71 Seniors Will Graduate at High School Exercises June 12

Celine Simon and Nancy Held Top Honor Students

Seventy-one members of the 1961 graduating class of Kewaskum Community High school will receive their diplomas at exercises to be held in the school auditorium on Monday, June 12, at 8 p. m. The graduates outnumber last year's class of 62 by nine students and it is one of the largest classes to be awarded diplomas.

Celine Simon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Simon, R. 1, Alenton, has been named valedictorian of the class. Her average for the four years is 96.0. Nancy Held, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Held, Kewaskum, is the salutatorian of the class with an average of 94.93.

Miss Simon will speak on "Looking to the Future" and Miss Held will discuss "The Sky Is No Longer the Limit" during the commencement program on June 12. The complete program appears below.

National Committeeman Speaker at Meeting of County Democrats Here

The May meeting of the Washington County Democratic Party was held Wednesday, May 24, at 8 p. m. at the Kewaskum Opera House. Guest speaker was the national committeeman of Wisconsin, David Rabinovitz.

More prizes in the party's membership contest were awarded and a committee was appointed to handle the annual booth at the Slinger county fair. Refreshments and a social hour followed the meeting.

Rabinovitz spoke on "Operation Support," the nationwide plan to rally public opinion in favor of President Kennedy's programs. He said:

"The same obstruction of elements are at work attempting to impede the liberal program of President John Kennedy and Governor Nelson. These groups oppose social legislation, aid to education, aid to hospitals and medical schools, both on a national and state level.

"It is incumbent upon people of all parties, both Republican and Democrat, to acquaint themselves with these programs and have their voices heard both in Washington and Madison and tell these legislators that the people do want liberal programs.

"The first one hundred days of Kennedy's administration were very much similar to the first hundred days of President Franklin Roosevelt's, the only difference being that the economic situation was much worse in 1933 than it is today, but the problems are much the same and have been met with the same degree of forcefulness and decision in both eras.

"The public will not and cannot wait any longer to obtain better schools, better housing, better teachers, and better medical programs. I am sure that their voices will be heard and recognized by the legislators if the public is sufficiently aroused to take such action.

"Our country needs these programs to keep pace, not only with our economic welfare but to show the way to the world that we can be strong within our economic system. To assist the aged in case of need is not a handout, but a means to strengthen this country by making living more secure and pleasant for our older citizens. To erect schools and provide better pay for teachers is not 'softness', is not socialism and is not destroying the initiative or self sufficiency of our people. It is merely recognizing a problem and meeting it for the best interests of our people."

Group to Meet Here for Tour of Ice Age Park

SUPREME COURT JUSTICE WILLIAM O. DOUGLAS TO TOUR SITE

Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas will visit one site in the proposed Ice Age National Park area on Saturday, June 10, and take part in a hike through another area on Sunday, June 11, according to information released by Robert Hummel, forester in the Mauthe lake area.

Justice Douglas will visit a trail site shelter off CT "G" on Saturday, traveling to the site from Milwaukee in the First Wisconsin National Bank helicopter. Doughnuts and coffee will be served at the shelter before Douglas returns to Milwaukee for an appearance over WTMJ at 6:15 p. m.

On Sunday the justice will join one of two groups touring the proposed park on foot. The groups will also include Congressman Henry Reuss and John Zillmer, son of the late Ray Zillmer, who was instrumental in promoting the park. One of the groups will start from the northern end of the trail in the Greenbush picnic area at 8:45 a. m. and proceed south. The second group will come from Milwaukee to Kewaskum and then proceed by car caravan to another trail site shelter south of Dundee and hike north from that point. The latter group will be led by Clarence O'Connor, chairman of the Ice Age Trail committee.

Both groups of hikers will meet at noon in the vicinity of Butler lake, where they will have lunch. Justice Douglas will depart by plane from Milwaukee the same evening for Washington, D. C. The public is invited to take part in the hike.

School Band to Open \$5,000 Drive for New Uniforms With Concert

Monday, June 5, at 8:00 p. m. marks the beginning of an all-out drive by the Kewaskum High school band to earn five thousand dollars for new uniforms for its members. At this time the band will perform one of its major concerts of the year, featuring a variety of music to suit every musical taste. At the intermission of this concert, a free-will offering will be taken, with all proceeds going to the uniform fund.

The need for new uniforms is obvious to anyone who witnessed the parade at the recent District Music festival in which Kewaskum received a first division rating in spite of the fact that they were the only competing school without usable uniforms.

The band has increased in both size and quality in the past few years. There are now a total of 130 students enrolled in the band program. This includes approximately 30 first-year players, 50 junior band members, and 50 senior band members. In keeping with the present expansion program, this would seem to be the ideal time to begin work on the uniform fund. The interest and cooperation of the community in this enterprise will be appreciated.

A large amount of the population of Kewaskum attended the moving picture, "The Country Doctor," starring the famous Dionne quintuplets at West Bend Sunday.

L. P. Rosenheimer and daughter Ruth left for Watertown, S. D. via auto to visit Lehman Rosenheimer, Jr., who has charge of a department in a Marshall Field store at that place.

The village board has set the rate for common labor at 30 cents per hour for the ensuing year and special labor 40 cents per hour for village workers. The board also voted to purchase a badly needed 1½ ton truck with hydraulic hoist and dump body. Wm. F. Schultz has a group of

carpenters at work remodeling his hotel annex, formerly occupied by the Eichstedt Jewelry Store, into residential quarters.

John Klessig has been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Emil C. Backhaus as school clerk.

