASS A GO TO STATE CONTEST

The co-operation of the weatherman enabled the full day of musical activities at Kewaskum High school to proceed as planned on Saturday, March 18, when the district music festival was held here.

Nearly 600 performers put their final efforts into music prepared especially for this occasion, then received a rating from one of the specialist judges. The judging staff included members from the University of Wisconsin (both Milwaukee and Madison) and Music directors from various high schools in Wisconsin.

Each performance was entered in one of three general ability levels (class A, B and C) and was rated 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 by one of the seven judges.

A tabulation of results shows that 25 per cent of all the ratings were 1st division and 68 per cent fell into either the 2nd or 3rd division range—an indication of the high level of performance achieved. A somewhat general consensus of opinion was that judging seemed to be somewhat more rigorous than has been heretofore experienced.

For some of the more advanced musicians who entered in Class A, the job of polishing and perfecting must continue, for they have been chosen to go on to the state contest in Madison in May. Among these solos and ensembles who received these 1st awards in Class A are:

On Monday, March 13, a monthly meeting of the Washington County United Law Enforcement Officers association was held at the city hall in Hartford. These meetings were started shortly after Sheriff William Johnson took office as county sheriff. Sheriff Johnson, a long-time traffic officer, and several other officers in the county decided to get together and share information to better relations in the county, law enforcement-wise.

At this meeting officers were elected to serve for the year. Elected were Sheriff Johnson, president; State Patrol Officer Paul Humbel, vice-president; Kewaskum Chief of Police Roland Pledl, treasurer; County Traffic Officer Ray Jeffords, secretary, and Deputy Coroner Bob Boltz, reporter.

Informative talks were given by guest speakers, Harvey Branski, chief drivers license examiner of Wisconsin, and Lorris B. Dusso, chief drivers license examiner of West Bend. District Attorney Richard Becker of Washington county addressed the group and Dr. Barr of Port Washington showed a film on the breathalyzer and gave a very interesting talk. (Dr. Barr is one of the few men in the state recognized as an expert witness in the subject of intoxication).

Something new was added as "hot sheets" and look-out notices were given to all at this meeting. These notices are a special aid to the officers to be on the look-out for wanted people and persons driving without a license or after revocation.

The next regular meeting will be held in Kewaskum next month. This meeting is open to all officers working in Washington county.

500 Fans See Green Bay Packer Stars Dwarf Chevs, 80-70

PRO FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS PUT ON GOOD SHOW IN EXHIBITION HERE

Close to 500 football and basketball fans pretty well filled the Kewaskum High school gymnasium Saturday night to see some of the stars of the Green Bay Packers, champions of the Western Division of the National Professional Football league, put on an exhibition against the Kewaskum Chevrolets of the Land o' Lakes league.

The final outcome found the Packers on the long end of an 80-70 score but the score was unimportant. The appearance of the Packers and the opportunity for fans to get a close-up view and talk to some of their idols provided the main attraction.

These big, burly, muscular and perfectly conditioned football giants dwarfed most of the Chevs but the local boys held their own with them pretty well and gave them some competition on the basketball court. The Packers were friendly, good natured and played a clean game so that no one got hurt. They can be just the opposite against an opponent on a football field. It isn't easy

for them to avoid bodily contact, blocking and roughing, which they are used to, but they did their best to prevent this. From close up most of the Packers show the scars of their gridiron wars but they also are a very handsome group of men.

The Packers led throughout the game but never by too big a margin. The score was 21-15 at the quarter, 47-32 at the half, and 64-55 at the end of the third period. Defensive back Dale Hackbart, former University of Wisconsin football and basketball star, was the scoring ace for the Packers, pacing both teams with 27 points on 13 field goals and one free throw. Aggressive halfback Lew Carpenter, very fast for his size, dropped in 17 points and Linebacker Ray Nitschke, who provided the clowning for the team, scored 13. Once during the game when Nitschke, who is built like a brick outhouse, was bumped by one of the smaller Chev players, he flew from one end of the gym all the way across the floor, through the door and out into the hall (so he made it appear). Nitschke said the rougher the action is on the football field the better he likes it and good naturedly took a little of our kidding about Norm Van Brocklin (star passer of the Philadelphia Eagles, who defeated the Packers in the world championship playoff). Quarterback Babe Parilli chipped in 10 points, End Gary Knafelc 8, Guard Bob Skoronski 4 and Quarterback Bart Starr 1. Guard Fred Thurston and Linebacker Tom Bettis were unable to be here for the game, the latter because of the death of his mother.

Don Meisenheimer was high scorer for the Chevs with 21 points. Big Don, who stands 6 feet, 4 or 5 inches well over 200 pounds, was the only man big enough to stand up against these Packers. In a green uniform he would look like one of them. Hackbart held Tom Larson, the Chevs' leading scorer, to 9 points, while next in line were Frank Krueger and Augie Bilgo with 8 apiece and Ken Felix with 7.

In the last few plays of the game, the Packers formed a line of scrimmage, hiked the ball from center and charged down the floor with the ball carrier following in interference or attempting a long pass. The Chevs let them pass (what else?) After a basket was made they tried a place kick from the middle of the floor for the

extra point.

The Tessar brothers, Wayland and John, former stars on the Chevs team, officiated the contest. They were instructed by the Packers before the game to spare the wind in their whistles, which they did to a point, but even then Nitschke had six personals called on him. He claimed some of them were unfair so he stayed in the game. All in all the Packers put on a good show and it was a fine evening's entertainment.

The state high school basketball tournament finals at Madison, which were televised, kept the attendance down. Many persons, even those who had purchased advance tickets, stayed home to watch the games on TV and others were there in person. Freezing rain and icy roads south of here also kept others away although some from West Bend made the trip. However, the exhibition was a success and the sponsors broke about even financially.

Following the game, Killy Honeck, the Chevs sponsor, threw a party at his garage for the Packer and Kewaskum players, wives, officials, scorers, announcer, tim-

ers, ticket sellers and other helpers. A delicious lunch and refreshments were served. Here everyone had an opportunity to meet the Packers and obtain their autographs.

Board Rejects Bids for Blacktopping Streets

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board Members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Eberle, seconded by Trustee Merwin and duly carried.

The request of Tom Weidemann to move a street light standard at the intersection of Fond du Lac Avenue and Clinton Street was approved with all reasonable costs of moving said standard to be paid by applicant. Approval was granted upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Eberle and duly carried.

Mr. Theisen, Trustee of the village of Barton, met with the Board to discuss the incineration of garbage for Barton in the Kewaskum incinerator. The Board agreed to burn said garbage at a cost of \$1.00 per yard with Barton to furnish the labor for feeding the incinerator.

A delegation of the Firemen-Legion Picnic committee met with the board to discuss the addition of better toilet facilities in the Village Park.

Mr. Petersen of the Aring Equipment Company explained to the Board that the check marks on the lugs of the tires on the recently purchased shovel-loader were due to normal wear and in no way affect the life of a tire.

The engineering firms specifications for the blacktopping of streets were rejected because the Board felt that said specifications were inadequate.

Upon motion by Trustee Eber-

le, seconded by Trustee Wietor and duly carried all bids for the blacktopping of the village streets were rejected. Motion was made by Trustee Degner, seconded by Trustee Tessar and carried that the President and Commissioner be and hereby are authorized to contract with the county for the blacktopping of the village streets according to State Highway Commission specifications on a time and material basis.

Armin Oppermann or his representative were authorized to attend the Sewage Plant Operators short course at Madison April 4th, 5th and 6th upon motion by Trustee Tessar, seconded by Trustee Eberle and duly carried.
