## **Barton Youth Pleads Guilty in Local Minor Bar Shooting Case**

Appearing before Judge Lester A. Buckley in county court in connection with the shooting of two girls in Steve and Mary's minor bar just north of Kewaskum last Jan. 15, George J. Heinecke, 21, of Barton pleaded guilty Monday afternoon.

Heinecke was charged with a "high degree of negligence in the operation of a firearm, contrary to Sec. 940.24 of Wisconsin statutes." Judge Buckley ordered a two-week pre-sentence investigation of the case by the State Public Welfare Department and deferred sentencing until such an investigation is completed.

Heinecke was ordered to return to court in two weeks for disposition of the case. He was free on \$2,000 bond, which he furnished in January, pending his appearance in court. The defendant was accompanied by a lawyer. Prosecuting the case was District Atterney Richard T. Becker, who summarized the case to the court when Heinecke pleaded guilty.

The two girls wounded in the shooting at the minor bar, both of whom were shot in the legs, were Miss Bonnie Carol Stahl, 18, Random Lake, and Miss Maureen Borchert, 20, of Kewaskum, Both have since recovered.
