## Kewaskum Wins 6 1st Ratings in District Music Festival Here

On Saturday, April 29, Kewaskum Community High school was host to the District Band and Chorus Festival events. Upwards of 1,000 students representing 10 schools competed in 14 choral groups, 12 concert bands and 11 marching bands in a contest which began at 8 a. m. and was climaxed at 4 p. m. with a parade through the streets of Kewaskum. The parade was witnessed by a large crowd of people, many of them from out of town.

The Kewaskum groups had a very successful day in the festival, receiving six first division ratings out of seven events entered. The local groups were rated as follows: Freshman chorus, I; freshman glee club, II; boys' glee club, I; a capella choir, I; Kewaskum grade school band, I; Kewaskum high school band, I; Kewaskum marching band, I.

John Lutz is chorus director and Clyde Brehm director of bands at the high school.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Eberle, seconded by Trustee Degner and duly carried.

Fred Dorn, president of the local Sportsmen's Club, requested the board to take some action to ban boats with motors on the river at this time of the year because motor boats disturb the spawning beds of the fish.

The adjustment of sewage rates for Fairmont Foods Company, if and when their production operations are increased, was discussed by the board.

Her award winning theme, "Why I Am Choosing Home Economics," is as follows:

Soon after I began school, now almost 12 years ago, I felt that I would like to become a teacher, but until a few years ago I did not clearly know what I would like to teach. After seriously thinking about and investigating the possibilities of many fields, I

have chosen home economics because I feel that my interests lie in that direction. I enjoy working in the various phases of homemaking. I sew most of my own clothing and enjoy food preparation and experimentation. I enjoy working with people, and almost any phase of home economics holds opportunity for this.

I feel that the profession which could give me the greatest feeling of personal satisfaction and of community service will be that of teaching girls on the high school level the skills of homemaking and the art of family living. 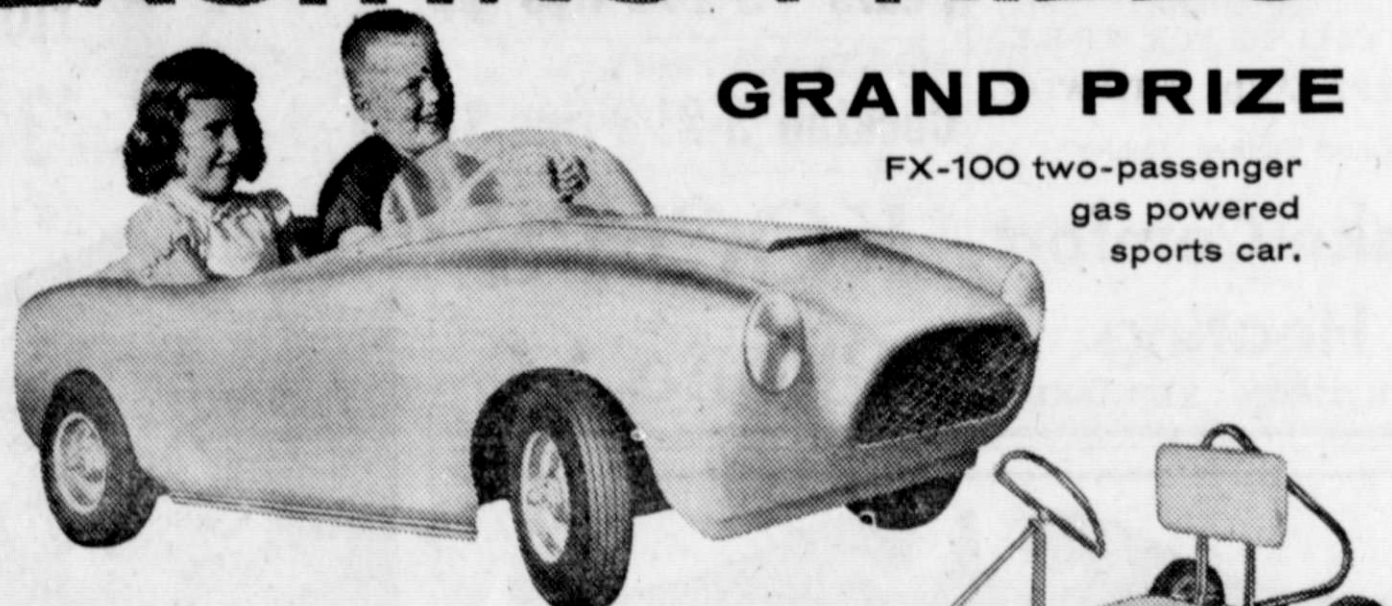

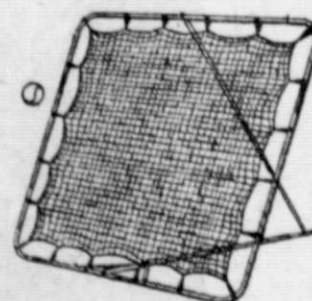

## Indian Track, Baseball Teams to Enter Ripon, Cedar Grove Tourneys To Observe Mail Box Improvement Program

Assignments of schools to district tournaments in baseball and sectional meets in track, golf and tennis have been announced by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic association. Action in the spring tourney program of the WIAA begins next week with the baseball meets and Class C track sectionals.