A few bolts of thunder, immediately followed by a severe hailstorm and a wind of very high velocity, paid a destructive visit to this vicinity Wednesday. About an inch of hailstones covered the ground after the young tornado had ceased. Many trees were uprooted and small articles blown through the air. The most destruction done was to the baseball grandstand, the roof of which was completely blown off and the wire netting torn from its foundation. Roofs were torn off a few barns and many small sheds were tipped over.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

May 27, 1911

A deanery meeting was held at the parsonage of Rev. Ph. J. Vogt. Priests present included Rev. Stupfel of West Bend, Rev. Beyer of Lost Lake, Revs. July and Joseph of Campbellsport, Rev. Kraemer of Dotyville and

Rev. Hausler of Armstrong. Considerable excitement prevailed in this village Saturday evening at about 8:30 when the dam on the local mill pond gave way. The cause of the giveaway was the gradual washing out which weakened the supports. Over one-half of the dam was wrecked. The water rushed through the break with great violence and a roaring noise. Low lands along the river were flooded but no further damage was done.

The Enger-Kress pocket book factory of West Bend was totally destroyed by fire early Sunday. The fire was first noticed about 12:30 a. m. and two hours later the entire works was in ruins.

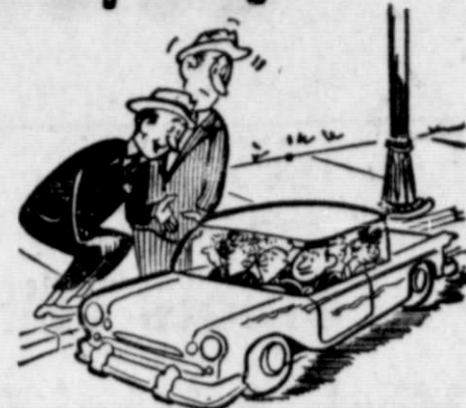

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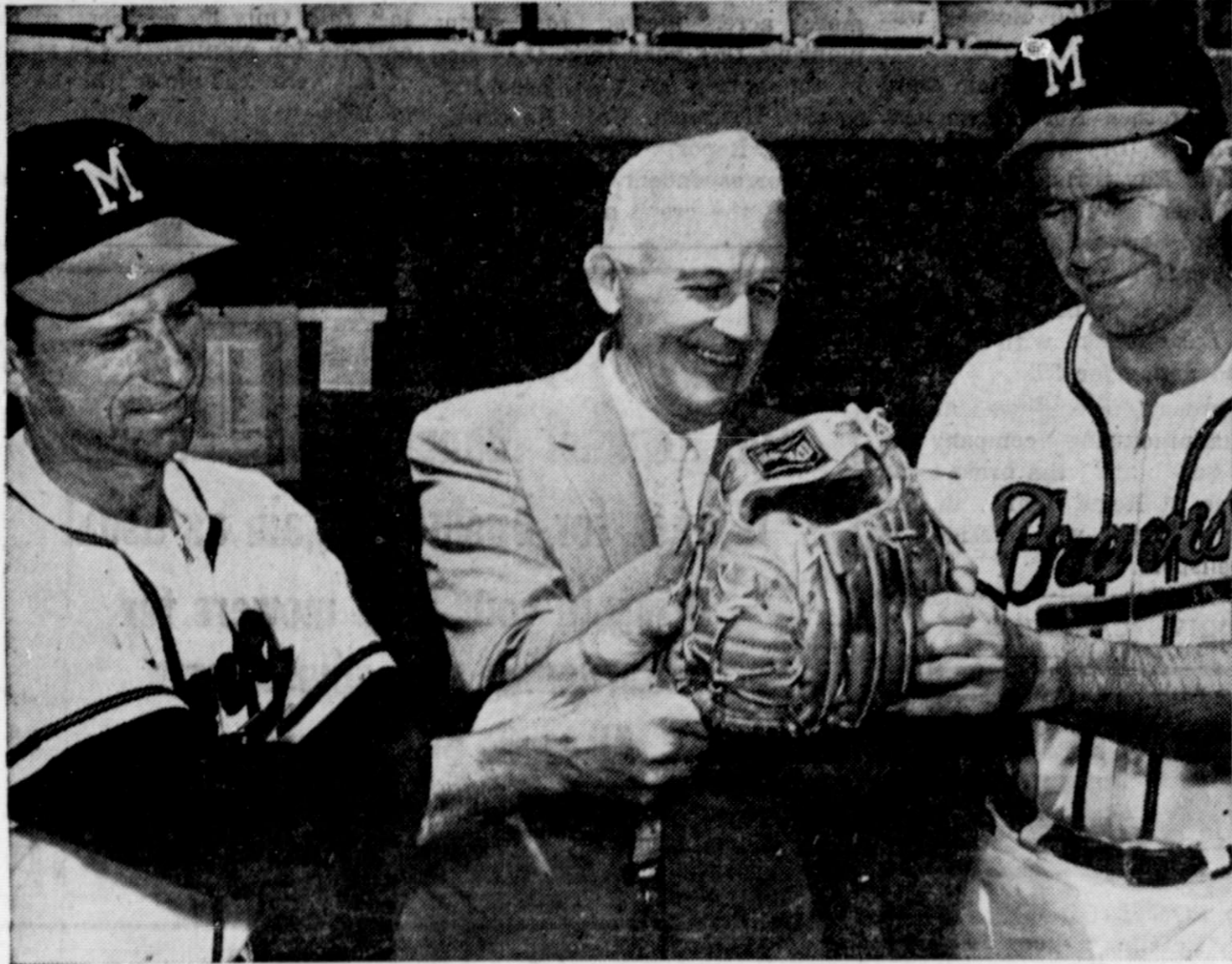
