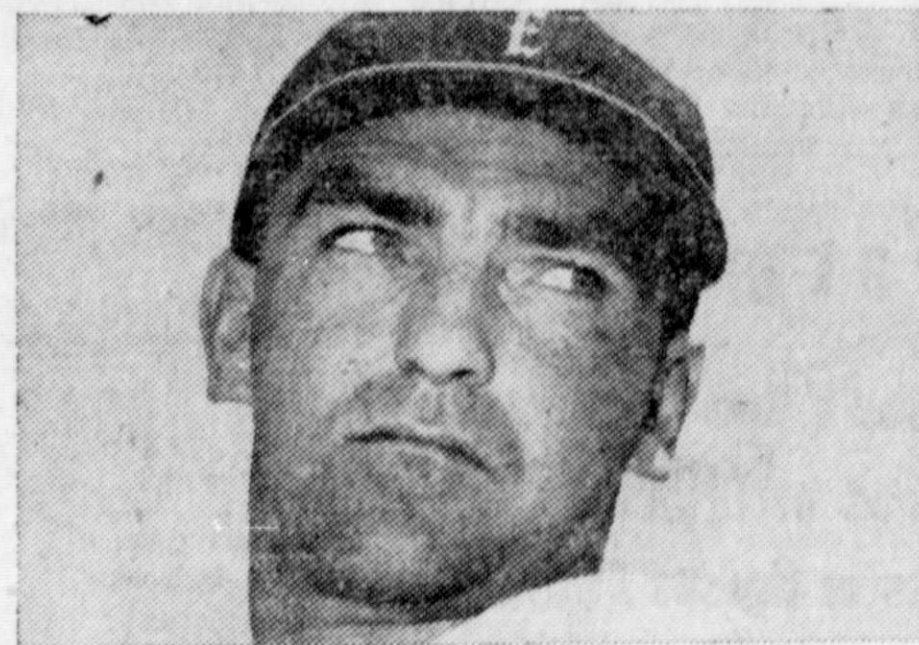

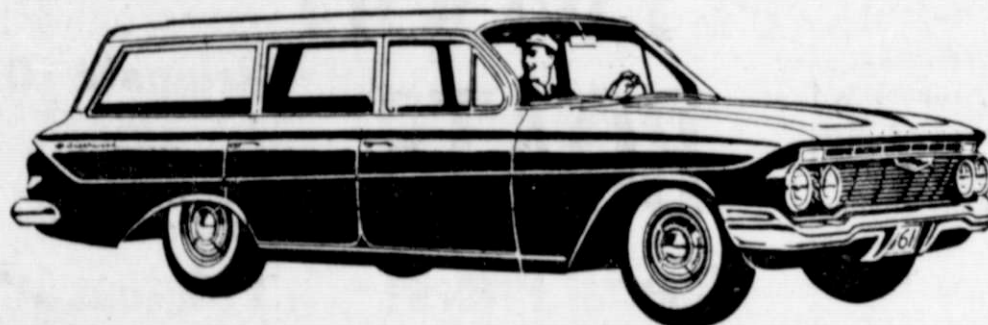

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

A doe deer was found on the Alex Lehnkuhl farm just east of Saukville. Apparently this animal is the one that was reported car-hit just south of Saukville on old Hwy. 57, April 13.

The season for taking frogs opened on April 30. The crayfish season remains closed until June 15.

The opening of the fishing season April 29 found a small but enthusiastic group of fishermen at Wallace lake and the Allenton creek. Those who were able to stand the cold night air caught fish at Wallace lake. There were too many men and too much disturbance at the Allenton stream for good fishing.

Brown trout were planted in Wallace lake and at the Allenton creek within the past three weeks.

At the Ozaukee County Congress meeting on April 17, sportsmen re-elected John J. Wilson, Fredonia, as their chairman for a three-year term. Robert Nelderborn, Port Washington, was re-elected as an alternate for a two-year term.

We are getting many questions relative to the proper fee to submit in applying for a certificate of number for your boat.

Numbering periods run for 3 years and started April 1, 1960. Therefore, the current period ends March 31, 1963.

The fee is \$3.00 for the 3 years, it is \$2.00 if 2 years or less, but more than 1 year remains of the numbering period; and \$1.00 if one year or less remains of the numbering period.

As the anniversary date of the

numbering period is April 1, all boats applying for an original certificate of number from now until April 1, 1962 will require a fee of \$2.00 and will expire March 31, 1963.

A new refuge was established in the town of Hartford this year to protect spawning walleye and northern pike. It will be known as the Pike lake refuge, beginning 500 feet above the Pike lake dam, thence north and downstream on the Rubicon river to the St. Paul railroad right-of-way.

The refuge law reads as follows: It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, capture, kill, or fish for fish in any manner.

The waters north of Highway 64 will open May 13 for all species of fish except large and small mouth bass and sturgeon. Bass will open June 3, north of Highway 64.

The season for bass in outlying waters will open June 7.

## Our Police Chief Says

The conservation department has intentions of "planting" fish in the Milwaukee river in Kewaskum for juvenile fishing but these fish will not be stocked unless the village prohibits motor boating on the river, which interferes with the spawning of fish. From the date of this publication it will be prohibited to operate any motor powered boat in the village of Kewaskum at any time.

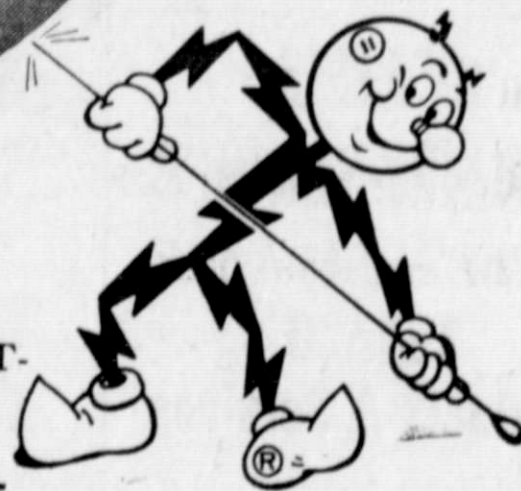
