Dairy Day Is Outstanding Success, Draws Record Crowd; 1,000 Attend Evening Program

600 Served Noon Lunch; Over \$550 In Prizes Given

Kewaskum's third annual Dairy Day program sponsored by the Business association last Saturday at the high school drew a record crowd and was a tremendous success. Crowds estimated at between 2,000 and 3,000 persons attended the event.

The celebration was climaxed by an especially well attended evening program in the high school gym, which drew close to 1,000 people. There were well over 600 seated in the gymnasium and at least two or three hundred more stood at the rear of the gym, jamming it to capacity. The Dairy Day event gets bigger each year and if it continues to grow, the gymnasium, agriculture rooms and cafeteria will not be sufficient to handle it.

Over 600 persons were already on hand to be served the free noon dairy lunch in the cafeteria, which opened the day's program at 11:30 a. m., although the many beautiful merchants' displays were open at 11 o'clock. The number of people served the noon lunch exceeded last year's number by quite a few.

More than \$550.00 worth of valuable merchandise prizes, donated by local businessmen, were given away following both the afternoon and evening programs. A complete list of the prizes and winners appears at the end of this item.

Following music by the Kewaskum High school band, afternoon speakers included Maurice Hovland, county agent, who opened the main program; George Groves of the University of Wisconsin, who spoke on "Future Trends in Milk Utilization;" State Senator Wm. A. Draheim of Neenah, chairman of the Joint Committee on Finance, who talked on "Wisconsin Taxes;" Miss Karen Fahrback, "Miss Wisconsin;" State Senator Frank Panzer of Brownsville, and Fond du Lac common council president, James Megellas. The latter, a Democratic candidate for congress in the last election, filled in for U. S. Senator William Proxmire, who was unable to attend. Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter of Washington county also spoke briefly.

A special program for women in the school cafeteria in the afternoon included a food demonstration and a style and dress revue directed by Luella Leonhard. The cafeteria was completely filled for this demonstration. While the women were attending this program and the men the one in the gym, as well as viewing the displays of new products and merchandise there and in the gym rooms, free movies were shown for youngsters at the Kewaskum

First Time Donors Urged to Give Blood At Clinic Tuesday

100 PINTS FOR BLOOD BANK IS QUOTA FOR MOBILE UNIT'S VISIT HERE

First time donors are urged to give blood at the blood clinic here on Tuesday, April 4. Citizens are requested to vote at the municipal building on that day and then go to the Kewaskum High school to donate blood.

Records of our Community Blood Donor club, of which Kewaskum is a part, show a total of 791 pints of blood withdrawn in the last six months, from Sept. 1, 1960, to March 1, 1961. This averages more than four pints per day. This life-giving service to the community costs not one cent to blood users.

The club's support comes from hundreds of volunteer donors, workers, organized groups and from the community fund. Cash savings to residents in the area covered by the Community Donor club for just the last six months, since Sept. 1, total \$27,685.

You, too, can help by volunteering to donate to this life-saving effort on Tuesday, April 4, when the mobile blood donor unit will be at the Kewaskum High school gym from 1:30 to 5:45 p. m.

Local Residents to Be Interviewed By Gas Co.

The village board of Kewaskum has granted the Milwaukee Gas Light company an exclusive franchise to distribute and serve natural gas in the village of Kewaskum.

On April 3, 4 and 5 six market research interviewers from the Milwaukee Gas Light Co. will be in the village interviewing the residents. By doing this interviewers will get an indication of the number of residents interested in the future use of natural gas, when they would desire service, and for what appliances the fuel would be used.

The market research interviewers will be driving Milwaukee Gas Light Co. cars and will have identification cards that will be shown residents upon request.

This information will enable the Milwaukee Gas Light Co. to provide the residents of Kewaskum with prompt and efficient natural gas service.

Trustee Race Expected To Bring Out Vote in Spring Election Apr. 4

BALLOTS TO BE CAST FOR COURT JUSTICE, SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENTS AND SIX REFERENDUMS

Interest in the spring election next Tuesday, April 4, began mounting this week as residents of the various towns and villages prepared to cast their ballots for local officials. In addition to local races, voters will also be casting ballots for a justice of the supreme court, a state superintendent of schools, county superintendent of schools, and on six referendum issues.

Voting in the village will be in the municipal building from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Balloting for the town of Kewaskum will be done at the Labor Center here.

The only contest on the village ballot will be for the three trustee offices. There are five candidates for the three positions, namely incumbents Joe Eberle, Wayland Tessar and Cyril N. Wietor, and Francis Bohn and Joseph Schwind. President James D. Reigle and Supervisor Elwyn Romaine will be unopposed for re-election. Carl F. Schaefer will be unopposed for assessor to succeed Ralph Remmel.

In the town of Kewaskum Chairman Ed. J. Campbell will be opposed by Myron Belger and Assessor John Muckerheide will be opposed by Roger Dobke. Other officers who will be unopposed for re-election are Arnold Amerling, supervisor No. 1; William Becker, supervisor No. 2; Alfred H. Seefeldt, clerk, and Lloyd Schmidt, assessor.

