Regal Ware Leases Schaefer Building; Industries Moves Out

Advertising Dept. To Occupy; Buy McLaughlin Home

PAST YEAR BEST IN FIRM'S HISTORY; NEED SPACE FOR EXPANSION

It's spring in Kewaskum and Regal Ware, Inc. is expanding again—always a sure sign that another year has elapsed. Latest changes find the company's advertising department moving into the Schaefer building at 1245 Fond du Lac ave. and the removal of the recently purchased Rose McLaughlin home to provide extra parking area for Regal employees.

The Schaefer building, owned by Carl and Harry Schaefer, who formerly conducted a garage business in it, has been occupied for the past two years by Kewaskum Industries, Inc., manufacturers of parts for marine engines for the Kieckhafer Corp. This firm's machinery and equipment has been moved back to Oshkosh and Regal Ware will take possession of the building about May 1.

The changes are a direct result of the continued increase and expansion of Regal Ware's business—a process that has been going on almost without interruption since the company was founded in 1945. The past year was the best in the company's 15-year existence, and President J. O. Reigle recently announced that sales during March made it the biggest single month in Regal's history. Such a record—during a period of recession throughout the rest of the country—certainly gives reason to be optimistic about the future.

Razing of the McLaughlin home on Second st. is now well under way and should be completed within a week or ten days. The company will develop the area into a parking lot with room for many cars.

The advertising department's move will be its second in less than a year. In May 1960 it was moved from the general office building to more spacious offices above the Kewaskum theater, which it presently shares with the Direct Sales Division of Regal Ware. That change served the dual purpose of providing increased space for advertising activities and opening additional room to relieve crowding in the general office.

The new facilities in the Schaefer building will allow all of the advertising functions—previously carried on in three separate locations—to be combined in one building. The northeast corner of the new quarters will become a printing shop. The southeast section will be used for storing, assembling and mailing advertising materials, while the art department, copy writing, and the director of advertising, George Hess' office will occupy the front offices. Co. Could Serve Village From Two Existing Systems

CONSTRUCTION OF SYSTEM TO BE COORDINATED WITH STREET PAVING PROGRAM

Milwaukee Gas Light Company estimates it will take about three months construction time to complete the first year natural gas facilities in the village of Kewaskum.

Robert H. Holder, manager of the utility's Engineering Design Department, made the construction estimates in testimony before the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin at Madison last week.

"We hope that natural gas service will be available in the village by September," Holder said.

Milwaukee Gas has requested PSC authority to distribute and sell natural gas in the village. The Kewaskum Village Board has granted Milwaukee Gas an exclusive franchise to provide natural gas service to the community.

Holder said construction of the natural gas distribution system would be coordinated with Kewaskum's 1961 street paving program. Construction would begin promptly after all necessary permits and authorizations are granted.

Holder explained that the company could extend natural gas service to Kewaskum either from Milwaukee Gas' existing system in the village of Barton, or from a lateral pipeline connection to the Michigan Wisconsin Pipe Line Company transmission line which

