Re-Elect Eberle, Tessar, Wietor Trustees in Tuesday's Election

Township Re-Elects Campbell, Dobke Beats Muckerheide

GORDON AND ROTHWELL ARE STATE VICTORS; ONLY 326 VOTES CAST HERE

Less than half of the eligible voters in Kewaskum went to the polls in the spring election Tuesday when a total of 326 ballots were cast. The votes came in slow up to noon but a spurt late in the afternoon brought the total vote slightly higher than expected.

Local voters returned all three incumbent trustees to office for another two years, namely Joe Eberle, Wayland Tessar and Cyril Wietor. The two other aspirants, Joseph Schwind and Francis "Booby" Bohn ran a weak fourth and fifth. Tessar polled the most votes among the trustee candidates with 264, followed in order by Eberle with 212, Wietor 209, Schwind 136 and Bohn 111.

Village President James D. Reigle received a fine endorsement by polling the most votes on the ballot, 294 out of a possible 326. He was unopposed for re-election. Elwyn M. Romaine, who was unopposed for re-election as supervisor, received 285 votes. Carl F. Schaefer was elected assessor to succeed Ralph Rempel, who was not a candidate for re-election. Schaefer also unopposed, received 288 votes.

On the judicial and school superintendent ballot, village voters did not follow the state pattern for justice of the supreme court. Although defeated in the state, Stewart G. Honeck received 193 votes to 114 for Myron L. Gordon in the village. For the state superintendent of schools office Angus B. Rothwell, also victor in the state, outpolled William J. Fenelon locally two to one, 200 votes to 101. Harry D. Sheski, who was unopposed for re-election as county superintendent of schools, polled 271 votes here.

On the six referendum issues village voters favored all of them except No. 2, dealing with sheriff's terms. This followed the state pattern except that statewide the No. 4 issue dealing with salaries of public officials was also defeated. The vote locally on these issues was as follows: No. 1, concerning school debts—yes 159, no 81; No. 2, sheriff's term limitation—yes 100, no 160; No. 3, continuity of government in time of war—yes 200, no 34; No. 4, salaries of public officials—yes 121, no 105; No. 5, land condemnation—yes 158, no 79; No. 6, taxation of stocks and products—yes 168, no 64.

In the town of Kewaskum 223 votes were cast, which is a very good turnout for a spring election. Opposition for some of the township offices no doubt had much to do with bringing out the voters.

For the office of assessor Roger Dobke defeated the incumbent.

Nine Kewaskum students received "A" ratings and the local school won the forensic trophy in the Scenic Moraine conference contest held at Grafton on March 11. All of these winners became eligible for the district contest but Degnitz and Kroncke were unable to compete. Kewaskum will be host to the Scenic Moraine league forensic contest in 1962.

85 Pints of Blood Collected at Clinic Here; Donors Listed

The Blood Donor Clinic held at the Kewaskum High school on Tuesday afternoon was another decided success. Although the quota of 100 pints was not quite reached, 85 pints of blood were collected. A total of 98 "brave" Kewaskumites registered to donate blood but there were 13 rejects. Had all of them been accepted the quota would have just about been attained.

The blood collected at the mobile unit's visit here will be deposited in the Community Blood Donor club bank, where it is urgently needed, and of which Kewaskum is a part. In the last six months 791 pints of blood were withdrawn from the bank, an average of more than four pints per day. This life-giving service to the community costs not one cent to blood users. Cash savings to residents in the past six months amounted to \$27,685.

Chairman Henry Rosenheimer and co-chairman Mrs. E. E. Miller want to thank all who helped with the blood clinic, especially the donors. They also wish to thank the ladies of Peace church who served the lunch to the donors, namely Mrs. Robert Kroncke, chairman; Mmes. Amelia Butzlaff, Ervin Butzlaff, Walter Bade, Ralph Erdmann, Willard Gruhle, Clarence Hammen, Myron Perschbacher, Art. Petermann, Lloyd Teeselink and Walter Wesenberg. Death of Mrs. Dorothy Guggisberg on Sunday

Mrs. Dorothy Guggisberg, a long time resident of Kewaskum, passed away at the home of her sister, Miss Margaret Lufi, at Blooming Prairie, Minn. on Sunday morning, April 2. She had reached the age of 79 years.

Mrs. Guggisberg was born in Mound Prairie township, Houston county, Minn., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oswald Lufi, Sr. on July 17, 1881. She was united in marriage to Christ Guggisberg on Oct. 12, 1904. The couple lived at Elmore until the death of Mr. Guggisberg on June 17, 1926, after which she moved to Kewaskum about 35 years ago.

Mrs. Guggisberg was a practical nurse in this vicinity until she suffered a stroke in January of 1953. She had made her home with her sister, Miss Lufi, the past 7½ years.

Mrs. Guggisberg was a member of the Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, and a faithful attendant until the time of her illness.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Katherine Von Moos, of La Crescent, Minn. and Miss Lufi; two brothers, Jacob Lufi of Isanti, Minn. and Nicolaus Lufi of Seattle, Wash., and other relatives. Mrs. Guggisberg was a cousin of the Guntz sisters of Campbellsport. Four brothers, Oswald, Christ, Ulrich and Arnold Lufi predeceased her.

Funeral services were held at 1 p. m. Wednesday at Peace United Church of Christ here. Burial took place in the Elmore cemetery.

John Muckerheide, by a very narrow margin of four votes in a real close race. Dobke received 111 votes to 107 for Muckerheide. In the other race on the ballot incumbent chairman Ed. J. Campbell defeated Myron Belger by a margin of 134 votes to 80. For supervisor No. 1 Arnold Amerling, incumbent, was re-elected, receiving 148 votes to 54 for Wesley Haug, who was a write-in candidate. Other officials re-elected without opposition were: Supervisor No. 2—William Becker, 180; clerk—Alfred Seefeldt, 192; treasurer—Lloyd Schmidt, 195, the largest vote polled by any candidate.

Balloting in the township on the judicial and school superintendent election was as follows: Justice of the supreme court—Honeck 127, Gordon 60; state superintendent—Rothwell 103, Feneion 91; county superintendent—Sheski 148. Results on the referendum ballot were: No. 1—yes 70, no 56; No. 2—yes 40, no 100; No. 3—yes 90, no 34; No. 4—yes 45, no 75; No. 5—yes 58, no 63; No. 6—yes 69, no 51.

In the town of Wayne Chairman John Oelhafen 207, defeated incumbent Earl Schulz 57. Others elected were: Supervisors—Elmer Boettcher, incumbent, 196, and Leo Zehren 203, both elected; clerk—Paul C. Moritz, incumbent, 240; treasurer—Raymond Kudek, incumbent, 238; assessor—Arnold Hawig, Jr., incumbent, 218; justice—Bernard Strobel, incumbent, 225.

In Washington county the vote on the referendum issues was follows: No. 1—Yes 4,634, No 2,631; No. 2—Yes 2,952, No 5,003; No. 3—Yes 5,234, No 1,558; No. 4—Yes 3,408, No 3,704; No. 5—Yes 4,025, No 3,082; No. 6—Yes 4,324, No 2,540. No figures were available on the county vote for the judicial and school superintendent offices.