Town of Wayne candidates are: Chairman—John Oelhafen and Earl Schulz; supervisors (vote for 2)—Leo Zehren and Elmer Boettcher; clerk—Paul C. Moritz; treasurer—Raymond Kudek; assessor—Arnold Hawig, Jr.; justice of peace—Bernard Strobel.

On the judicial ballot, Steward G. Honeck and Myron L. Gordon are in the race for the state supreme court seat. Angus B. Rothwell and William J. Fenelon are the candidates for election as state superintendent of schools. Harry D. Sheski, incumbent county superintendent of schools, is unopposed for re-election.

Voters will also have an opportunity to cast their ballots on six separate amendments to the state constitution at the polls Tuesday. The six proposed amendments have already been passed by the required two successive legislatures and all that remains before they can become effective is the vote of the people. Because of the number and length of the proposed amendments, space does not permit us to list each of them. However, voters are urged to study the amendments before voting either for or against them. Sample copies are available at this office and the municipal building.

Gas Company Granted Franchise to Distribute Natural Gas in Village

Adjourned Meeting
March 20, 1961

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present. Representatives of the Milwaukee Gas Light Company explained to the board the advantages of natural gas to a community.

The company spokesman then made a formal request for a franchise to distribute and sell natural gas in the village.

Representatives of the Robert M. Arthur Engineering Company of Fond du Lac presented their qualifications as municipal engineers if they were to be engaged by the village.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the board adjourned subject to call.

Special Meeting
March 23, 1961

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in special session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

Village Attorney Stephen O'Meara read a proposed ordinance granting a franchise to the Milwaukee Gas Light Company to distribute and sell natural gas in the Village of Kewaskum.

This ordinance was then introduced by Trustee Tessar:

ORDINANCE NO. 61-1
VILLAGE BOARD OF
VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum does ordain as follows:

SECTION I.

The Village of Kewaskum does hereby grant to Milwaukee Gas Light Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin, its successors and assigns, upon the conditions hereinafter set forth, the exclusive right, authority and permission to construct, maintain, operate, enlarge and repair in the Village of Kewaskum a system for the furnishing and distribution of natural gas and natural gaseous fuels, and to use the streets, alleys, lanes, boulevards, parks, public ways, public grounds and bridges in said Village of Kewaskum, for constructing, maintaining, operating, enlarging and repairing its

PARENTS OF ALL EIGHTH GRADE GRADUATES ARE URGED TO ATTEND

"PARENT NIGHT" will be held at the Kewaskum Community High school on Wednesday, April 12, at 8:00 p. m.

The parents of all graduating eighth graders who will be entering high school next fall are invited and urged to attend. All high school teachers will be in their rooms at 7:45 so that you may visit the rooms and meet the teachers before the formal program begins.

The program will include discussions concerning the selection of subjects available to new freshmen students, general school rules, conduct and dress, and a "question and answer" period. The school's purpose will be to inform the parents of entering freshmen so that the students can discuss their problems with their parents.

The evening program will be followed up by a registration and testing day on Saturday, April 15, at 8:00 a. m. in the high school. It is very urgent that all graduating eighth graders who will be entering Kewaskum Community High school next fall be at the high school that morning to complete their registration and take the required tests.

Damage Caused By Windstorm Monday

High winds, between 30 and 40 miles an hour, with gusts up to 60 miles an hour, which swooped into this area Monday afternoon and evening, caused some damage. The winds, out of the southwest, were accompanied by rain.

At the Fair Variety store in this village, a plate glass window was shattered when a door, caught by the force of the wind, blew against it. On the Elroy Pesch farm in the town of Auburn, northeast of New Fane near St. Matthias church, a wooden silo was torn loose from its foundation by the twisting wind. The silo landed partly in the farmyard and nearby highway, with parts of it blowing across the road. It was reported that in the same area, where the wind reached the proportions of a small "twister," a chicken coop was also moved.

This was the only damage of any consequence reported although in some areas trees and limbs, poles, signs and wires were snapped off and windows broken.

25 Years Ago

March 27, 1936

A carload of grape jam, weighing 34,200 pounds, was unloaded at the relief department warehouse at Fond du Lac for distribution to relief units in the eastern half of the state. 240 cans of the jam, packed 41 pounds to a can, totalling 1,080 pounds, was sent to the Washington county relief office.

Mr. and Mrs. Gerhard Reinders moved from Doylestown into the former Mrs. Mary Jacobitz residence on Main st. where the former intends to conduct an undertaking parlor in the near future.