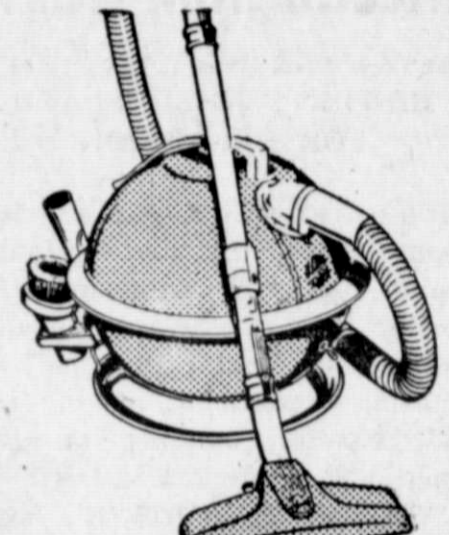

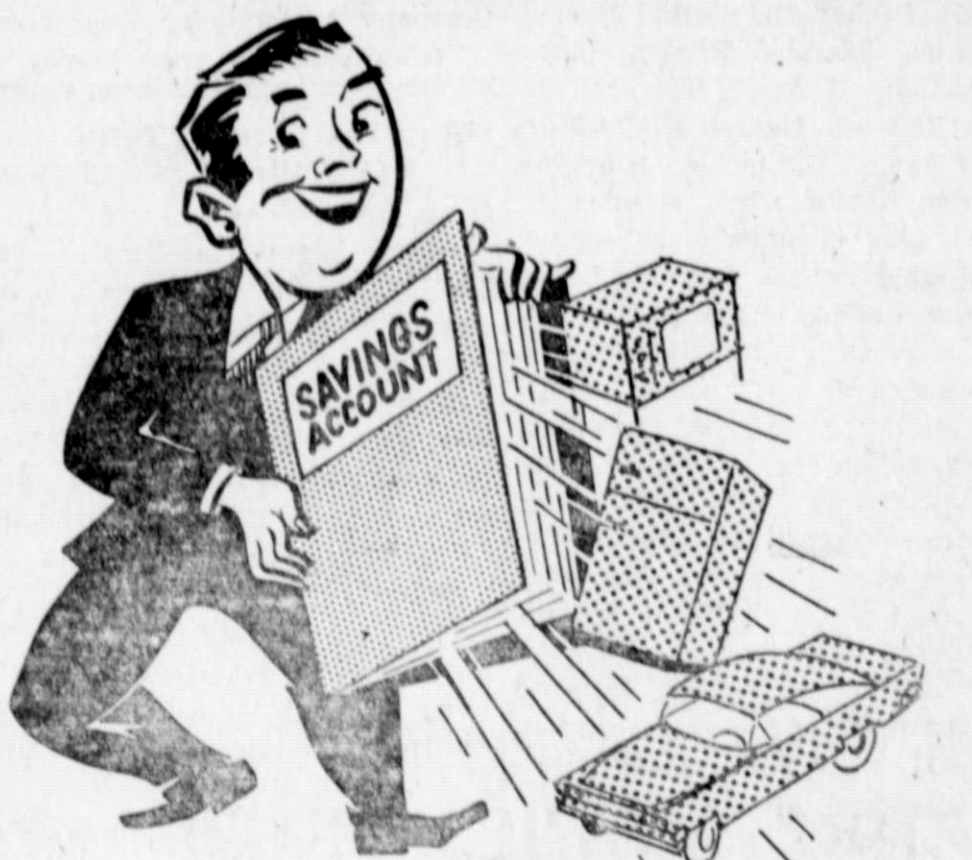

Six Persons Injured In Two Auto Crashes

Two persons suffered injuries in a three car mishap last Friday on Hwy. 45 about 2½ miles south of Kewaskum. Injured were Gary H. Bohn, Kewaskum, who sustained a laceration on the forehead and abrasions on the right knee and Ken Weddig, who suffered a forehead abrasion and lacerations on his right knee.

Investigating officers reported the accident happened when the southbound Bohn car, in the process of passing, struck the left rear of a car operated by Reginald M. Pierret, West Bend. Bohn lost control of his auto and it swerved ahead of the Pierret car and struck a guard rail on the west side of the road and glanced off and veered into the northbound lane, striking an auto driven by Weddig, who was traveling north.

Four persons were hurt in a two car crash at Eighth and Poplar sts. in West Bend during the noon hour Wednesday. would construct a 6-inch pipeline from the junction of State Highway 28 and County Trunk Highway HH into Kewaskum.

Approximately 5,200 feet of 6-inch pipe and 5,800 feet of 4-inch pipe would be installed to compose Kewaskum's initial distribution system. Total cost of this would be about \$228,602. The company would expand the initial distribution system with smaller diameter pipe to serve residents whose property is not located adjacent to the initial system.

The alternative method of serving Kewaskum, as explained by Holder, would consist of a natural gas transmission pipeline extending from Milwaukee Gas' existing natural gas system in Barton to Kewaskum. This would require a 6-inch pipeline approximately 32,000 feet long. The aggregate cost of such a pipeline, the district regulator and the necessary initial distribution system in this case was estimated at \$267,452.

Holder stated, "At the end of five years we estimate that under the proposal to serve Kewaskum from Michigan Wisconsin's pipeline we would install distribution

facilities, including smaller mains (pipelines), services, meters and regulators at a total original cost of \$434,136."

