### 24 Kewaskum Firemen Attend Badger Banquet

MORE THAN 400 AT EVENT; AWARD BOWLING PRIZES, '62 MEET AT WEST BEND

The annual spring meeting and banquet of the Badger Firemen's association was held Sunday afternoon and evening at Grafton. Twenty-four Kewaskum firemen, over half of the members of the department, attended the evening banquet in the St. Joseph's church hall.

The afternoon meeting was held at Wood's hotel in Grafton with all 20 departments of the association represented. Kewaskum was represented by Chief Harry Schaefer and delegates Roger Reindl and Willard Manthei. Other county departments at the conference included West Bend, Barton, Boltonville, Newburg, Jackson and Germantown.

Included in the afternoon's business was the selection of the city for the 1962 association bowling tournament, which was awarded to West Bend. The tournament is held in January and February. Germantown put in a bid for the 1963 bowling meet and that village, in all probability, will be host to the event.

Over 400 firemen attended the banquet at 6 p. m. in the church hall and enjoyed a delicious ham and beef dinner with wonderful service. A program, which included introductions, short speeches, a demonstration on gas fumes, and the usual jokes followed the dinner. At this time Allen Bruederle of Cedarburg, association secretary-treasurer, also awarded the cash prizes and trophies won in this year's bowling tournament held in his city.

West Bend walked off with the major share of winnings and trophies. Their team No. 5 placed first in the team events with 2913, giving them the high team trophy and \$75.00 in cash. West Bend team No. 4 placed sixth in team events with 2773, good for another \$40.00. Team No. 2 from that city was 21st, good for another \$15.00 with a 2668. Each member of the first place team also received an individual trophy and for the first time won the new "traveling trophy" donated by Barth's Bar and Restaurant in Cedarburg. Bob Kell of West Bend was also awarded a trophy as all events winner. West Bend also won \$53.50 in doubles and singles for a total of \$183.50.

First place winners in the doubles were K. Straub and A. Boerner of Cedarburg with 1302 (\$30) and Boerner was also singles winner with 680 (\$15).

For the first time this year Kewaskum firemen failed to win any prize money in any of the events, although a total of \$1,100 in cash was paid out.

### Barton Youth Pleads Guilty in Local Minor Bar Shooting Case

Appearing before Judge Lester A. Buckley in county court in connection with the shooting of two girls in Steve and Mary's minor bar just north of Kewaskum last Jan. 15, George J. Heinecke, 21, of Barton pleaded guilty Monday afternoon.

Heinecke was charged with a "high degree of negligence in the operation of a firearm, contrary to Sec. 940.24 of Wisconsin statutes." Judge Buckley ordered a two-week pre-sentence investigation of the case by the State Public Welfare Department and deferred sentencing until such an investigation is completed.

Heinecke was ordered to return to court in two weeks for disposition of the case. He was free on \$2,000 bond, which he furnished in January, pending his appearance in court. The defendant was accompanied by a lawyer. Prosecuting the case was District Attorney Richard T. Becker, who summarized the case to the court when Heinecke pleaded guilty.

The two girls wounded in the shooting at the minor bar, both of whom were shot in the legs, were Miss Bonnie Carol Stahl, 18, Random Lake, and Miss Maureen Porchert, 20, of Kewaskum. Both have since recovered.

### NANCY HELD NAMED SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

Nancy Held, Kewaskum High school senior, has been named a zone winner in the fourth annual Thorp Finance Foundation Scholarship competition and will receive a \$25.00 United States Savings Bond. The announcement was made by Donald W. Mueller, Thorp branch manager in Hartford.

The essay contest, which was open to more than 39,000 Wisconsin high school seniors, offers two top prizes of \$1,000 scholarships to any one of the colleges or universities in the state accredited by the North Central association of colleges and secondary schools. The winners will be announced on April 17, according to Foundation President Francis J. Conway.

Nancy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Held. The family lives at 361 First St., Kewaskum.

### MILK TRUCK DRIVER IS PICKED UP ON CHARGE

Eugene A. Reimer, 111 Everett st., Fond du Lac, driver of a milk truck, was picked up at 8:20 a. m. Tuesday by Kewaskum police chief Roland Pledl on a charge of driving while his license was revoked. District Attorney Richard Becker issued a warrant to Reimer for driving after revocation of his license. A preliminary hearing was held before Judge Robert Stoltz and Reimer posted \$200 bond. The hearing was set for May 13.

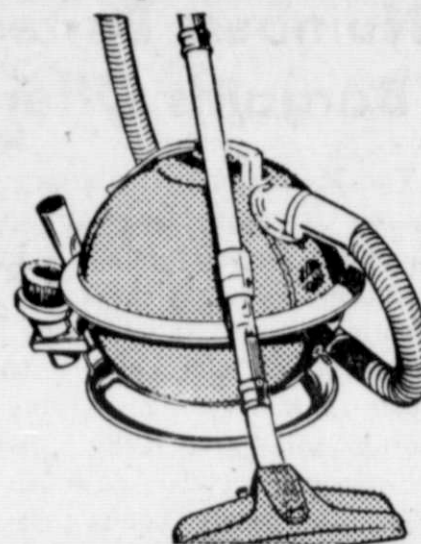

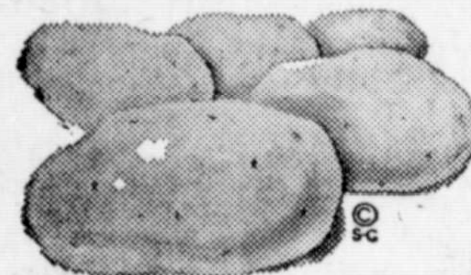

#### Our Police Chief Says

Nearly 500 bicycle riders are killed each year in traffic accidents and with the spring season safety directors are stressing the need for bike riders to obey traffic signs and safety rules. One of the most important regulations is the one requiring cyclists riding at night to have a white headlight visible for at least 500 feet and a clean, red reflector visible for 300 feet to the rear. Other rules to obey are: Keep both hands on the handle bars, keep to the right, don't weave around in traffic, ride one on a bike, have your bicycle checked often, and use correct hand signals.

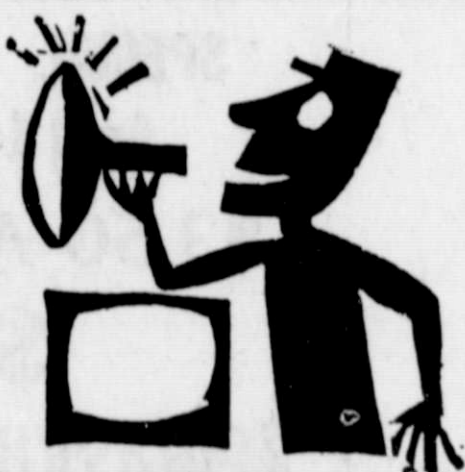