Another severe blizzard struck this area last Saturday, which was even worse than the several previous ones in the past weeks. All roads were closed and traffic shut off, including the railroads. A North Western railroad plow became stuck in the snow several miles north of the village. Another plow from Milwaukee, picking up all available help between that city and here, including 15 emergency volunteers from Kewaskum, finally succeeded in freeing the engine, which drifted in deeper and deeper. Highway crews worked day and night from Saturday through Wednesday but many roads were still impassible. Many farmers have not been to town for weeks and fuel supplies are running low. At this writing Wednesday another snowstorm has begun. The storms arrive faster than highway crews can open the roads. Many old timers admit that this winter of 1936 has been even more severe than the record one in 1881. All one reads about is people freezing to death and being marooned, towns isolated, stalled cars and plows, impassible roads, etc. John Van Blarcom, our genial Gamble Store dealer, was forced to walk from Wayne Saturday evening. He had been on business at Allenton and the blizzard compelled him to take "shank's mare." Johnny informs us traffic was not crowded. Oscar Backus, who conducts a barber

shop in West Bend walked home along the railroad tracks from that city. Wm. Schaefer was stalled at Gumm's garage with a truckload of coal over the weekend. Herb Koch, who drives for Walter Schneider, was marooned at Saukville. Walter Schneider and Earl Kohler were snowed in at Campbellsport from Saturday to Monday. Some schools have been closed for four weeks and some farmers have had no mail delivery in four weeks. Milk is hauled by bobsleigh and temperatures dropped to 25 degrees below zero.

Joe Miller and Harold Claus, guards on the city basketball team, were placed on the Land o' Lakes league northern division all-star team, which played the southern division stars at Menomonee Falls. The South won 42-24. Otto Stenschke led the local team in scoring this season with 142 points, seventh highest in the league.

Because of the old time winter and many sleighs, Joe Eberle has again opened his barns for the farmers to put up their horses.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

March 25, 1911

Rev. Greve surprised families of his congregation with a photo of himself and family.

Herman Backhaus had the misfortune of losing one of his valuable horses on account of it falling down and breaking a leg. Herman owned the animal only a few days, having made a horse trade with John Muehleis.

Henry Backhaus, Sr., 88, one of the first settlers of this village died.

The marriage of Miss Alma Harter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Harter of the town of Auburn, to John Volk of Wabeno took place at Holy Trinity church.

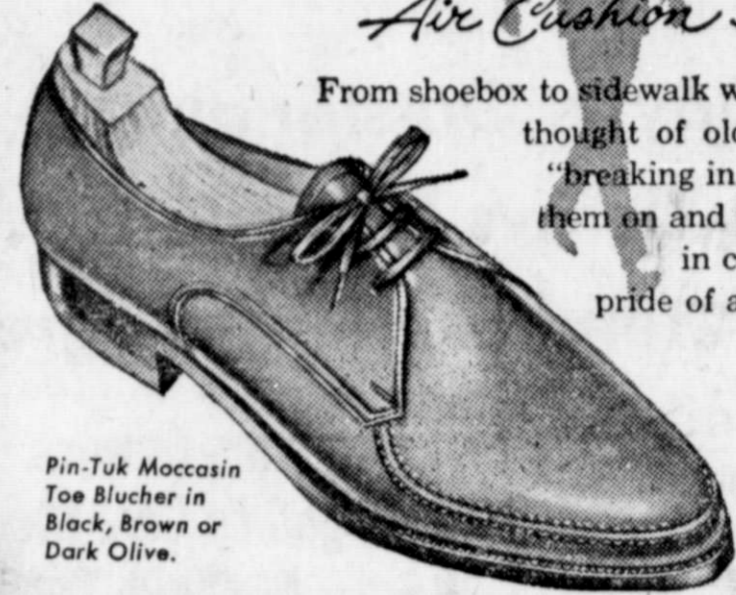

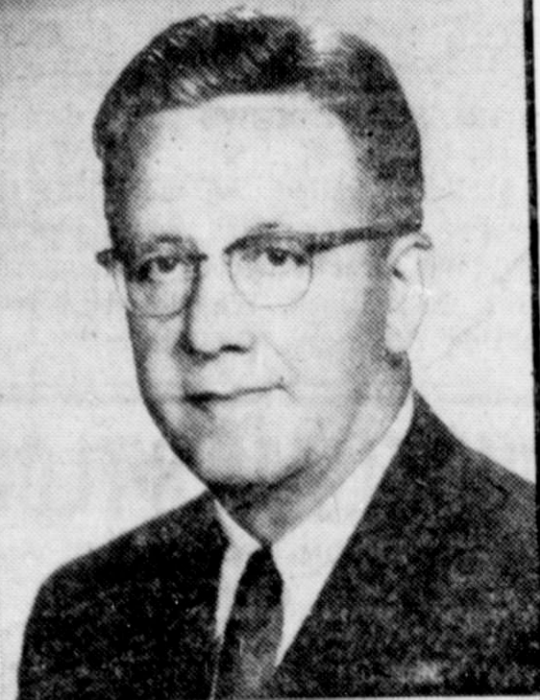

transmission and distribution pipelines with all the necessary, usual or convenient manholes, valves, passage ways and appurtenances for the purpose of supplying and selling natural gases and natural gaseous fuels to said Village of Kewaskum and its residents and to any building, structure, factory, processing plant, industry or public or private house or any gas user therein.

PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that this franchise is granted subject to such reasonable rules and regulations as the Village Board of said Village of Kewaskum may by ordinance from time to time prescribe, and it is further subject to all general provisions of statutory laws in force and applicable thereto and to the general orders, rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin.

This franchise shall be void if facilities are not constructed and gas is not ready for distribution in the Village of Kewaskum within 18 months after the date this ordinance is adopted.