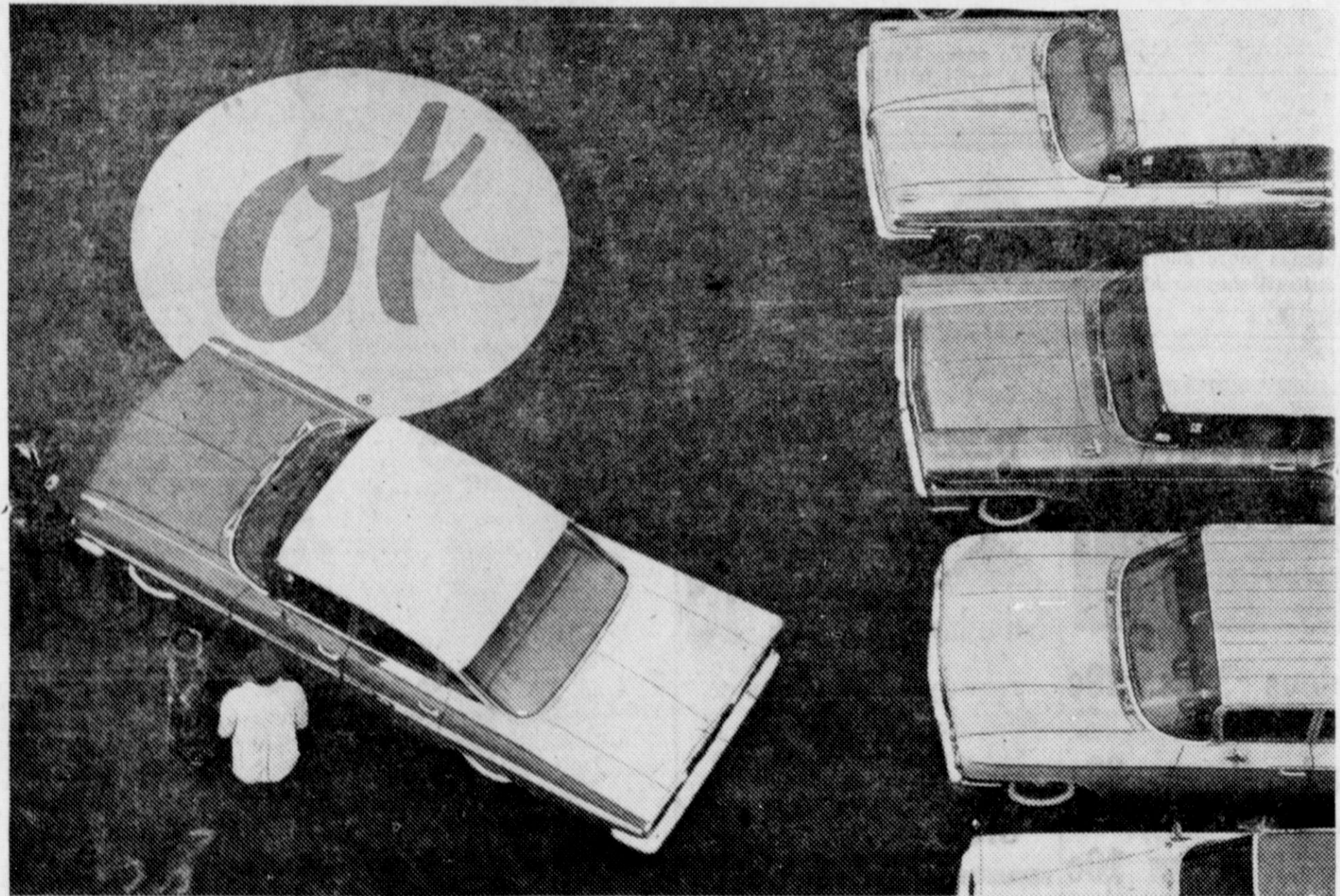

Arnold Furseth, Route 3, Stoughton, has been dairying all his life in southern Wisconsin. Until the new, modern Purina cage house was completed in late 1959, a 32-cow Guernsey herd plus about 60 head of hogs finished yearly rounded out the Furseth farming operation.

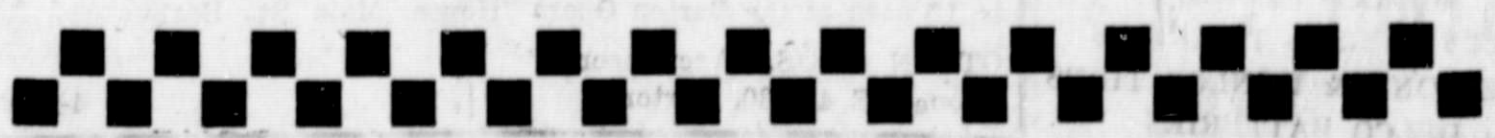

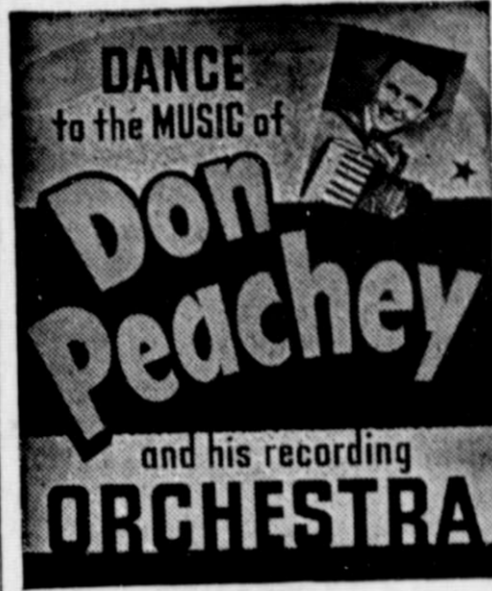
