Ski Hill Will Be Opened, Chalet Built at Kewaskum; Attract 500 Skiers Week Ends

Milwaukee Men **Buy 34 Acres** On Becker Farm

Dr. Casey was in Kewaskum Monday evening to attend large frame blacksmith shop and the Kiwanis club meeting, at other nearby buildings, the Kewhich he spoke, telling of his transaction and plans for the ski monedhill.

Dr. Casey said a name for the hill had already been selected. It will be operated under the name of Wunderberg Hill. Work on the project will be started as soon as possible and it is hoped to be in operation by next Dec. 1 Dr. Casey made it known that he expects the hill to attract an average of about 500 skiers on a week end during the winter months, mostly from Chicago and Milwaukee, as well as surrounding

The new owners will also erect a Wunderburg chalet under Aframe construction on the lower land surrounding the hill for furnishing rooms for the skiers and serving food and refreshments. In the beginning the ski hill and chalet will be open week ends and Wednesdays and possibly one evbe open seven days a week.

The partners intend to lay out two main ski trails on the hill. There will be an intermediate slope as well as an easy one for beginners. Also there will be a smaller bunny slope about 30 or 40 feet high for the children. One or possibly two ski tows will be installed and a plant will be in operation to manufacture their own snow.

The hill on the acreage purchased has been surveyed and found to be 201 feet in heighth. It will be the highest ski hill in this section of the country. Dr. Casey said he and his partner have been searching for a ski hill for eight months and the one on the Becker farm was the most natural and best one they could find. They do not intend to change the hill at all except for removing some trees.

Members of the Kiwanis club were very happy to learn this information. The club and Kewaskum Business association are well pleased with the project and welcome this latest addition to our community's recreational business growth and progress. They are eagerly looking forward to the new ski hill with much enthusiasm.

Blaze Damages Shed at Wayne

The roof, rafters and upstairs portion of a two-story frame shed were damaged by fire late Wednesday afternoon in a blaze at Wayne Center. The building, about 20 by 60 feet in size, owned by Wayne, just south of Petri's

The Kohlsville fire department was first called to the scene to fight the blaze but when the flames threatened to spread to the waskum firemen were also sum-

The firemen had the blaze under control in a short time and succeeded in saving the building, although most of the roof and interior of the upper story were destroyed. The Kewaskum department remained at the scene almost an hour while the Kohlsville firemen stayed longer to snuff out any remaining flames and prevent the fire from breaking out anew.

The blaze may have caused by sparks or embers from a nearby rubbish fire. The loss is covered by insurance.