District meets in baseball, which starts May 13, must be completed by May 20 with the 64 winners meeting in playoff games on May 22 and 23. These 32 survivors enter eight sectionals May 26 and 27 and the sectional winners go to the state meet at Eau Claire June 1, 2 and 3.

Class C track sectionals will be held May 12 and 13 with first and second place finishers in the 14 events qualifying for the state meet at Ripon on May 20. Class A and B sectionals will be held May 18-20 with berths at stake in the state meets to be held in Milwaukee (Class A) at North stadium and in Hartford (Class B) on May 27.

In track, Class B, Kewaskum competes in the Ripon sectional on Friday, May 19, at 6 p. m. Other schools in the meet will be Adams-Friendship, Berlin, Columbus, De Forest, Horicon, Mayville, Omro, Ripon, Sun Prairie, Wau-pun, Wautoma, Winneconne and Wisconsin Dells.

In baseball Kewaskum will compete in the Cedar Grove district meet, playing Cedar Grove in game 1. In game 2 Howards Grove meets Random Lake. Winner of the Cedar Grove district will meet the winner of the Chilton district, by May 23, to qualify for sectional.

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced this week the annual mail box improvement program will be observed this year during the week of May 15 to 20 and will as heretofore include mail boxes on rural routes.

The postal department wishes to encourage patrons to provide suitable mail receptacles erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting a neat appearance, and affording protection to the mail. Boxes that are not properly erected, or not maintained in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to the weather. Boxes which are no longer serviceable must be replaced.

Patrons of rural routes are required to provide mail boxes of the standard approved type. Patrons who are still using boxes of the top-opening type would not be required to discard them, provided they have been continuously in use by the same owner and at

the same location for many years, if they are maintained in good serviceable condition and can be easily served by the carrier from his vehicle. Names of the box owners should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be inscribed on the box if desired. Boxes and supports should be kept painted. Mail boxes should be grouped if possible wherever practicable, particularly where adequate turnouts can be provided.

Mail boxes on rural and star routes must be located on the right side of the road in the direction of travel of the carriers in all cases where traffic conditions are such that it would be dangerous for the carriers to drive to the left in order to serve the boxes, or where their doing so would constitute a violation of state or local traffic laws and re-

gulations. It is requested that the local patrons on the rural routes which are served out of the Kewaskum Post office take a good look at their mail box and see if it doesn't need a good body and a fresh coat of paint.

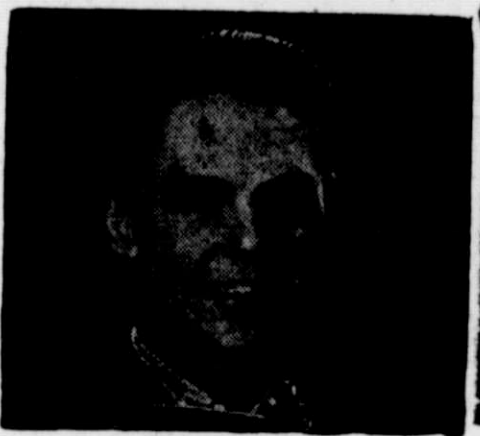

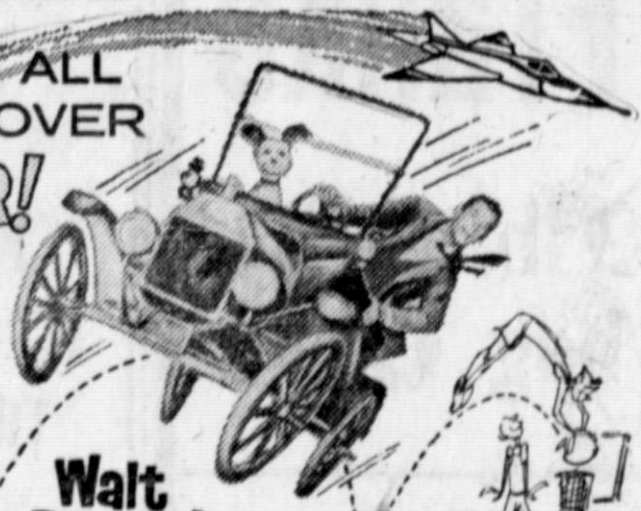
